SAWMILL ROAD PROPERTY AUCTIONED

On March 27th, a 2 apartment Sawmill Road property was auctioned for taxes. The property brought \$43,000 which was almost what the town had in it, falling short by only \$71. Most of the \$43,000 was owed for taxes and the rest was administrative costs that had been incurred during the tax deeding process which the town is allowed to be reimbursed for.

In order to bid on the property, a prospective buyer must have a \$5000 down payment. This qualifies the prospective buyer as a serious buyer and gives him/her the right to walk through the property before the sale to decide whether to buy or not. Once the bidding is over, anyone who does not get the property receives his/her check back. If the winning bidder cannot raise the remainder of the money in 45 days, then the deal falls through and can go to the next highest bidder. Banks do not traditionally lend money on tax deeded property so a buyer has to come to the sale prepared to buy with cash.

Once the bidding started on Saturday, the bids went quickly to \$40,000 but slowed, and it looked like it wouldn't go any higher but it finally rose to \$43,000. In this case, there were only two bidders, the winner being Richard Clark from Peterborough. Mr. Clark has already requested a closing as soon as possible.

GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Frost heaves and mud. What a combination. Almost every year, the roads will become a challenge to drive on. The paved roads heave or have small sinkholes as the frost comes out of them. Different materials under the highways react in various ways to the freeze and thaw cycle.

Most of our roads around here are over poor quality sub-surface materials. Clays and hardpan hold water and turn to a pudding consistency when the frost comes out. In warm weather they harden when dry and ooze when soaked by too much water.

When the first settlers came to town they tried to use the high ground to travel on, avoiding the boggy lower lands, even though on foot or horseback.

Mostly the roads were enlarged trails, just large enough for a horse or an ox with a cart. Blazes on trees marked the way to settlers homes.

One of the first major roads included part of County Road. This road came from the area of what is now Keene and was made to encourage settlement in this area in the early 1800's. Another major road, now Forest Road ran from Nashua to Charlestown.

As the population increased, better highways were built. These allowed wagons and eventually stagecoaches over them for high speed travel. For this, the flatter lower grounds were used to make it easier hauling large freight.

These roads were widened, smoothed some, and logs were put down across marshy areas to roll over. In the streams and brooks, logs were put across to form crude bridges.

After the town was incorporated, districts were formed to take care of the roads. A person from each district was appointed as Surveyor of Highways and Collector of Taxes. Men over the age of 21 were charged a poll tax (spelled pole in town history). They could work off their taxes by helping maintain the roads. Not much cash was available at the time, so labor for taxes was very common.

In 1899 a snow roller, at the cost of \$75, was purchased. Pulled by two to three teams of horses it packed down a twelve foot wide roadway. Dr. Richard Miner told me that when he was a young man, the snow roller was sold. He could have bought it from the town for one dollar. No one bought it and Dr. Miner said it rotted behind the Meeting House as it sat outside by the horse barn there.

The Historical Society's general meeting will be at the Historical Society Museum at 7:00 pm. A brief business meeting will be held. Following the meeting there will be a program. The date and program details are still being worked out.

The May general meeting is for the election of officers and accepting the budget that was proposed in April. Edie Clark will be our guest speaker. It is great to have a local speaker provided by the NH Humanities Council. It will be at 7:00 pm at the Meeting House. There will be a short business starting at 6:45 pm. Everyone is welcomed.

RECYCLING CENTER NEWS

Two of the components of the recycling circle are "reuse" and "reduce". The practice of these two things will create less product to recycle. The market prices for recyclable materials are still not up to their 2008 levels, but according to the NRRA bi-weekly market news on 3/8/10, mixed paper, comingled plastics (#1-7), steel and aluminum prices per gross ton are slowly and steadily going up. This is good news, and hopefully we will see some revenue from recycling again one day soon. In the mean time, by

reusing and reducing our use of plastic containers, bags and glass jars, it will reduce the quantity of that which we have to market.

With this in mind, here are some helpful reusing and reducing hints, with thanks from pennypinchinggrandma.com, and some town folks:

- Reuse cereal boxes or tissue boxes by attaching them to the inside of a cupboard door with tacks and store plastic grocery and produce bags in them.
- Reuse paper towel rolls to store extension cords.
- Reuse cardboard egg boxes by combining melted wax and sawdust, fill the egg cartons with this mix and make a wick from string then tear off a few of these to start the woodstove or fireplace, rather than newspaper. Egg boxes also make great planters in which to start seedling. The sections can go in the ground with the seedling; they are biodegradable.
- Reuse pint and quart plastic containers at least several times to store or freeze leftovers. Every time you reuse rather than buy plastic containers, the need to make new product is impacted. Turn plastic bags inside out, wash, dry and reuse them too. It will save on your grocery bill to not have to buy those expensive storage products regularly. Most grocery store plastic bag recycling bins will take clean produce bags and deli bags as well as any other thin bags. Grocery store receptacles are the best way to recycle plastic bags, because Shaw's, DeMoulas and Hannaford's all have their own processing facilities to shred and bale the plastic bags for marketing by the ton. Grocery store plastic bags are used primarily to make composite lumber used for outdoor construction, such as the TRAX brand. Even though the town of Greenfield does gather a lot of bags at the recycling center, it's not nearly enough to market, so taking them when you go to the grocery store is much more effective and they DO get recycled. Ask the store manager if you're not sure if the market you use recycles their bags. Using cloth bags is great

YOU ARE WHAT YOU EAT!

Glossary of Commonly Used Meat
and Poultry Additives and Terms
Brought to you by the U.S.
Department of Agriculture, Food
Safety and Inspection Service

ANTIOXIDANT - substances added to foods to prevent the oxygen present in the air from causing undesirable changes in flavor or color. BHA, BHT, and tocopherols are examples of antioxidants.

BHT (butylated hydroxytoluene),
BHA (butylated hydroxyanisole),
TOCOPHEROLS (VITAMIN E) -
antioxidants that help maintain the
appeal and wholesome qualities of
food by retarding rancidity in fats,
sausages, and dried meats, as well as
helping to protect some of the natural
nutrients in foods, such as vitamin A.

BINDER - a substance that may be added to foods to thicken or improve texture.

BROMELIN - an enzyme that can dissolve or degrade the proteins collagen and elastin to soften meat and poultry tissue. It is derived from pineapple fruit and leaves, and is used as a meat tenderizer.

CARRAGEENAN - seaweed is the source of this additive. It may be used in products as binder.

CITRIC ACID - widely distributed in nature in both plants and animals. It can be used as an additive to protect the fresh color of meat cuts during storage. Citric acid also helps protect flavor and increases the effectiveness of antioxidants.

CORN SYRUP - sugar that is derived

dons, ligaments, or bones of livestock. It may be used in canned hams or jellied meat products.

HUMECTANT - substance added to foods to help retain moisture and soft texture. An example is glycerine, which may be used in dried meat snacks.

HYDROLYZED (SOURCE) PROTEIN - flavor enhancers that can be used in meat and poultry products. They are made from protein obtained from a plant source such as soy or wheat, or from an animal source, such as milk. The source used must be identified on the label. Such as Hydrolyzed Soy Protein or Hydrolyzed Milk Protein.

MODIFIED FOOD STARCH - starch that has been chemically altered to improve its thickening properties. Before the starch is modified, it is separated from the protein through isolation techniques; therefore, the source of the starch used is not required on the label.

MONOSODIUM GLUTAMATE (MSG) - MSG is a flavor enhancer. It comes from a common amino acid, glutamic acid, and must be declared as monosodium glutamate on meat and poultry labels.

PAPAIN - an enzyme that can dissolve or degrade the proteins collagen and elastin to soften meat and poultry tissue. It is derived from the tropical papaya tree and is used as a meat tenderizer.

PHOSPHATES - the two beneficial effects of phosphates in meat and poultry products are moisture retention and flavor protection. An example is the use of phosphates in the curing of ham where approved additives are sodium or potassium salts of tripolyphosphate, hexametaphosphate, acid pyrophosphate, or orthophosphates, declared as "phosphates" on labels.

PROPYL GALLATE - used as an antioxidant to prevent rancidity in products such as rendered fats or pork sausage. It can be used in combination with antioxidants such as BHA and

BHT.

RANCID/RANCIDITY - oxidation/breakdown of fat that occurs naturally causing undesirable smell and taste. BHA/BHT and tocopherols are used to keep fats from becoming rancid.

SODIUM CASEINATE - used as a binder in products such as frankfurters and stews.

SODIUM ERYTHORBATE - is the sodium salt of erythorbic acid, a highly refined food-grade chemical closely related to vitamin C, synthesized from sugar, and used as a color fixative in preparing cured meats.

SODIUM NITRITE - used alone or in conjunction with sodium nitrate as a color fixative in cured meat and poultry products (bologna, hot dogs, bacon). Helps prevent growth of *Clostridium botulinum*, which can cause botulism in humans.

SUGAR (SUCROSE) - used as sweetener in an endless list of food products.

TEXTURIZERS/STABILIZERS/THICKENERS - used in foods to help maintain uniform texture or consistency. These are substances that are commonly called binders. Examples are gelatin and carrageenan.

Infant Deaths Prompt CPSC Warning About Sling Carriers for Babies

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is advising parents and caregivers to be cautious when using infant slings for babies younger than four months of age. In researching incident reports from the past 20 years, CPSC identified and is investigating at least 14 deaths associated with sling-style infant carriers, including three in 2009. Twelve of the deaths involved babies younger than four months of age.

Slings can pose two different types of suffocation hazards to babies. In the first few months of life, babies cannot control their heads because of weak neck muscles. The sling's fabric can press against an infant's nose and mouth, blocking the baby's breathing and rapidly suffocating a baby within a minute or two. Additionally, where a sling keeps the infant in a curled position bending the chin toward the chest, the airways can be restricted, limiting the oxygen supply. The baby will not be able to cry for help and can slowly suffocate.

Many of the babies who died in slings were either a low birth weight twin, were born prematurely, or had breathing issues such as a cold. Therefore, CPSC urges parents of preemies, twins, babies in fragile health and those with low weight to use extra care and consult their pediatricians about using slings.

Two months ago, the Commission added slings to the list of durable infant products that require a mandatory standard. Additionally, CPSC staff is actively investigating these products to determine what additional action may be appropriate. Until a mandatory standard is developed, CPSC is working with ASTM International to quickly complete an effective voluntary standard for infant sling carriers.

CPSC recommends that parents and caregivers make sure the infant's face is not covered and is visible at all times to the sling's wearer. If nursing the baby in a sling, change the baby's position after feeding so the baby's head is facing up and is clear of the sling and the mother's body. Parents and caregivers should be vigilant about frequently checking their baby in a sling.

If any of these "maybe's" ring your bell, come join us. We are ready to get you going with a great plot for a very nominal outlay. We think that we've got a great deal!

Greenfield Community Organic Garden Agreement, Guidelines and Rules

1. I agree to pay a yearly membership of \$5 as my support of the community garden.
2. To receive the exclusive right to use a wooden sided 4' X 8' raised bed, I agree to pay a one-time fee of \$50 to cover the cost of materials. This entitles me to the use of the bed for as many years as I desire to garden in it. This right to use is non transferable.
3. The exclusive right to use a 10' X 20' unimproved garden plot is available at no cost to members in good standing.
4. I understand that this is an ORGANIC garden and agree to NOT use chemical fertilizers, insecticides, weed herbicide or genetically engineered seeds/plants within the community garden area. The term chemical refers to anything that is not organic. Examples of chemicals are Miracle Grow and Roundup. If you are unsure of a product, please ask. Most organic products are marked "ORGANIC".
5. I agree that the garden produce is primarily for home consumption.
6. I agree to keep weeds in my garden site and pathways adjoining my site to a minimum.
7. I agree to NOT leave tools, equipment or personal item in the garden.
8. I agree to NOT establish any plants that are invasive such as mints, raspberries and bamboo. If in doubt, please ask.
9. I agree to participate in the fall cleanup of the garden.
10. I agree to NOT plant tall crops where they will shade neighboring garden sites.
11. I understand that NO fencing will be allowed other than to support plants in my garden site.
12. I agree that any guest(s) or child(ren) I bring to the garden will NOT intrude, impact or interfere with the enjoyment of other gardeners. Children will be under control at all times.
13. I agree to NOT bring pets of any kind into the garden.
14. I agree to inform the garden committee if at anytime I am unable to maintain my garden plot or decide to discontinue to work my garden plot.
15. I understand that breaking the rules, terms or conditions of the community garden agreement can be cause for exclusion from the garden and the loss of my garden plot.
16. I understand that neither the garden committee nor the town of Greenfield are responsible for my actions.

I THEREFORE AGREE TO HOLD HARMLESS THE GARDEN COMMITTEE AND THE TOWN OF GREENFIELD FOR ANY LIABILITY, DAMAGE, LOSS OR CLAIM THAT MAY OCCUR IN CONNECTION WITH THE USE OF THE GARDEN BY ME OR ANY OF MY GUESTS.

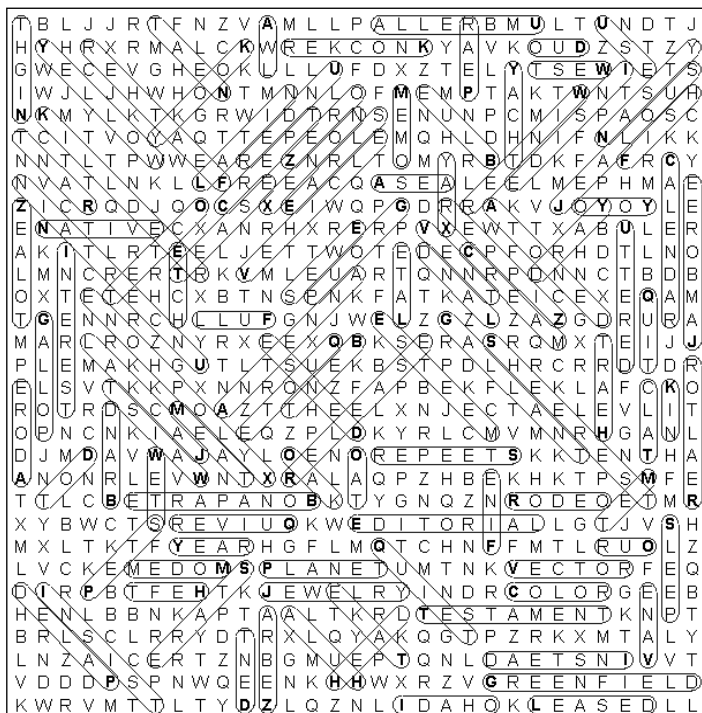

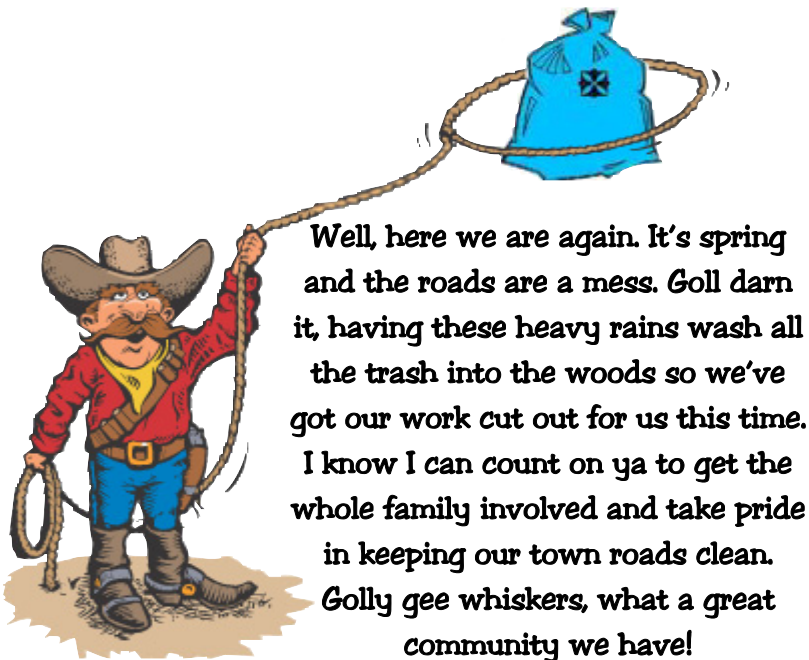
