Loren White Steps Down from his Position as Fire Chief

GFD members salute his years of dedication and service.

In December, fire department Chief Loren White announced to department members and the selectmen that he would be stepping down from his position as fire chief, a position that he has held for seven years.

I had occasion to ask Loren a few questions. Because of space constraints, below are his abbreviated answers.

Linda: How did you come to be a member of the fire department?

Loren: I joined the fire service in Amherst, NH in 1979. One day after we purchased our home in Greenfield in 1984, I noticed that the department was across the street cleaning a chimney (back when it was permissible), so I went over to inquire if they had any openings on the department. The initial response was a bit of laughter, then I was told that I could apply for any of the 13 or so openings.

Linda: You are retiring as Fire Chief and president of the Greenfield Firefighters Association, how long was your tenure?

Loren: I was appointed as acting chief in 1999 and then elected in 2000 so I call it seven years. I've been president of the Firefighters Association since 2003, three years.

Linda: What other positions have you held here and in Amherst?

Loren: Treasurer, Lieutenant, Captain, Board of Review, Training officer, Deputy Chief and Acting Chief.

Linda: What is your favorite memory of GFD?

Loren: It would be difficult to select just one with all the great times I've had and new friends that I've made from within the department and its affiliations. One fun memory, in particular, would be the first muster that we attended in Brookline, NH where the annual Souhegan Valley Muster was being held. We were not a member of the association at the time but were welcome to participate without being eligible for the traveling trophy that is awarded to the association member team with the most points for the day. Well wouldn't you know it, we cleaned up that day with 3 first

place finishes and one each second and a third place. As I recall, it created quite a stir. We graciously acknowledged, with the greatest of pride, that we could not receive the trophy for overall points.

Linda: Another memory?

Loren: I fondly remember all the fundraising events we held as the "Greenfield Firefighters Association". During my time as an active member, we have been acquired and refurbished a used fire truck, purchased our first set of "The Jaws of Life" and much, much more.

Linda: Anything else you would like to share about GFD members or the department?

Loren: I must say how grateful I am for having been Chief for such a terrific group of individuals. The support of each

member has been awesome. I am very proud to note that this department is highly regarded by other departments in so many ways.

Linda: What will you do with your spare time?

Loren: I will certainly be able to spend more time with my family and friends as well as finish a number of projects at home.

Linda: Where do you work and who are your family members?

Loren: I am married to Wendy and we have two daughters, Miranda - 17 and Natasha - 13. I've been employed by Blue Seal Feeds, Inc. in Milford for 23 years, presently as Asst. Manager.

Linda: What do you like doing outside of work?

Loren: Any recreational motor-sports, camping and helping friends with projects. I'm presently vice president of the local snowmobiling club, the Crotched Mountain Ridge Runners, and I currently head-up the Souhegan Valley Muster Association. I have been on the Zoning Board of Appeals for several years and have been serving on the local "Juvenile Diversion Committee" with pleasure.

Linda: Can you tell a little about the MAFCA?

Loren: I'm very proud to have been the driving force behind resurrecting the meetings of the area fire chiefs. This group has formalized itself as an association called the "Monadnock Area Fire Chiefs Association. One of my goals with the MAFCA is to get a membership drive activity going in the high schools.

Linda: Will you stay active with GFD?

Loren: Absolutely, it is in my blood so to speak. I hope to

be able to continue representing the department in as many ways as I can. I have really enjoyed working with others to improve the way we provide emergency services. I expect to be able to put more time into these efforts. I am looking forward to being able to participate in a hands-on role.

Linda: Anything else you want to share?

CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING - THE SILENT KILLER

You cannot see, smell or taste carbon monoxide, but at high levels it can kill a person in minutes. Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced whenever any fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood, or charcoal is burned. If appliances that burn fuel are maintained and used properly, the amount of CO produced is usually not hazardous. However, if appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly, like in a closed or partially closed space, dangerous levels of CO can result. Carbon monoxide poisoning is dangerous. When there is too much carbon monoxide in the air, your body will replace the oxygen in the hemoglobin of your red blood cells with carbon monoxide. This keeps life-sustaining oxygen from reaching your tissues and organs.

Various appliances fueled produce carbon monoxide, including:

- Fuel-burning space heaters
- Furnaces
- Charcoal grills
- Cooking ranges
- Water heaters
- Fireplaces
- Portable generators
- Wood-burning stoves
- Car and truck engines

Even swimming behind a motorboat or riding in the back of an enclosed pickup truck can be dangerous. Simple precautions can save your life!

Signs & Symptoms

- Dull headache
- Dizziness

- Nausea
- Vomiting
- Chest pain
- Confusion
- Irritability
- Impaired judgment
- Loss of consciousness

Seek medical advice

If you suspect you have been exposed to carbon monoxide, get into fresh air immediately and call 911. If possible, open windows and doors on the way out of the house. Carbon monoxide poisoning can be fatal.

Diagnosis

If the doctor suspects carbon monoxide poisoning, he or she will take a blood sample to measure the amount of carbon monoxide in your blood.

Treatment

The goal of treatment is to replace the carbon monoxide in your blood with oxygen. In the hospital, you may breathe pure oxygen through a mask placed over your nose and mouth. This helps oxygen reach your organs and tissues.

In some cases, hyperbaric oxygen therapy is recommended. With this therapy, you are placed in a full-body pressurized chamber. Inside the chamber, air pressure is more than twice as high as normal atmospheric pressure. This speeds the removal of carbon monoxide from your blood.

If you were poisoned in your home, it is important to find and repair the source of the carbon monoxide before you return. Your local fire department or utility company can help.

Prevention

Simple precautions can help prevent

carbon monoxide poisoning.

- Invest in carbon monoxide detectors. Install a carbon monoxide detector on every level of your home. Install additional detectors outside individual bedrooms. Check the batteries every time you check your smoke detector batteries - at least twice a year. If the alarm sounds, leave the house and call the fire department or local utility company from a nearby phone.

- Open the garage door before starting your car. Never run your car in a closed garage. If you have an attached garage, keep the garage door open and the door to the house firmly closed while the car is running. Remove snow or other debris from the tailpipe before using the car.

- Use gas appliances as recommended. Never use a gas stove or oven to heat your home. Use portable gas camp stoves only outdoors. Use fuel-burning space heaters only when someone is awake to monitor them and doors or windows are open to provide fresh air. Don't run a generator in an enclosed space, such as the basement or garage.

- Keep your gas appliances and fireplace in good repair. Make sure your appliances are properly vented. Clean your fireplace chimney and flue every year. Ask your utility company about yearly checkups for any gas appliances.

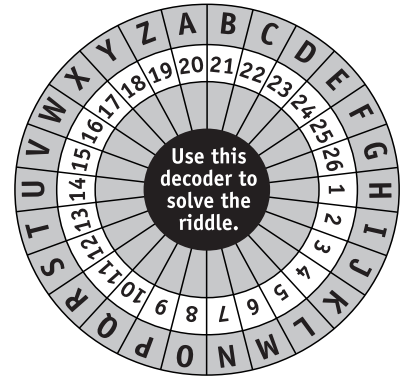

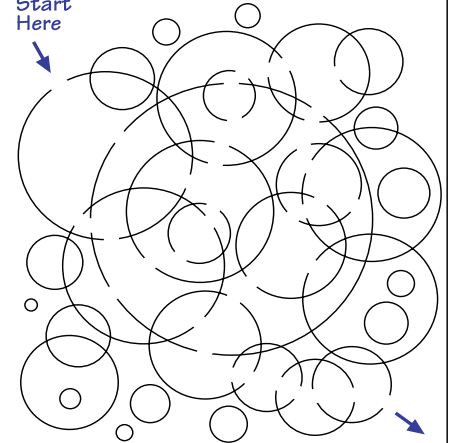

DALOZ FARM CSA

It's almost spring and things are beginning to happen at the Daloz Farms CSA (Community Supported Agriculture). The leeks, onions and shallots have been planted and if we have a few more warm days the hoop house should be ready to put in some early spring veggies like lettuce, mache and spinach.

We have hired a new fun time gardener named Abby Holm and two part time gardeners, Terry and Hugh Landis. All are wonderfully qualified to take over the farm from Charlie and produce a huge array of certified organic vegetables. This of course doesn't mean Charlie won't be around. Quite to the contrary, he's taking a less active role in the veggie production of the farm and will concentrate on expanding the mill and doing a lot of other farm related educational things. So the farm is growing and changing and we hope to double our number of shareholders to 80.

It's now time to think of joining our Hancock CSA. What is a CSA?

It is a relationship of mutual support and commitment between farmers and community members. It implies a willingness to share both the bounty from the land and some of the risks involved with production. It is a way to build community, share in the stewardship of the land, support your local farmers and by buying locally, improve the economy. It also offers the opportunity to reconnect with the rhythms of nature by eating produce when it is locally in season. Since no fertilizers or pesticides are used, ground water pollution and toxic residue on food are avoided. All in all, it's a good thing. We've devised three tiers of cost for subscription/membership:

"Support the Farm" Share - \$1,000 (\$43/week) This subscription entitles the shareholder to twice a week pick up at the farm. This share is for individuals and families who would like to help subsidize our operation and to assist in offering our farmers a living wage.

"Family Share" \$600 (\$27/week) This is for the family and entitles the shareholders to a twice week pick up.

"Individual Share" \$450 (\$19.50 a

week). This entitles the shareholder to once a week pick up, either Saturday or Tuesday.

"Add-ons" Throughout the growing season we will have available from Sunnyfield Farm, organic meat, pork, chicken and milk. If your interested in purchasing these products, please attach a note to your membership request. Fire Department Safety Tips Continued

BUT NOT AS A REPLACEMENT for proper use and maintenance of your fuel-burning appliances. However, it is important for you to know that the technology of CO detectors is still developing, that there are several types on the market, and that they are not generally considered to be as reliable as the smoke detectors found in homes today. Some CO detectors have been laboratory-tested, and their performance varied. Some performed well, others failed to alarm even at very high CO levels, and still others alarmed even at very low levels that do not pose any immediate health risk. Unlike a smoke detector, where you can easily confirm the cause of the alarm, CO is invisible and odorless, so it is harder to tell if an alarm is false or a real emergency. Don't guess, get out and call 911.

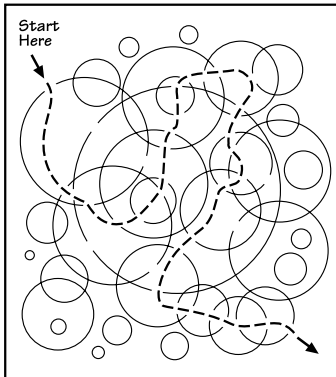

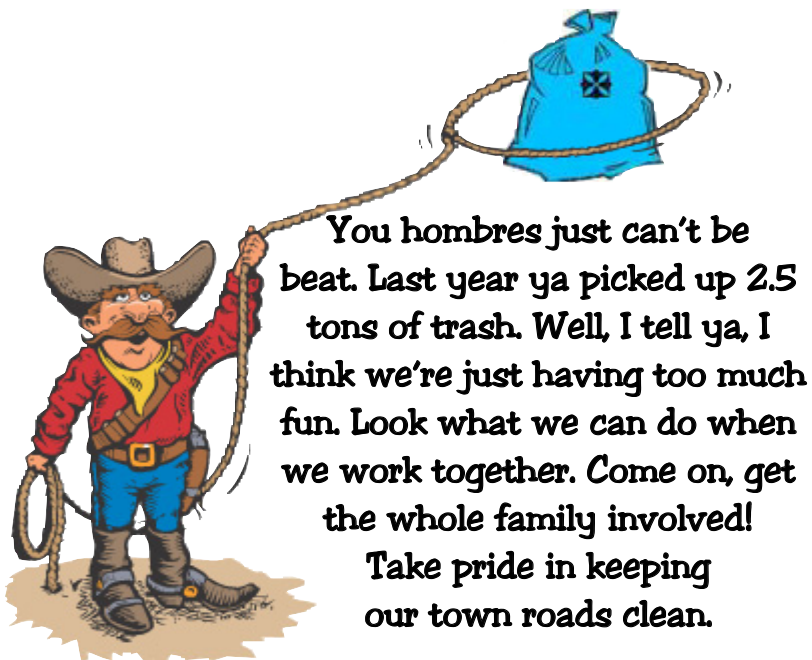
