

GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Cleaning up the debris from the December ice storm gives one great appreciation of the early settlers. Being equipped with chain saws, limbing saws and tractors helps to make the task easier and faster. The early settlers used axes mostly to eliminate the thick forests for homes, gardens and fields. One day with an axe probably made very little progress towards getting a couple acres ready for crops. To get land back then, the family had to open up, in the first year, a set amount of land to be in production. All that on top of having a dwelling for themselves, and perhaps livestock, too.

It is little wonder they wore themselves out at an early age. Hernias and bad backs seemed to be a fairly common ailment. No health insurance or a hospital for medical emergencies close by for relief either.

It took years and years of hard labor to clear out farmland; pulling big tree trunks and stumps to burn piles, then digging rocks for tillageable land was back breaking work. Now, lots of fields and stonewalls have gone back to woods. Sometimes an old stump fence line can still be found. The remnants of one is on Slip Road between Dan Beard's and the Albert Shea homestead. The roots of these stumps were all pointed the same way to make a fence to keep cattle, horses and sheep in an area. Pigs were used a lot of times to root the stumps out. Corn was put in a hole made under the stumps. The pigs were turned into an area of stumps to be opened up for field land. They would go under the stumps for the corn, digging and chewing the roots and digging dirt out.

There also were devices for the use of oxen to pull stumps out. Some used a turnstile type, others a tripod with a chain or just hooking a chain onto the roots, pulling and cutting each root.

Our June Historical Fair will be held on June 6th, Saturday at the GHS museum from 10 am to 2 pm. Knotty Pine Appraisers will again be present to do antiques appraisals. (NO JEWELRY) and please, 3 items per family. No fee will be charged for this service.

Lots of Whing Ding photos and posters will be on display. We will have items from the Greenfield Woman's Cub to view. Drawings of the future barn site at the museum can be seen, as a hopefully not to distant project, to house the Historical Society's Fire truck and other larger items. A felting demonstration, along with some live sheep will make an appearance from Conrad and Ellen Dumas' farm.

Light refreshments will be available at this free admission event. A good time to renew or become a member of the Historical Society. Also the elementary school will be having their Spring Fling on the same day. You can easily walk from one site to the other and have a wonderful Saturday.

On August 1st the Historical society will be at the Blueberry "JAM"boree with a booth. Stop by and see our exhibit and take a chance on a 50/50 raffle ticket for a cash prize, the winner will be drawn near the end of the "JAM"boree. Be sure to mark this on your calendar because there will be lots of vendors, crafters, food, animals, and events.

Wednesday, July 29th, 2009, 10pm - Midnight - Oak Park, Greenfield

Join us for a free star party on July 29th, 10pm to midnight, at Oak Park in Greenfield. All ages are welcome. Bring your families to the park for a tour of some of the most wonderful objects in our solar system. Bring your cameras (35 mm and digital cameras usable in video mode will produce the best results), any telescopes you have, binoculars and friends, for this night of astronomical observation. Remember food, drinks and lawn chairs!

Here's what nature has planned for us that night:

Not one, but TWO meteor showers at the same time! The Delta Aquarids and Capricornids will both be peaking that same night. The show will become more dramatic as the night goes on.

In the western sky, and best seen early in the night, will be the Moon - in a

perfect phase for viewing. As the night goes on, the Moon will set, darkening our skies for both the meteors, and a trio of outer planets rising in the east: Jupiter, Uranus and Neptune. There is even a chance (no promises) that we may be able to see Pluto, until recently, the outer-most planet.

It may be a Wednesday night, but when nature puts on a show, you gotta show up!

A Greenfield facilities sticker is required on your vehicle. You may obtain the sticker from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons may obtain a temporary permit.

The Beaches are open to residents between the hours of 6:00 am - 10:00 pm

NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beach.

NO open fires are permitted.

NO vehicles are allowed on the beach.

Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. This is a carry in/carry out facility. Pick up your trash and take it home with you.

NO alcoholic beverages.

Listen to lifeguards at all times. Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach.

Parents MUST watch their children at all times, especially near the parking lot. Lifeguard's are to watch the water.

Floatation devices are allowed with caution.

Fishing is allowed on the outside of the roped beach area ONLY!

Zephyr Lake Beach is not staffed with a lifeguard. Swim at your own risk.

At Sunset Lake Beach a NO Lifeguard on Duty sign will be posted when there is no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

The water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swimming, please abide by the signs posted.

LET'S "PAWS" FOR ANIMALS

TURTLE TIME!: Between May and July, female turtles will leave the water and seek out soft, sandy soils in which to dig a hole, lay their eggs, and then return to the water. Unfortunately, turtles are often seen laying eggs on the soft shoulders of roads. The best thing to do is to leave them be, and hope for the best. The eggs will hatch sometime between September and October. Once hatched, the infant turtles' instinct is to head for the water. Often a turtle may lay eggs in an area that is going to be disturbed, such as a child's sandbox or a pile of loam that is going to be spread. If this is the case, you can attempt to relocate the nest in a nearby area that will not be disturbed. Carefully dig up the eggs, noting how deep they were buried, and relocate them in a similar soft/sandy soil at the same depth. With any luck, come September or October, the eggs will hatch.

TURTLE CROSSING! Because female turtles are crossing the road seeking higher ground to lay their eggs, please avoid hitting them and if possible, you might want to help the turtle across the road - but remember always to move turtles in the direction they are headed. If they are moved back to the side they came from, they will just try to cross the road again. Caution - be careful handling those snappers! Once the eggs hatch, be on the watch for babies crossing the road headed for the water. Sawmill Road, Francestown Road, Zephyr Lake Road and Forest Road around Russell Station Road are some areas that see a lot of turtle traffic - anywhere around ponds, lakes and wetlands - so, slow down and be careful!

DOGGONE IT!: Forgive me if I am stating the obvious, but...we have a leash law. Sometimes when folks move to the country, they think, "wow, now my pets will be free to roam!" In many ways it is more dangerous for your dog to run loose in a rural area like ours - for one thing, there's more wildlife for dogs to tangle with. Just ask any dog owner who's had to deal with a dog-nose full of porcupine quills. Also, as much as you love Fido, remember his natural instincts as a predator. I'm fully aware that squirrels are not an endangered species, but I have watched a dog kill a squirrel - it's not a nice thing for you or your children to see. I have also seen a dog terrorize a cat, and if folks let their cats out (which I hope they don't!), it could be disastrous. Naturally, neighbors can work out their own compromises, but...be thoughtful and considerate of them. Also, don't forget those dog licenses!

BEARS: Black bears are very active this spring because they had only a thin layer of fat when they dened this winter. To avoid conflicts, follow these guidelines:

- Take down, clean and put away bird feeders (should have been done by April 1). Store the bird feeder until late fall. (Birds will do just fine with the natural foods available.) Bear damage to bird feeders is a common and growing

- Clean up spilled seed below feeder stations.
- Keep garbage in airtight containers inside your garage or storage area. Double bagging and the use of ammonia will reduce odors that attract bears.
- Garbage for pickup should be put outside the morning of collection and not the night before.
- Do not place meat or sweet food scraps in your compost pile.
- Do not leave pet food or dishes outdoors at night.
- Clean up and/or store outdoor grills after use.
- Use a bear-proof dumpster.
- Never intentionally feed bears to attract them to your yard for viewing.

There's room for more perennials, so if you're thinning out some of your beds, please see Matt about giving them a new home at the Recycling Center. There are also pots and trays for seeds available to be reused if you need them, so just give or take what you need. Please ask a staff member where to pick up or drop off pots and trays.

The results of the survey are in, and in general, it seems people are happy with the recycling center hours and operation. There were requests to recycle plastic bags, plastic lids and bottle caps, and composting in the future. We will do our best to make these suggestions a reality, and will let you all know when we can. We are working on scheduling a regional hazardous waste day as well. The Department of Environmental Services schedules the dates for all the towns and there is significant cost involved in collecting and removing the waste after it's collected.

You may have noticed a new shed behind the electronics box. It will house a scale on which to weigh construction and demolition debris in the future. The cost of disposal will be by weight, and the amount has yet to be determined. We believe that it will be a better way to recover the costs of disposing of the construction/demolition debris. The bulky items, such as furniture and mattresses will still be charged a flat rate. We'll keep you informed well in advance of the change to weighing the materials.

THE IMPORTANCE OF WETLANDS part III

WETLANDS BUFFERS-WHY WE NEED THEM

Many of us learn as children about wetlands (vernal pools, swamps, ponds, streams, and rivers) and the animals that breed and live in these areas. They provide an important ecosystem in our environment. However, our learning frequently overlooks the essential role played by the land surrounding our wetlands-wetlands buffers.

WETLANDS AND WETLANDS BUFFERS

Wetlands enhance the quality of our water by trapping sediment and removing pollutants. They provide for groundwater recharge, hold water runoff during heavy storms and snowmelts, support fish and wildlife habitat, as well as enhance the beauty of our community and provide recreational opportunities. How well our wetlands perform these functions depends on the land that surrounds them, the wetlands buffers. The buffers make sure the wetlands function properly. Wetlands buffers are vegetated lands that help the wetlands perform its functions and they protect the wetlands from the impacts of human activities.

WETLAND BUFFERS AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST

Wetlands buffers do more than protect a single vernal pool or swamp, they also affect our community overall and the watersheds we all depend on for clean water. In a community like Greenfield, water runoff and wetlands affect multiple parcels and actions along one portion of the wetlands affect neighbors and their water resources downstream from the water runoff.

If our wetlands and the land surrounding them are lost to development, our community will need to increase spending (our taxes) for engineering solutions to replace the functions that wetlands performed. Such solutions may include construction of stormwater detention ponds, sedimentation ponds, and vegetated treatment swales along roads. We may also have to spend tax dollars replacing stream banks and roads, dredging of stream channels, and maintaining road culverts. The frequency and amount of flooding will increase as we lose wetlands, wetlands buffers, and their storage capacity for water runoff. The need for natural storage capacity for flood waters (like those that swamps provide) was clearly demonstrated in the flooding we all experienced in Spring 2006 and again in 2007. We will all feel the financial impact associated with increased flooding when town resources must be spent on manmade, engineered solutions to water runoff.

CONCLUSIONS

Once wetlands and wetlands buffers are lost to development, their benefits are essentially lost for good. Our failure to protect these important natural resources will result in significant costs to Greenfield, including reduced property values, expensive property and road damage due to flooding, pollution of surface waters, pollution of groundwater and wells, and loss of valued native plant and animal species. More importantly, we will lose Greenfield's natural beauty and character.

Greenfield Conservation Commission
