

GREENFIELD TRAILS ASSOCIATION

MUD SEASON IS UPON US!!

The GTA would like to ask local trail users to refrain from motorized and high impact trail use during mud season, although it can be fun and is known to be a favorite past time "booning", "mudding", "wheeling", and "off roading" is very harmful and has destroyed many Class VI roads and trails in our area. Rose and Winn Mountains are evidence of such abuse. Please, wait until the ground is firm before going out on the trails. We Thank You for keeping our trails beautiful.

Boy, oh boy, are we going to be busy this year! We have received a grant from the State of NH to build two large bridges. One of the bridges is located on Kathy and Steve Seigars' property and is 75 feet in length, the other is located on Ruth and Bob Jennings' property and will be just as long! Adding these two bridges will make both of these trails more easily accessible and more environmentally friendly. Currently both areas are very wet and muddy! Thank you to the Seigars and Jennings families for giving the Trails Association permission to go forward with these projects.

Trail Work Days

Due to the high winds this winter, there is plenty of trail maintenance ahead of us! We have plenty of tools but could use people to operate them! Our first work party will be on April 9th 7:30am. We will work for 2-3 hours cleaning trails of debris. Meet us at the Town Hall parking lot. Bring gloves. Rain date is April 16th.

We are looking for red oak timber! New England Forest Products has offered to mill lumber for us at cost. This lumber will allow us to build more bridges and signs. This offer is a great opportunity for the GTA and landowners looking to make a contribution to their community. If you are willing to donate 4 or more trees we would appreciate it! Another work in progress is a trail map of the Greenfield area trail system. We continue to GPS the existing trails and hope to have this project completed by 2007!





In May and June, mother turtles are crossing the road when they seek higher ground to lay their eggs. Please avoid hitting them and if possible, you

might want to help the turtle cross the road - but remember always to move turtles in the direction they are headed. If they are moved back to the side they came from, they will just try to cross the road again. Once the eggs hatch be on the watch out for babies crossing the road headed for the water. Sawmill Road and Zephyr Lake Road are two areas that see a lot of turtle traffic - so, be careful!

The Conservation Commission

CROTCHED MOUNTAIN SCHOOL

The students at Crotched Mountain designed and constructed an electronic story board displaying fifteen of the most prevalent invasive plants in the Piscataquog Watershed.

Invasive plants are plants which are not native to the area and tend to crowd out many of our beautiful native species, often causing their death. Invasive plants are introduced in many ways including boats, humans, birds, wind, etc. We cannot eliminate them but with some effort we can control them and render them considerably less harmful.

The invasive plants committee of the Piscataquog Watershed Association (PWA) is working with our students on a plan to tackle these pesky growths. On Monday night at a meeting sponsored by the Francestown Garden Club

the new story board debuted at a joint presentation by PWA representatives Lyn Lombard and Hannah Proctor with the Francestown Land Trust, Conservation Commission and Garden Club. The story board is an interactive display enabling citizens to self test their knowledge of invasive plants, as well as learn more about the plants. The PWA intends to spend a couple of work days in the spring on Crotched Mountain assisting students in identification and control of invasives on the mountain.

The new story board will continue its community visits to approximately ten more towns in the Watershed including Greenfield. *Jim Orr*







OPEN SPACE COMMITTEE

Economic Benefits of Retaining Open Space. People in many New Hampshire communities assume that there is a lot of truth to the conventional wisdom that you can grow your way out of a tax problem by developing more land to help pay for municipal costs. The weakness of this view is that it overlooks the costs for municipal services needed for newly developed properties. There are a lot of good reasons to conserve open space. In many towns, there is a strong economic incentive, because municipal costs associated with open space are much lower than the costs associated with land for residential use. More and more New Hampshire communities are recognizing the economic benefits of open space conservation and are using these benefits as an argument in support of appropriations for conservation. Statewide and local studies have consistently demonstrated the value of open space for our economy and for our property tax base. For instance, a study conducted for the Squam Lakes Association looked at all 234 incorporated townships in the state and found that, on average, the towns with the most open space have the lowest property tax bills. Cost of community services studies conducted in many parts of the state have found that the income from open space is always greater than the cost of services for the open space. The reverse is true of residential property - it almost never generates enough income to pay for the services it requires.

Tax implications of residential growth. Many community leaders and citizens are also learning that on average, new residential development does not pay enough in property taxes to cover the cost of town and school services demanded by the new residents. Cost of community services studies completed in Stratham, Exeter, Dover, and other communities show that for every \$1.00 received in property taxes from residences, a community incurs between \$1.01 and \$1.17 in costs for services. In contrast, for every \$1.00 received in taxes from open space lands (forests, farms, etc.), a community pays between just \$0.19 and \$0.94 for the services required. Keeping important land as open space, through zoning, conservation easements, or town acquisition, can help stabilize a community's property taxes.

The future for Greenfield. People today are willing to commute further to have that rural environment to live in. Our town is no longer isolated, protected, and beyond where we could be affected by the sprawl of the Merrimack valley. Keeping in mind the now-accepted facts about how development drives up tax rates, the Greenfield Conservation Commission is starting an Open Space Committee. TOM TYNING AMPHIBIAN SLIDE SHOW AND WETLANDS SEARCH

Tom is famous for his wonderful show on amphibians. He makes the wetlands world come alive with an in-depth talk on frogs and salamanders that is serious but hilarious. After the show, he takes everyone out to a nearby marsh to find and see some of the amphibians he talked about in the show. Tom Tyning is a professional field naturalist and writer. He is currently Assistant Professor of Environmental Sciences at Berkshire Community College. For 24 years he served as Herpetologist and Master Naturalist for the Massachusetts Audubon



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

The Greenfield, New Hampshire Historical Society was formed September 10, 1973 by a group of residents interested in bringing together people who had an interest in history, particularly Greenfield's history, and the preservation of the heritage of Greenfield.

The Society continued to grow and persevered in its dedication to its purpose. It contributed to the life of the town with Christmas open houses at various Greenfield homes that have historic backgrounds, the Society's annual June Fair with the historic themes pertaining to Greenfield and other important times such as the two hundredth anniversary of the town's incorporation. The Society received many documents and artifacts relative to Greenfield. Many of the paper documents were preserved in acid free mylar pockets, and with other physical artifacts were stored in several homes in Greenfield as well as the basement of the town library. This was not easily accessible and inadequate for the Society's needs. So when the library needed the room the Society moved out.

The next step was to get a building for the Society. This took a lot of work and many years of planning. Robert and Frances Blaisdell of Pennsylvania contacted the president and presented the Historical Society with a gift of a house in Concord, Massachusetts. Their intent was to donate the house to the Society to sell with the proceeds to go toward the building of a museum for the Society. Frances traces her roots back to the Fitch and Peavey families in Greenfield. The Society's building committee searched long and hard for the right place for the museum. 828 Forest Road was chosen after a great deal of research, and with the help of the town to procure the land, it is the location of the museum today.

All the artifacts and paper documents were moved in to the building starting in October 2004. The Society and volunteers are busy at work trying to get every-thing documented and cataloged. Many paper documents need to be put in mylar
