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GREENFIELD INDUSTRIES BUILDING

Some of you are probably wondering what is going on with the Greenfield Industries building. After the Board of Selectmen was given the authority to sell the property at a Special Town Meeting, the deeding process moved forward but encountered a glitch concerning the title. Prior to the auction, a title search was done and everything seemed clear but the buyer did their own search and found another Greenfield Industries. The name of this one had been filed with the State whereas ours had not. The new Greenfield Industries is showing several liens against the property, so the buyer requested that we go to court and petition for quiet title. This action will settle once and for all the ownership of the property and will assure the buyer that no one can come at a later date with a lien against the property. To assure that the purchase would go through, the Board signed an extension of the purchase and sales agreement so that the sale will happen as soon as the legal work is done. The petition for quiet title has already been filed and we should hear in the next month or so that the deeding process can go forward as planned.

THE PEOPLE'S SERVICE EXCHANGE

A Project of The Grapevine Family & Community Resource Center

Until very recently in human history, people survived primarily on trading goods and services. The People's Service Exchange a project of The Grapevine Family and Community Resource Center in Antrim offers members the opportunity to give and receive services without the exchange of money, which is proving to be essential for many in these difficult economic times.

The Exchange strives to strengthen the informal support systems of family, neighborhood, and community through the sharing of skills, talents, and services. Any person in the community can convert personal time into purchasing power. The program is simple: One hour of service equals one "time dollar". All services have equal value, whether it's an hour of financial consulting, or an hour of yard work.

Members seldom trade directly with the person they are giving to or receiving from. All the skills and services go into a pool that is open to every member. Members may even donate an hour, or use hours that others have donated. There are currently over 150 members offering about 200 services. This "time dollars" model, service for service, or time for time exchange, is successful in over 300 locations in the U.S. and abroad. It originated in 1980 by Edgar Cahn, an attorney who became incapacitated after he suffered a heart attack. His feelings of uselessness led him to create a concept through which the diverse abilities of people from all walks of life are valued and exchanged without the need for money.

The skills in the People's Service Exchange membership pool include household budgeting, pet sitting, computer support, driving, gardening, house sitting, teaching an instrument or language, real estate consulting, massage, tutoring, wheel chair repair, and many others.

2007/2008. In addition, there were still fees to remove the materials, unlike in 2007/2008, when the price of the materials was so high, removal fees were offset by the revenue.

Greenfield is a member of Northeast Resource Recovery Association, along with approximately 100 other towns in New Hampshire. They provide the containers and removal of the full containers of recyclables and get the best market prices because of the quantities they handle. When the ton price of the product doesn't pay for the removal, there is no revenue to the town, but there still is money paid for the product. In the past, when one product's market price was down, another's was up, so it would offset the cost of removal and still produce revenue. Those days aren't back- yet. Recovery in the recyclables economy is slow, too. By continuing to participate in this

cooperative with many other towns, we still greatly reduce the waste stream that the Town has to pay to remove.

The Grand Totals for 2009 from our membership in the Northeast Resource Recovery Association are: \$6,139.77 in revenue and \$5,178.45 in expenses for 114.10 tons of recyclables.

Remember, the average minimum cost to the Town to put a ton of recyclable material into the waste stream is \$75.00/ ton as quoted by the Dept. of Environmental Services in 2008, so what was recycled in 2009 would have cost at least \$11,437.50 to get rid of in a way that is not environmentally responsible. Keep up the good work!

Thanks, as always, to the residents for their hard work and support to recycle.



TOWN ENERGY COMMITTEE (TEC) NEWS

Several townspeople have asked for an account of how much money the town has saved since energy conservation measures have been implemented in the Town Office Building (TOB). TEC member Diane Boilard has calculated how much fuel oil was delivered to the TOB, beginning with the 07/08 heating season. We're very pleased to report that the energy (money) savings are truly significant. Note that we measure everything in gallons, because it's a constant value, whereas a dollar saving is harder to measure due to the fluctuating price of fuel.

Last year alone, merely by closing off the upstairs and installing a door at the bottom of the inside stairway, 626.4 fewer gallons were delivered during the 07/08 heating season! Since we're in the midst of the 09/10 season, we can only compare the fourth quarter of 08 with the same period in 09. We're delighted to announce that we've already saved an additional 118.5 gallons over and above the previous year's phenomenal progress. And that's with 2 fuel deliveries before the building insulation was completed.

We are currently working with Board of Selectmen (BOS) Administrative Assistant Deb Davidson to apply for an Energy Efficiency Community Block Grant through the NH Office of Energy Planning, in order to insulate the Meeting House, replace the furnace in both the TOB and the Meeting House, and to replace the TOB windows with thermally efficient ones. We'll know how we fare by the end of March.

There are numerous other grants available from other sources, and we're busy researching the efficacy of applying for those as well.

Some of you may have noticed a couple of curious little black fixtures, mounted on stakes, as you've entered the TOB from the main parking area. These are motion activated LED (Light Emitting Diode) pathway lights. They're there as a test to see if we can replace the array of energy thirsty

floodlights that stay on until they're shut off by a timer. Any one of you that uses timers is aware of the nuisance of having to reset them after the power is interrupted.

The LED pathway lights are only activated when it's dark out. They come on when they sense motion, and remain on until 20 seconds after motion is no longer detected. This means that they'll light the walkway whenever they're needed, not merely during regular business hours. Each unit is powered by 3 C cell batteries, which are reported to last about 1 year under normal use. It remains to be seen what "normal use" amounts to, and there is some concern about their effectiveness during extremely cold spells. They may also need to be repositioned in order to illuminate a larger area of the pathway.

Speaking of lights, the TEC has asked the BOS to consider adopting a policy that will determine when the holiday lighting should end. While not a huge strain on the town's energy budget, it's a very visible one. The TEC believes that the town should serve as a model of efficiency. If a private citizen chooses to display holiday lighting into mud season, let him do so. But, particularly during these challenging economic times, the town needs to constantly demonstrate that it values our precious tax dollars.

RESIDENTIAL GENERATOR SAFETY from the NH State Fire Marshal's Office

The State Fire Marshal has developed this informational document to provide homeowners and other residents of New Hampshire with valuable information about generator safety during periods of power outages. Accidental fires from improper refueling methods, improper wiring methods, and carbon monoxide poisoning from exhaust can

cause severe injuries or death to citizens. In addition, linemen attempting to restore power to the area can be injured or killed if the generator is not installed properly. For additional safety inspections and tips please contact your local Fire Department or this office at (603) 223-4289 or fmo@dos.nh.gov.

Portable Generators

Portable generators should be placed 10 feet from any structure, with the exhaust facing away from the building openings. Deadly exhaust fumes can enter the building through any opening resulting in severe injury or death to unsuspecting occupants.

Never place portable generators on or near combustible surfaces such as decks, porches, or tool sheds. Heat generated by the motor, or improper refueling methods can start a fire.

Never run portable generators inside any building, including basement areas and garages. Deadly levels of carbon monoxide can build up in minutes injuring occupants with little to no warning.

Allow plenty of time to cool the generator before refueling. Gasoline vapors can easily ignite from hot surfaces causing a flash fire and severe injuries.

Always store approved gasoline containers a safe distance from generators while in use. Always store gasoline in an approved container placed in a well ventilated storage area. Never store gasoline products in basements or enclosed areas of your dwelling.

Never modify or construct any power cord so a generator can be connected to a receptacle, dryer or range outlet.

Never connect a generator directly to panelboard without a means to prevent inadvertent connection to the normal supply system wiring. Connecting a generator directly to an electrical outlet or to a panelboard without a transfer switch or an interlocking device could result in a situation where power from the generator could energize the utility's wiring (back feeds into the utility system). Electrical power from a generator back fed through your meter into the utility system can cause fires, serious injury or death to utility

workers trying to repair the lines in the street, or electricians working on nearby property's electrical systems.

Unless you are the owner of, and are occupying, a single family residence or meet one of the exceptions in RSA 319-C, a license is required to perform the electrical installation for connection of a generator to premises wiring. Therefore, a properly licensed master electrician must perform the electrical installation. In all cases the electrical installation must meet the minimum requirements of the National Electrical Code (NFPA 70-2008).

Although the generator is portable, an electrical permit and inspection may be required by the local jurisdiction for the installation of electrical wiring and equipment for connecting the generator to the premises wiring. Therefore it would be prudent to contact the local jurisdiction to ascertain whether an electrical permit is required.

Stationary Generator Installations

In many cases property owners have chosen to install a stationary generator. In addition to the above mentioned items, stationary generators used for an alternate source of power require additional considerations. Along with the National Electrical Code (NFPA 70-2008) the requirements of other documents, that are either adopted directly or by reference by the State of New Hampshire, must be adhered to. Examples of these documents and the types of requirements they contain are:

NFPA 37, Standard for the Installation and Use of Stationary Combustion Engines and Gas Turbines (2002 Edition) NFPA 54, National Fuel Gas Code (2003 Edition) The Manufacturers Instructions

NFPA 37 requires stationary generator engines and their weatherproof housings if provided, that are installed outdoors to be located at least 5' from openings in walls.

This standard recognizes the potential danger of deadly carbon monoxide gas entering the structure and injuring the occupants. Building openings could be, but are not limited to, the following:

Basement doors & bulkhead openings

- Basement windows
- Exit doors or sliding glass openings
- Windows
- Dryer vents
- Kitchen appliance vents
- Mechanical exhaust vents for heating or hot water appliances
- Air intake openings or screens

NFPA 37 also requires stationary generator engines and their weatherproof housings, if provided, that are installed outdoors to be placed a minimum of five feet (5') from structures having combustible walls. The minimum separation is not required where:

- (1) The adjacent wall of the structure has a fire resistance rating of at least 1 hour or
- (2) The weatherproof enclosure is constructed of noncombustible materials, which has been listed and approved in accordance with NFPA 555, verifying that a fire within the enclosure will not ignite combustible materials outside the enclosure.

These allowances apply directly to the separation from the combustible wall surface and in no case shall reduce the minimum distance to a building opening.

The fuel gas piping must be installed in accordance with both NFPA 37 and NFPA 54 (National Fuel Gas Code). These documents require that the second stage system regulator be placed a minimum of five feet (5') from any building opening and ignition source. Care must be given in placement of both the generator engine and delivery system piping to address the minimum separation distances.

Unless you are the owner of, and are occupying, a single family residence or meet one of the exceptions in RSA 319-C, a license is required to perform the electrical installation for connection of a stationary generator to premises wiring. Therefore, a properly licensed master electrician must perform the electrical installation. In all cases the electrical installation must meet the minimum requirements of the National Electrical Code (NFPA 70-2008).

Unless you are the owner of an existing single family stand-alone structure

that is used as your primary residence, Saf-C 8003.01 requires a license to perform the installation of the fuel gas supply system. In all cases the installation of the fuel gas supply system must meet all the applicable standards and codes.

Installation permits and inspection may be required by the local jurisdiction for the installation of electrical wiring and equipment for connecting the generator to the premises wiring and for the fuel gas fitting portion of the installation. Therefore it would be prudent to contact the local jurisdiction to ascertain whether a permit(s) is required.

FREE RADON AIR TEST KIT

DES Offering Free Radon Air Test Kits in recognition of January as National Radon Action Month

The New Hampshire Radon Program at DES is offering free radon air test kits (while supplies last) to New Hampshire residents during the month of January in honor of National Radon Action Month.


Did you know radon gas kills more people in New Hampshire on an annual basis than anything else that the Department of Environmental Services deals with? Many people ignore the warnings about radon gas. Maybe because radon has no color, taste, or odor people don't think about it. Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that can build to high levels in residential homes. It is the second leading cause of lung cancer after cigarette smoking, and the leading cause of lung cancer in non-smokers.

Testing is the only way to know if your home or well water has elevated radon levels. Equipment is available for homes that may need to reduce elevated radon levels.

2010 Census Jobs: Earn Extra Money, Serve Your Community

Local Census Office Accepting Applicants for Temporary Employment to Support U.S. Census Bureau's Goal of a Complete Count

While the economy continues to create uncertainty, the U.S. Census Bureau is providing opportunities for individuals to supplement their incomes with flexible, good-paying jobs — hiring hundreds temporary workers in the local area to ensure the 2010 Census is a success.

Census takers, also known as enumerators, are needed to conduct in-person interviews with community residents who do not return census questionnaires. These positions need to be filled by individuals with flexible schedules. Most positions require the ability to work a flexible schedule, which may include evenings and weekends. Some positions may involve shift work. Bilingual workers are needed in many areas.

2010 Census job applicants must be at least 18 years old, have a valid Social Security number, be able to pass a background check, and complete a 30-minute, multiple-choice, employment test that measures knowledge, skills, and abilities required to perform a variety of census jobs. More information, including a practice test, is available at www.2010censusjobs.gov.

In most cases, workers will also be required to possess a valid driver's license and have use of a vehicle. U.S. citizenship is required to work for the 2010 Census except in rare occasions when no qualified U.S. citizens are available.

All temporary census employees must be able to attend training, for which they will be compensated. Most training sessions are held during the day on weekdays; occasionally, a session may be held in the evening or on the weekend.
