LIBRARY FOUNDATION WORK DONE

We're excited to report to you on the progress of work at the Stephenson Library. Because most of the work is underground and taxpayers won't be able to see the work after it is backfilled, we thought this was an important opportunity to show you your tax dollars at work.

Following a final preconstruction meeting on May 31, 2017 attended by project managers from Mathewson Construction, representatives of Underwood Engineering, Library Trustees representative Ray Cilley, Rick McQuade and others, excavation and repair of the Library foundation began on schedule on the morning of June 12, 2017. Under the close supervision of Ray Cilley and daily visits by Building and Grounds Supervisor Rick McQuade, the initial excavation took place as planned from the intersection of the old foundation and the 2003 addition foundation at the rear, continuously around to the front of the building. Within 2 and 1/2 days, the foundation was exposed (see photos), cleaned by Mathewson and prepped for sealing. Exposure of the foundation revealed two problems: the foundation in the rear under an exit had collapsed and the underpinnings of the front stairs were a concern. After a team meeting of Ray Cilley, Mathewson, Underwood Engineering and Knowles Industrial Services, it was determined that Knowles would install rebar and steel rods in the rear and blow in "shot-crete" to stabilize the foundation under the exit, at no additional cost. A decision to extend the "shot-crete" and foundation seal out from the front steps,

FROM THE DPW BUILDING & GROUNDS MANAGER

I would like to use this as a mid-year update on some of the projects and tasks that have affected the Buildings and Grounds Department from January to June. This winter didn't start off too badly, but about half way through the season, Mother Nature reminded us who was in control. For me, snow removal is broken down into parking lots, parking areas, sidewalks, and all entry ways and emergency exits for all buildings. The six buildings that I take care of are the Town Office, Meeting House, the old Town Office building, Library, Fire Station and Oak Park. Sidewalks are maintained from the Elementary School to the Town Office and back up to 701 Forest Road. I clear the parking spaces in the downtown, the parking lots behind and in front of the Harvest Market and both large parking lots at Oak Park. During storms, all main entrance and emergency exits are shoveled unless buildings are closed due to the storm. After a storm, I will clean up any snow drifts and clear snow from the roofs where it can be reached, especially at the fire station. An average snow storm can take up to 8-10 hours to completely clean up. I try to check all parking lots and sidewalks daily to ensure there are no dangerous slippery spots from melting and refreezing overnight.

In February, all the municipal building's alarm systems were tested by Monadnock Security. The only exception was the Library, which was tested in May. This is an all-day project to go around with the technician to each building and verify that all systems are working correctly. The Library had several heat detectors that were at the end of their life cycle and in need of replacing to maintain compliance. Just this past week, with the exception of the Fire Department, Hampshire Fire inspected all of the buildings fire extinguishers. These types of inspections keep us in compliance, ensure our buildings safety and security and help us to gather information for next year's budgeting.

Every Monday, all the municipal buildings are checked and in the colder months; they may be checked as many as 3 times a week. I go through and verify that the furnaces are working and the buildings are at a safe temperature. I check all the oil or propane levels and verify that they are not at dangerous levels. I do a quick walk through of the building to check for general maintenance items and make notes on items that need to be fixed or addressed. These building walk-throughs help me to keep on top of the general state of the buildings and hopefully keeps pipes from freezing in the event of a furnace malfunction.

At the Recycling Center, I spend 2-3 hours a week with various tasks. They consist of crushing the dumpsters including the metal, demolition, and aluminum cans. This helps to compact and consolidate the waste, get the maximum out of every container, and hopefully save the town a little money on haul-

ing expenses. Usually once a week the glass bin is emptied, maybe twice a week in the warmer months. The brush pile is also pushed up and consolidated to facilitate a good burn when conditions are right.

At the Library, the flagpole light was replaced after it was struck by a vehicle. This light was replaced with a new energy efficient LED light. Some of the routine maintenance for this building includes changing light ballasts, twice a week trash removal, and dehumidifier and air conditioner filter cleaning. The drainage project around the foundation has started and I spend some of my time there watching over the project and assisting the contractors as needed. Usually the Building Inspector and I will discuss the project and have questions or concerns to bring to the contractors. Our main goal is looking out for the tax payers of Greenfield and ensuring the project is done correctly.

Oak Park has been a busy place for me this year. As you are all probably aware, there was a fire in the storage shed and the insurance company deemed the shed and most of its contents a complete loss. In April, I removed all the equipment that could be salvaged and the shed was used for a fire department training burn. In March, we started the process of researching a replacement shed including stick building our own. 4 different vendors were researched and I took trips to each vendor to verify the quality of work that goes into their sheds. After a lot of research, the new shed build was given to Cheshire Shed & Gazebo out of Swanzey. Thanks to the DPW Roads staff, a new base for the shed was prepared and on June 23rd, the shed was delivered and put in place. In the next few weeks, we will bring back all the baseball equipment and get it ready for the next baseball season.

The concession stand at Oak Park got a good spring cleaning. All of the walls were wiped down especially behind the stove. The stainless steel wall covering behind the stove was filthy! I washed it down with a degreaser and then went over with a stainless-steel cleaner. Both refrigerators were cleaned inside and out and some preventative maintenance performed. All the food prep tables were washed as well as the shelves that hold all the pots and pans. Windows were washed, gutters were cleaned and light bulbs and some light fixtures were changed. Bird poop continues to be an issue under the pavilion. Once a week, usually on a Friday morning, I pressure wash the tables and floor of the pavilion. We have started to research the best solution to prevent the birds from nesting in the framework under the roof, to hopefully have a solution in place for next spring. A few other maintenance items that have been addressed are the hot water heater received a new regulator, the lock on the entry door has been fixed and the area around the building has been raked. Years of dust and dirt were cleaned to get this space ready for all the summer and fall rentals.

The septic and grease tanks for the concession stand at Oak Park were also located, pumped and inspected this past month. You may now notice that 4 large boulders have been placed in

the parking area in front of the concession stand and pavilion. This is to keep people from parking on the tanks; this was a recommendation of the septic company as these are not commercial tanks and cannot be driven or parked on. We will also be placing small rocks around this parking area to prevent people from driving and parking on the leach field. This type of prevention could save the town thousands of dollars in repairs.

Both town beaches have been prepped for the season and Sunset is staffed with life guards. The winter debris was raked at both beaches, and at Sunset, the raft and safety buoy lines have been put in. Thank you to the life guards for their assistance with these projects. Last month the raft received some maintenance, replacing a few broken boards on the deck as well as securing a few supports on the ladder. For safety reasons, when putting the raft in the water, a new hatch was installed on the deck of the raft which allows for easy and safe attachment of the raft to the raft anchor line. This allows a person to attach the raft to the anchor line while being on top of the raft instead of under it.

The DPW building had a new outside light installed to replace the light that had suffered water damage. This was replaced with a new energy efficient Led light. This light, illuminates the front of the building which makes winter operations safer for the guys working around the trucks. A new faucet was installed in the kitchenette and the toilet was outfitted with a rebuild kit to prevent it from constantly running. Approximately 16 fluorescent lights were changed in the truck bays which will definitely improve the working conditions for the guys. The roof over the fuel pumps was also repaired as many of the metal screws had started backing out. These were replaced with the proper screws to prevent this from happening in the future.

The Fire Station apparatus bay received roughly 30 new fluorescent bulbs and 6 new light ballasts to light the area. This space was very dark and lighting repairs were badly needed. A new thermostat was also replaced and a new thermostat lock box installed. The police station received a new custom bench that I built which will allow the Officers to safely clean their weapons out of the view of the public. I have started a building inventory for each of the municipal buildings. Weekly and monthly checklists have also been started for each building and this will allow anyone to quickly pick up this document and tell what needs to be done for each of the buildings. The flags along the streets were put out before Memorial Day and new bunting was put up on the Town Office, Meeting House, Fire Station, Oak Park Gazebo and the library. These little touches are what make Greenfield really stand out and shine.

CVTC Takes On Challenge Grant

Cheshire and Hillsborough Counties - The New Hampshire Charitable Foundation has offered a \$20,000 Challenge Grant to Community Volunteer Transportation Company (CVTC). With the expansion of CVTC's non-emergency medical transportation services from 13 to 33 towns in the Monadnock Region, it is critical to attract new sources of support for the demonstrated impact on the health, wellness and independence for the passengers and Volunteer Drivers.

Over the next six months, CVTC is reaching out to encourage dollar-for-dollar matched giving from new resources and/or increased giving from current donors. "This is a great opportunity to double the giving power of your donation. We are in the business of generating hope with each mile we drive and that is priceless," says Ellen Avery, Executive Director.

Living in rural NH, CVTC is often the only means of public transportation available. Healthcare, social services, and even affordable groceries are located from 10 to 30 minutes and up to two hours away in many cases. Transportation remains within the top 5 community needs generated by hospital and social service surveys. By getting rides to important medical appointments, people tend to maintain or improve their current health; feel less of a burden on family and friends; and are able to remain living independently.

2017 projections indicate that Volunteer Drivers will log in over 125,000 miles, serving close to 400 individuals and donate over 6,000 hours of their time. Volunteer Drivers drive their own vehicles, selects trips based on their availability, and may opt in or out of receiving mileage reimbursement at \$0.41 per mile. Currently, there are 80 Volunteer Drivers.

A 501(c)3 not-for-profit organization based in Peterborough, NH. CVTC strives to meet unmet transportation needs in the Monadnock region by providing "no fee" transportation for people who do not have access because of age, ability, economic situation or other limiting circumstances. Trip purposes include non-emergency medical and social service appointments, as well as trips to the grocery store and pharmacy. FROM THE RECYCLING CENTER

It seems the kids just got out of school for the summer and the next thing will be school shopping. The fall is about to fall on us! The last few weeks of summer may include some cleaning projects and getting rid of unwanted items. We are here to help you find a new home for such items so please see us for direction on where to place them. You can also talk with us before tackling the project to have an idea of how to prepare your unwanted items and what expense may be involved. It is very wise to check ahead with us concerning any type of fluids you wish to dispose of since we cannot accept all types.

NEW PERMANENT HOURS: Tuesday 8am - 4pm, Thursday 11am to 6pm, Saturday 8am - 4pm

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE: Collections have started - information sheets are available. Remember we cannot accept hazardous waste - your items must be taken to Keene.

All things happen for a reason - as life shows us over and over again but you just may have to wait to see or figure out why. We had an unexpected happening several weeks ago. We always plan to have recycled materials moved out on the "closed to the public" days for safety and sanity reasons but recently this did not work out. We had a tractor trailer come in to load up on a Thursday, which was not ideal but was necessary. As we were starting to load the trailer a very excited resident came to talk to us. He was appalled at the sight of all the bales on the dock, seeing the process of loading, and then the realization that all of this is what each of you bring in to recycle. We were surprised at this reaction because this is what we do!! But this time the timing showed us --- that until you see it - you do not realize the results of your efforts. He suggested we post pictures to show what becomes of everyone's hard work.

We are delighted to oblige by showing pictures that show the bales of plastics (#1 & #2) and aluminum cans ready to load. Cardboard is usually shipped twice a year by the half load in



combination with another facility. Why the half load? The answer is that we lack enough storage space to keep a full load under cover. Shipping a full trailer load would allow us to get the highest \$\$ for our materials but the storage space just isn't available. The target for a full load is 40 to 44 bales with a total weight of 42,000 pounds.

We also get the best price by second sorting everything. This is team work at its best. You do your part by RECYCLING and sorting at home and we do our part producing the highest quality bales possible. With our new floor scale (50% paid with grant monies) we have changed our baling process to get more weight in each bale, which equals more \$\$\$\$ per shipment. We are very excited to be a part of this process and we realize there will always be something new for us to learn. We thank you for your awareness and dedication to recycling.

REMINDERS:

- Caps off #1 & #2 plastics. We greatly appreciate your efforts and cooperation with this and apologize for any inconvenience. Metal lids/caps off any container will go with the steel cans. All caps must be off the glass containers. Please continue to rinse all containers you recycle because we handle every piece as it comes in to process it.
- All trash must be in bags and tied closed. Thank you for your constant cooperation on this issue.
- **ALL METALS and BRUSH MUST BE CHECKED.**
- All items for the Mini Mall and Library must be checked.
- Plastics - #1's = **BOTTLES ONLY**. Please look up for some samples on the wall for the plastics.
- Aluminum-cans - **NO** aerosol cans - these go in steel cans.
- Steel cans: Only food or light cleaning related cans. Please have all other containers or metals checked for proper disposal procedures and area.
- Corrugated cardboard-**IF IT HAS RIDGES IT IS CORROGATED**. If in doubt - **TEAR** to check. Must be dry and clean. **NO** pizza box inserts or greasy box bottoms - these are trash, recycle the clean box cover. Take out all packing materials before recycling.

- Vegetable/Nut oils used or new accepted - Requirements are posted on the wall at the collection area.
- Used or new motor oil is collected all year long - Requirements are posted at the collection area. Thank you for your contributions.
- Lawn mowers/Bicycles - these items need to be checked and the history on usable lawn equipment is appreciated.
- Demo/Construction debris/ Bulky Waste and all Electronics - Must see attendant. **ALL** have **FEES** applied.

Please read the Greenfield Recycling Center Handout for more details. It is available on the web site, town offices and at GRC.

Please remember you must also provide your own muscle power to unload heavy items.

We are never too busy for questions. If we are not visible to you, please open the door and give a shout. We take pleasure in making your time at the center a friendly and productive experience.

Rev. Dan Osgood to Celebrate 30 Years of Service to the Greenfield Community

Reverend Dan Osgood has been serving God and the people of Greenfield in our community since 1987. On August 19, 2017 we will celebrate this amazing achievement! Few people do any one thing for this amount of time anymore, much less minister to people (today the average person holds a job for 4.6 years). To Dan Osgood, serving Greenfield for 30 years has been more than a job, it has been a calling. “Rev Dan” is the longest serving minister in Greenfield church history, which dates back to the founding in 1791. He is known for his friendly, caring personality and his sense of humor.

Rev. Doctor F. Daniel Osgood graduated from Lyndon State College, Lyndon, VT. He completed his Master of Divinity degree at Bangor Theological Seminary, Bangor, ME, and received his Doctor of Ministry degree at the Northern Seminary, Lombard, IL. He has also studied at North Park Theological Seminary in Chicago, IL, and Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in Hamilton, MA.

The early years of Dan’s life were spent on a small Vermont dairy farm that had been in his family for several generations. His life during these years centered on the farm, a large family—he’s the eldest of seven siblings—and the small, rural community church of Thetford, VT.

Before entering the ministry, Dan taught history for several years at Thetford Academy in Thetford (1972 to 1978), after which he returned to dairy farming. While farming, he began to examine a personal calling to ministry, leading him to enroll in Bangor Theological Seminary where he majored in small church ministry.

In 1987, Dan graduated from BTS and was called to the Greenfield Church. He moved here with his wife Kathy and their two children, Ryan and Megan. Through hundreds of services, scores of marriages, funerals, counseling sessions, and much more, over the years he has had a great influence on many people in our community. (Along with his wife Kathy, his biggest supporter, who has also done many things for members of the Greenfield community.) When he came here, he was also called to the position of protestant chaplain at Crotched Mountain. While serving as chaplain, Rev. Dan has provided spiritual care and guidance to the Crotched Mountain community. He has served on various CMRC committees, including the Human Rights, Chaplaincy, and Grief committees. He currently serves on the Ethics Committee.

Rev. Dan has also served in various community, regional and national organizations; they include Monadnock Habitat for Humanity Board of Directors, Secretary of Monadnock Council of Churches, Pilgrim Pines Camp and Conference Center Board of Directors. He is on the Monadnock Community Hospital Ethics Committee, and has served on the MCH Medical Staff Board of Directors. He has supplied the opening prayer at the NH statehouse (*pictured*). Rev. Dan is currently working with Joni and Friends International Disability Center, an international organization with the sole purpose of advancing ministries to people with disabilities and their families.

Rev. Dan Osgood is an example of dedication and commitment to the people of Greenfield and beyond. We are proud to call him our pastor, and hope you will thank and congratulate him on so many fruitful years of service to the community and region. to an area under the concrete apron, assured that surface water would not reach the foundation under the stairs.

Within a week, Knowles Industrial Services Corporation from Gorham, Maine was on site sealing the old foundation using a product called "shot-crete" (a combination of concrete and silica) that was blown in under pressure to the hollows and spaces of the existing foundation. After the foundation was sealed and smoothed, a rubber coating was applied to ensure an impermeable surface. The surface was then protected from damage from backfilling by yellow fibrous boards. The crew from Knowles completed their part of the project in three days.

By June 30, Mathewson Construction was back on site finishing the footing drain, installing drain risers at the front of the building, installing crushed rock, fabric and compacting sand. As this article is written, Mathewson expects to be done with the backfill and finish grade out back and rough finish grade out front, weather permitting, by the 7th of July.

Too often we fail to mention the men in the trenches, the boots on the ground who actually get the work done. To the team from Mathewson, Dwayne Rector (Site Foreman), P J Pickard (Excavator), Joe Ellis (Excavator, Ten Wheeler) and Hunter Mathewson, our thanks. In addition, to the special team from Knowles Industrial Services in Maine, composed of Bruce, George, Eric and Jacob, we extend our thanks for your work.

We have been very fortunate with fair weather, experiencing only one heavy rain storm that was easily contained. This has been a great team project thanks to the expertise and professionalism of Underwood Engineering, Mathewson Construction, Knowles Industrial Services and other subcontractors and the collaboration in oversight by Ray Cilley, Rick McQuade, Mike Borden and others. Most important, the staff and patrons of the Library have been very tolerant of this ongoing daily disruption. None of this would be possible without the strong support of you, the taxpayer and your vote at last March's Town meeting. It is great to see what can be accomplished when we work together as a team and nobody cares who gets the credit.



There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- » Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- » The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- » Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- » Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- » Never leave your grill unattended.
- » Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- » There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- » If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- » Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- » There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- » When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.


PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

FACTS

- ! July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ! Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

A reinvigorated Greenfield Sportsman's Club (GSC) has reconvened after a number of years. During the weekend of June 16 th and 17 th GSC put on a successful free trout fishing derby for 46 local children in the pond of the George Proctor Recreational Town Property. On Sunday, a miniature duck race was run in Rand Brook which members named, "The Beetle Duck Race" in honor of long time member Bill "Beetle" Bailey who passed away recently. The lucky winners of the duck race were, first place \$100, Chad Carbee, second place \$50, Carol Burgess and third place \$25, Chet Bowles.

Much work was done to prepare for the event. Over the years, significant erosion had occurred on Savage Road. GSC club members cut brush back and material was brought in to improve access. President of the club, Gary Russell donated many hours of time and the use of his bulldozer at a reduced rate to do the work.

History

The Greenfield Sportman's Club was created in 1946. When the property was purchased with support by a donation of Ralph Sayles. In 1953, the Greenfield Sportsmans Club was formed with the goal for the use of the property by sportsmen, outdoor activities, conservation and local youth. At one time there were 125 members in the club! For decades, the land was used for outdoor youth activities. A trout pond was dug in the late 1980's.

Looking Ahead

A forest management plan was prepared a year ago by Karla Allen, Greenfield Town Forester. In the late 1980's an article passed at town meeting to create a committee for a combination of GSC members and the Conservation Commission to oversee management of the property. A new committee has been formed and is reviewing the forest plan to outline future treatment of the property. Projects include connecting a hiking trail to the Fleck Conservation Area, wildlife habitat and timber improvement, a permanent wildlife opening and an outback camping area for boy scouts and other youth organizations. The mission of the GSC is "To Get Kids Outdoors."





LET'S GO TO THE FAIR - AGAIN ! THE NEW OAK PARK ASSOCIATION

In March of 1899, a notice was posted to re-organize the Oak Park Fair Association. While the old fair had ended in 1885, the intent was to hold a fair in September of 1899. A lot of interest was shown toward this endeavor. It was decided to sell stock at \$5 per share in other towns to generate income and stimulate interest in the fair. By April, the Association had been incorporated as "The New Oak Park Fair Association". The cost of the stock shares was increased to \$25 per share. By the end of April, stocks were selling rapidly.

August brought the sound of hammers at the fairgrounds. The cattle pens were over 400 feet in length altogether. Construction on the Floral Hall was to begin soon. There were some other buildings already up on the grounds. The half mile race track was in good shape. A board fence surrounded the entire park. A grand stand was also erected. And, a bandstand was a focal point.

The forty acres comprising Oak Park had previously been owned by H.H. Duncklee. The first Oak Park Fair Association was given use of this land by Mr. Duncklee for five years and he paid the taxes on the parcel. The New Oak Park Association bought his land from the Duncklee family.

A total of \$740 in purses was offered for all the races including a 2 1/4, 2.32 and 2 1/2 horse trots, a farmers' race, a running race, a bicycle race, a foot race and others. A game of baseball was held on the third day. There were also other amusements every day that were "clean entertainment". The officers of the Association were sparing no pains for the pleasure and convenience of the attendees. But the group was also acting conservatively. More about the the entertainment in another issue. Stay tuned !

Greetings from the Greenfield EDAC. "What is an EDAC" you say? Well I'm glad you asked!!! EDAC is an acronym for Economic Development Advisory Committee. One of our earliest observations was that progress for both existing and potential new businesses in our community was being hampered by the substandard internet connectivity options currently available in our area, and we chose to make this a primary focus for our efforts. Since then, we have been working with various private and public organizations to promote and pursue better internet broadband connectivity with both existing and potentially new services providers. Last year, our current provider (Fairpoint) improved connectivity to several areas of our town and began offering some improved services for both residents and businesses within the community. We continue to work with these service providers as well as Consolidated Communications (the recent acquirer of Fairpoint) to make

further improvements in this area. Near term plans are to invite Consolidated Communications to meet with us at their earliest convenience.

We have also been instrumental in bringing several governmental and regulatory changes to the attention of the township, resulting in new ordinances passed by the electorate of the town including:

- Adoption of NH RSA 79-E, a tax relief incentivization program to assist Greenfield residents and businesses to rehabilitate underused properties in specifically zoned areas.
- Changes in zoning ordinances and regulations that would make certain areas of the town more attractive and useful to business use.

At present, we are working on outreach ideas to assist existing businesses in town to become more prosperous and to attract potential new businesses to our area. Foremost among these is to enhance the new town website with additional information that would be useful to a new business considering locating in Greenfield or to an existing business to expand their presence in our community. We are also investigating the possibility for periodic events to be held in town as a way to promote awareness and networking amongst existing businesses in the Greenfield area.
