## CONSERVATION CORNER Volunteers Needed for Field Work

Conservationists worldwide have declared 2008 the "Year of the Frog." Frogs and other amphibians are especially vulnerable to habitat loss and up to half of the 6,000 species alive today are threatened with extinction. They depend on both land and water. If either habitat suffers, they do as well. Their thin skins let them easily take in air and water, but that thin skin allows pollutant through, too (Scientific American July 2008).

To help save the water resources that we, frogs, and other wildlife depend on, Greenfield's Conservation Commission is looking for volunteers to help us inventory Greenfield's wetlands. We are looking for volunteers willing to spend a little bit of time during the winter months learning about vernal pools and their identification. Once spring arrives, we will start our fieldwork identifying and recording the condition of vernal pools on town land. **Wood Bank:** We have again stockpiled seasoned stove wood for distribution in the coming heating season. If you need supplemental wood to help you through the winter, and can't afford to buy it, please call 547-3442 to discuss your situation with Deb Davidson, the Town of Greenfield Welfare Officer. After establishing need, Deb will contact Neal Brown, Woodbank Manager, and he will call you to make the appropriate arrangements to get some wood to you.

**Emergency Fuel/Utility Assistance:** Last year we sold some of our stove wood and donated the proceeds (\$1000.00) to Southern NH Services (SNHS) to specifically provide assistance to Greenfield citizens who require emergency help with their fuel and utility bills. We are pleased to inform Spirit readers that SNHS expended this money to assist three needy Greenfield families.

This Fall we again have been selling wood (see below) to raise funds for the SNHS/Greenfield emergency program. Given this year's large increases in citizens' heating bills, we have set a goal to triple the amount of last year's donation.

## GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Fall for some people means fair season, taking in all the activities, sights, sounds, and smells to be treasured on a crisp Fall day. The Hillsborough County Fair was held for several years in Greenfield. From 1918 - 1925, it drew big crowds, for the time. Held at Oak Park Fairgrounds, the train would bring

people from all over New England. Horse and sulky racing was a large part of this event. Local people brought an assortment of items to be judged and displayed...cattle, sheep, horses, pigs, and chickens, for animals. Fresh out of the gardens, were vegetables and flowers. Women would have fancy work, clothing, baked items, and canned foods to showcase their expertise. This fair is not the present day Hillsborough County Fair, which is 51 years old and started by two brothers in New Boston. The historical society has flyers and posters from the Fair. Some of our flyers, from 1919, advertised an "Army Aeroplane" will land at Oak Park. There also are auto passes that were given to those lucky enough to have one. Some have arrows and say "all roads lead to Greenfield and the Hillsborough County Fair". Copies of several posters and other fair items are on display at the Historical Society Museum. They are colorful and interesting to read.

This information was taken from the Town History and Peterborough Transcript articles.

We have a few post cards in our inventory of the Hillsborough County Fair. Along this line we have just started a post card album of Greenfield postcards. Some are of the early 1900's up through to the 1950's. We have unused, as well as post cards sent in the mail to people in town, and others sent to out of towners. As these appear, a glimpse of old Greenfield comes to light. One card has the best photo yet of the water trough (which is now in the museum yard) and gaslight at the Slip Road intersection. Tied in with the post cards, we have drawings for circa 1906 by Lewis Day that are on display. He was about 12 years old then, and lived above the family store on Slip Road. He hid the drawing in the walls and attic.

David Buchanan has found lots of them so far, and has graciously loaned them to the Historical Society to be enjoyed by everyone who visits the museum, Saturday 11 a.m. -2 p.m. or by appointment - call Lenny at 547-2198.

On October 27th at 7 p.m., there will be haunted stories being read at the library in the Peter Wensburg room. Sebastian Lockwood, Putnam Ericoline, and Joan

Knight will be our readers. It should be an interesting evening down in the dark, cavernous room. This will keep you on the edge of your seat and looking over your shoulder.

Vintage Christmas once again appears at the Society Museum for the weekend of December 6 -7 for 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday.

This year, exhibits will be a little different than last year. So you will enjoy it as much or more. Decorations from 1900's and some from the late 1800's as well. A fun addition to the Holiday Season.

Maybe the best feature of the Mini Mall is that it is truly a place to participate in the "reduce" and "reuse" facets of recycling, and that, of course, benefits the environment as well as our community.

It's also important that those generous people that donate to the mini mall be considerate of all the users of the service. Broken, sharp or very dirty things should not be left in the mall. Large boxes with discarded clothing, undergarments or pieces of toys should also not be left. If it didn't sell at your yard sale, put it at the end of your driveway with a FREE sign on it.
