This year the voters of Greenfield were very frugal and voted down a number of warrant articles in hopes of lowering the tax rate. The end result may be as much as 76 cents per thousand lower.

At the end of the evening, the voters approved a warrant article which asks the selectmen to appoint interested citizens to a wage and personnel study committee with the object of returning to next town meeting with a recommendation on establishing a wage & pay grid for all town employees. Greenfield Artist Wins National Award

Carol Sanchioni Laughner, resident of Greenfield, NH, has been selected as a winner for her 2003 Holiday Card design in the 2004 American Graphic Design Awards, a nationwide graphics communication competition.

The competition generated more than 10,000 entries and less than 10 percent of them were selected as winners. The entries were evaluated by nine professionals from design firms across the country. The American Graphic Design Awards, now celebrating its 25th anniversary year, is conducted by Graphic Design:usa magazine. The awards are increasingly perceived as the freshest, fastest growing and most democratic of all design recognition programs.

The annual issue was published in December in magazine format instead of a regular December issue, and then will be reproduced in hard cover book form for release early next summer as part of the 25th year celebration. Laughner's card design will be represented in both versions of the annuals. The original drawing for the design was done in oil pastel, and depicts her dachshund, Lilly. It was used for the artist's annual 2003 holiday card mail-

Glidden First Student to Compete



On December 11, 2004 12 year old Edward Glidden (#136) of Greenfield competed in the 2004 USATF National Junior Olympics in Schaumburg, Illinois. Edward, a seventh grade student at South Meadow School, was the first SMS student to ever compete at the Cross Country Nationals in the Midget Boy Division (ages 11-12), competing against the top qualifying boys in his age group from all 50 states. Edward had a fantastic season at South Meadow this year, finishing consistently in the top five runners of each race. His success and love of the sport is due to the dedication and encouragement of his SMS Coach, Wendy Dunning and his Granite State Flash Coaches, Cathy Merra and Joanne Dow. Edward competed in several other running events during the year, including the New England Junior Olympic Cross Country Championships at Freestyle Farm in Amherst, NH and the Millennium Mile in Londonderry, where he finished the fourth fastest 12 year old boy. He also participates in the local Winter Chiller series in Peterborough and Freeze Your Buns races in Nashua. Watch for Edward on one of his regular five mile runs along Forest Road.

KNITTING WITHOUT THE NEEDLES!

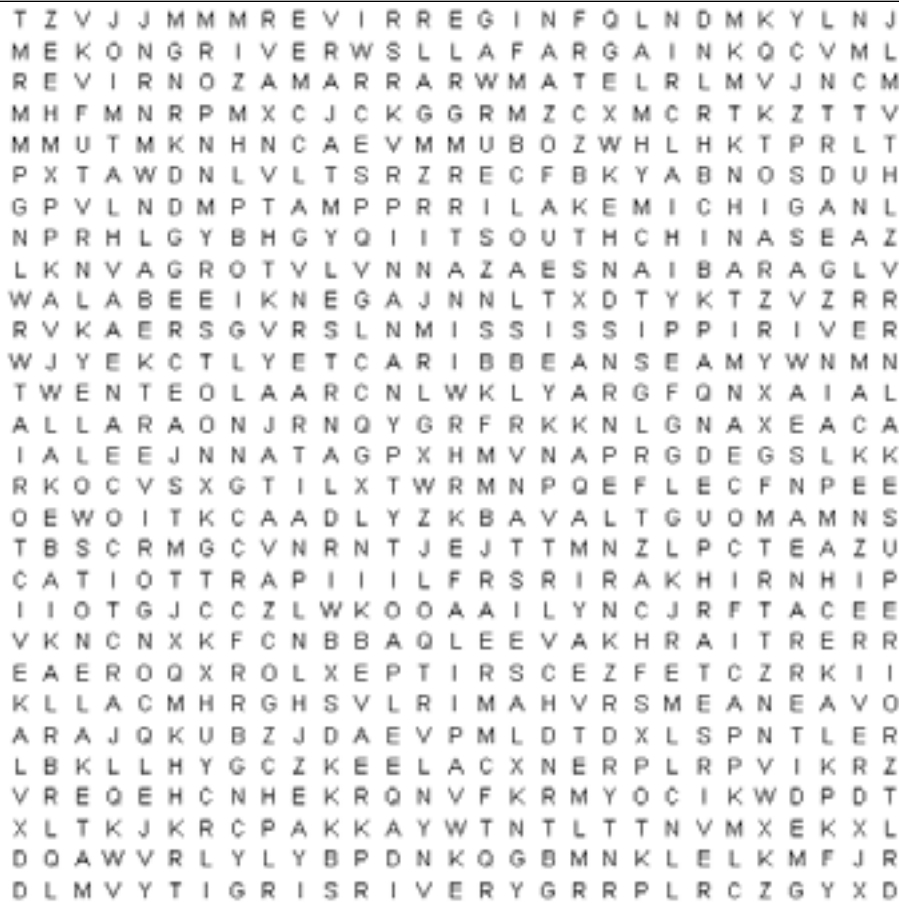

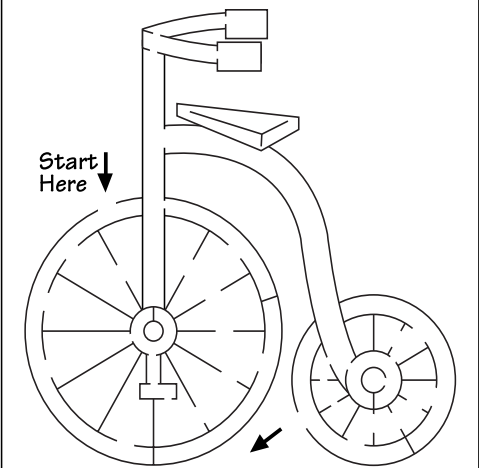
Wordsearch Puzzle

Greenfield Winter Carnival

On Saturday, February 5, 2005 the Town of Greenfield celebrated its annual Winter Carnival. The day began at 8:30 with a breakfast served at the Meeting House by the volunteer Fire Department.



At 10:00 a.m. an Ice Fishing Workshop was conducted at the Crotched Mountain Lakeside Community Center building with a nice wood fire in the fireplace. Following basic instructions the students and town children took to the ice - about 40 in all. The winning prize catch was a 4 pound, 14.5 inch small mouth bass caught by Lauren Bezio of Bennington and Nicole Tatro of Hillsborough. The two 9 year olds each took home some of Crotched Mountain's prize winning maple syrup. Ice fishing continued all day under the watchful eye of instructor Mel Rossi of Greenfield, while Lauren and Nicole entertained the fishermen with their renditions of some teenage music. Mel built the universally accessible bob house for Crotched Mountain last year.



Ice skating continued all day with sleds and tubes for non-skaters. Off

and on there were about a half dozen students/clients on the ice in one activity or another.



The GIVers served lunch downtown. The annual chili cookoff at the C.M. Community Center satisfied the hunger of 85 students, staff and townspeople. Verizon DSL in Greenfield

Despite Verizon's statement to the NH PUC last August, "Verizon has absolutely no plans to ever offer DSL service in Greenfield," Verizon has relented and DSL is now available in Greenfield. One cautionary note, however, you must be within 18,000 feet of the station (that little building across from the Library). This is a little more than 3 miles.

Unfortunately, some residents invested quite a lot of money in other ways to get better service going on the assumption that Greenfield would never have DSL. That investment is now a waste

unless you are outside the mileage limit. The good news is that the Town Office has gotten DSL. This will improve the service for town business. Check page 2 for changes in Town Office addresses.

District 2 Voter Alliance Annual Meeting

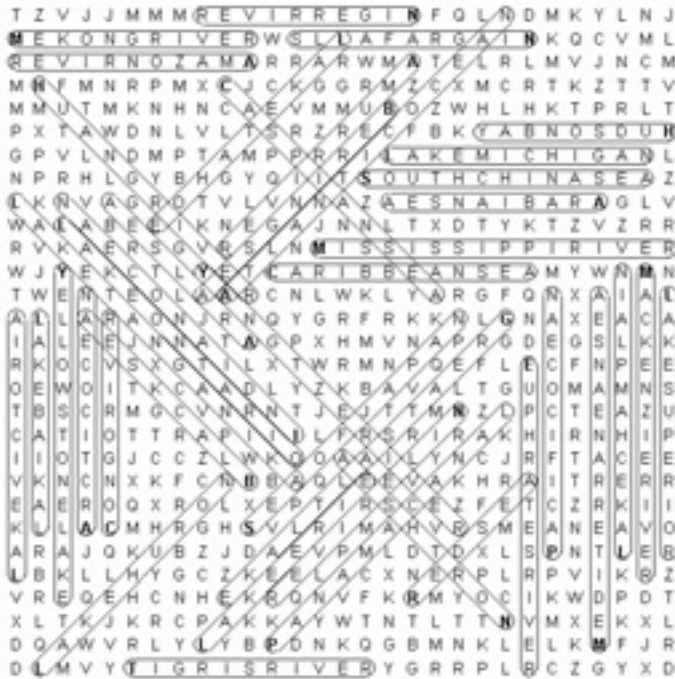

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The Piscataquog Watershed Association urges you to learn to identify and control these problem plants in your area.



Purple Loosestrife
(*Lythrum salicaria*)



Bad Habits: Rapid reproduction leads to loss of plant and wildlife diversity in nearly any soil but especially in wetlands.

Look For: Monocultures of spiked pink/purple flowers have a 4 to 6 sided stem and growing to six feet; leaves are directly opposite on stems; flowers have 5 to 7 petals and bloom in July and August. (Native loosestrifes bloom purple but flowers are clustered in upper axils.)

Management:

- 1) Dig small outbreaks of plants, placing in dark bags and responsibly disposing of bags. Dig carefully to remove all root matter and watch for new plants every year.
- 2) In large areas use of biological control measures (*Galerucella* beetles) have been effective.
- 3) Carefully remove and dispose of flower heads before they go to seed, then dig out the plants.
- 4) If number of plants is small, 20 or fewer, but plants are large and they are not in a wetland area, "paint" a glyphosate herbicide on cut stems.

Native Alternatives: Joe Pye weed, cardinal flower, gayfeather, obedient plant, blue vervain.
