CUSTOM PODIUM DONATED TO THE TOWN



For all those who weren't there...

Neal Brown presented the town of Greenfield a unique podium and gavel at town meeting on Mar. 15.

The podium and gavel were unveiled by Brown on behalf of the GIVers, a group of Greenfield residents that share a focus on giving back and improving their community.

"These are not just any off-the-shelf objects," read Brown to the Meeting House crowd as he removed the shroud. "They are connected to this Meeting House, because they are made from a maple tree that grew for more than 120 years just beyond that window," said Brown to a round of applause. The podium and gavel have multiple connections to the town as they were both constructed "right here in town." Construction of the gift was not completed overnight, taking years and the hands of many volunteers, according to Brown

The tree fell outside of the meeting

house in 2010. From there, the timber was sawn by Greenfield resident George Rainier. New England Forest Products kiln-dried and planed the wood free of charge. Then the planks of timber were set to rest for the winter in the historical society's new barn. A construction fund was established with the help of residents Ted and Jill Butler and GIVers Becky and Everett Reed. David Bridgewater, Greenfield resident and cabinetmaker, then went to work on turning the gavel and skillfully joining the planks. The final step was the podium's seal, which was carved and painted by a commercial vendor, following the design created by Elizabeth Robertson in 1991 for the towns bicentennial. The GIVers turned the podium and gavel over to the town in hopes that it will be used for future Greenfield town meetings. "To all in attendance, we GIVers hope that when you hear the crack of the gavel on this podium, you will be reminded of that noble tree from which they came," said Brown. GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

MAIL ON THE MOVE - Part One

The Post Office Department was established by the New Hampshire state legislature in 1786. It appears that post riders were appointed at this time for a northern and western route. Later, there were four routes in New Hampshire.

Bad roads interfered with not only travel and transportation, but also with the installation of a postal source. Outlying districts were served by post riders, who were given a monopoly of their routes. These riders received two pence per mile plus the postage collected. Rates were fixed for the first time by the Continental Congress in 1775.

Mail rates were very expensive for the times during the late 1790's. To send a single sheet letter within a thirty mile area, six cents was required. Such high rates, poor roadways and inadequate facilities made it expensive to communicate by mail. Therefore a lot of letters went with people who were traveling.

Under British and later, American control, the official postal system had a monopoly over transporting the mail. However, the jurisdiction was often ignored, and much of the mail delivery occurred illegally and profitably- "out of the mails" as it was termed. Clever means were utilized to avoid paying postage. Addresses on letters were arranged in code. After receiving and seeing a letter, the recipient might refuse to accept the piece of mail, thereby avoiding the payment of the postage due. Postage on newspapers was less and some folks sent these with letters or words marked, thus creating a message. Adhesive stamps were issued for the first time in 1847. Pre-paid stamps became compulsory in 1856. Since postage continued to be expensive for the times, few letters were mailed.

In the early days of postal service, mail traveled from Boston, MA, to Amherst, NH. For several years, mail was carried by horseback by a Captain Joseph Reynolds of Greenfield twice a week. Later, a wagon was utilized by another carrier. In the early 1800's, letters being held in the Amherst Post Office were sometimes published in the Farmer's Cabinet , now the Milford Cabinet newspaper.

Greenfield's first appointed past master was James Miller, who assumed the post in 1808. The initial post office furnishing for the town was a small cabinet piece containing twenty-four pigeon holes and a few drawers. One of the drawers was marked "letters". This small cabinet was easily portable and could be moved to a home or a shop when a new post master was appointed. This cabinet is on display and may be seen at the Society's Museum. Some of the names are still recognizable!

(The town history is the main resource for this information.)

Coming up in April will be a General Membership Meeting. This meeting will be held at the Museum on a Saturday. Following the meeting, we hope to be able to tour an historic building here in town. The exact date and time will appear on flyers, posted around town, as well as in the newspaper.

On May 22nd, 2014, we will host a NH Humanities Council Program, "Mapping the Merrimack: A Frontier Adventure into Uncharted Territory" presented by David Stewart-Smith. This discussion will be held in the Wensberg Room of the Stephenson Memorial Library beginning at 7 PM. Following a very brief business meeting prior to that at 6:45 PM, Mr. Stewart-Smith will give his presentation, touching upon the history of the establishment of the boundaries between New Hampshire and Massachusetts. Light refreshments will be offered afterward. There is no admission charge.

Are you a mystery lover? Our June, 2014, Ham & Bean Supper/Murder Mystery Evening should be great fun for all wanna be gumshoes, and most entertaining and delicious for everyone. The supper and murder mystery hijinks will be held at the Meeting House on a Saturday evening - date and time to be announced.

Our Annual June Fair Open House will be held on Saturday, June 7th, 2014, at the Museum from 10 AM until 2 PM. There will be some demonstrations of the old time crafts as well as the opportunity to explore our exhibits. If you are interested in demonstrating an historic craft, please call Jane at 547-2759. Once again, we hope to have the appraisal team from Knotty Pine Antiques informing you about your treasures.

RECYCLING CENTER NEWS

Here we are with Spring just about to pop. Warm days and sunshine gets our juices flowing, and we are eager to start those postponed projects that had to wait for good weather. When you get started, just remember to ask where your items should go and if there are fees associated with them.

SUMMER HOURS STARTING SOON:

DO YOU KNOW?

The first Earth Day was held in April of 1970. This was the result of the growing momentum of America's environmental movement that was emerging in high schools, colleges and communities across the country in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

About the same time the Container Corporation of America (CCA), a paperboard-packaging manufacturer, sponsored a contest to create a design that would symbolize the recycling process. CCA would use the symbol to identify packages made from recycled and recyclable fibers, and to promote paper recycling as an effective way to stretch our natural resources. At that time, CCA (now Smurfit-Stone Container Corporation), was the largest user of recycled fiber in the U.S., and easily could have asked its own coporate designers to create the symbol. Instead the company decided that the younger generation, as "inheritors of the earth", would be the best source for the new design, and invited environmentally concerned art and design students from across the country to enter the contest.

More than 500 students submitted entries, which were judged at the International Design Conference in Aspen, Colorado. The first place winner was Gary Dean Anderson, a graduate student at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. Anderson had just graduated from USC's 5-year architecture program and was completing one additional year for a Master's of Urban Design. His prize was a \$2,500 tuition grant for further study at any college or university in the world. After receiving his Master's Degree from USC, he chose the University of Stockholm's graduate program in social science for English-speaking students, and earned his degree in 1972.

It took a number of years for the recycling symbol to catch on and become widely used in the United States and elsewhere. In fact, Gary Anderson had rarely seen the symbol in use until some ten years after the contest, when, while traveling in Europe, he noticed it prominently displayed on recycling bins in Amsterdam. About the Greenfield Conservation Commission (GCC)

GENERAL INFO

Generally, the GCC meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Office building. Want to make a difference? Come and join us! (always double-check the meeting calendar on the town website, in case it has been moved).

What is a Conservation Commission? According to the 2004 Handbook for NH's Municipal Conservation Commissions, it "...is the only local body specifically charged with protecting natural resources; it provides a focal point within the municipal government for environmental concerns. Without a conservation commission, other boards may or may not be aware of and consider natural resources in carrying out their responsibilities."

WHAT DOES THE GCC DO?

For one thing, we do the Roadside Round-up! See info elsewhere in the Spirit for details about this annual town clean-up day.

We are in the process of developing management plans for the George Proctor and Koch-Brown properties. What does this mean? For parcels that have been given to the town for use as recreation areas or otherwise conserved, it is good stewardship to have a structured plan for its use. This could involve developing a trail system or a boat launch, and might call for managed forestry. We're also updating the town's Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) and could use some help with that.

We're getting involved in combating invasives! Some of us have already taken training courses. The State is making a big push now, because plant and insect invasives are really getting out of control. One member is also on the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Council (CNBRLAC), which is getting some training on battling aquatic invasives such as variable milfoil. Training classes are targeted for May and August - watch for bulletins!

Introduction to Field Indicators of Hydric Soils in the U.S., Version 7.0 (2010)

(09:00 AM - 04:00 PM)

Field Indicators of Hydric Soils in the United States is a guide to help identify and delineate hydric soils in the field. Indicators are not intended to replace or modify the requirements contained in the definition of hydric soil. In order to properly use the Indicators, a basic knowledge of soil-landscape relationships and soil survey procedures is helpful. These national indicators are designed to be regionally specific. The description of each indicator identifies the land resource regions (LRRs) or major land resource areas (MLRAs) in which the indicator can be used. This course will focus on National Indicators used in New England as part of the revised 1987 ACOE Wetland Delineation Manual. Coursework includes both lecture and field exercises. Students are strongly encouraged to obtain information prior to the class by ordering the field indicators from the National Soil Survey Center, USDA, NRCS Room 152, 100 Centennial Mall North, Lincoln, Nebraska 68508-3866 or online at http://soils.usda.gov/use/hydric/. (This is part of the Wetland Delineation Certificate Program, but you do not need to enroll in the program to take this workshop.)

Invasive species come in three varieties: Insect, terrestrial plant and aquatic plant.

Emerald Ash Borer:

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was found in Concord in March 2013. As a non-native insect, EAB lacks predators to keep it in check. Infested trees die within 3 to 5 years. EAB only attacks ash trees, and is responsible for the death of millions of ash trees in the midwest. Help protect New Hampshire's ash trees. A quarantine of all hardwood firewood, ash wood-products and all ash nursery stock is in effect for Merrimack County.

Asian Longhorned Beetle Hemlock Woolly Adelgid Elongate Hemlock Scale Red Pine Scale White Pine Blister Rust Winter Moth

Invasive Plants - Aquatic

Aquatic invasives are managed by New Hampshire Department of Environmental Resources (DES). One example is Purple Loosestrife, which just about choked out many wetlands just a few years back, Great strides have been made controlling this. However, the worst of the aquatic invasives is the variable milfoil (see beginning of this GCC article about how this is being addressed in Greenfield).

Invasive Plants - Terrestrial

New Hampshire Department of Agriculture has jurisdiction over terrestrial invasives, but other entities get involved because of the incredible scope of these pests.

What is an invasive plant?

Though there are many definitions, a useful one is: a nonnative species capable of moving aggressively into an area, monopolizing light, nutrients, water, and space to the detriment of native species.

Why should we care?

Many of the familiar plants in our gardens, fields and forests aren't native to New Hampshire. While the majority cause no harm to natural habitat or managed farms and forests, many do. Invasive species can: reduce biodiversity; imperil rare species; reduce wildlife habitat by eliminating native foods, altering cover and destroying nesting sites; degrade water quality; reduce forest and agricultural crop production; and cause health problems.

The law governing invasive species:

There are 35 plant species banned in New Hampshire. The New Hampshire law (RSA 430: 53-57) and the rule are

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enforced by the NH Commissioner of Agriculture and prohibits the collection, possession, importation, transportation, sale, propagation, transplantation or cultivation of the banned plants. The NH Invasives Species Committee advises the Commissioner.

New and Exciting Invasive Plant Resource:

New Hampshire Fish and Game has been working on a great new tool for communities to help combat the problems of invasive plants. They have worked with the NH Natural Heritage Bureau to develop maps for each town in NH showing priority areas where invasive plants removal will have the most immediate impact and most effectively protect our native natural resources in the long-term! You'll also find a customized "early detection" list of plant species just coming into each town and a "watch list" of plant species that are not present yet, but are lurking close by. These documents describe how to use this strategy to prioritize projects right down to the individual property or stand level; you'll also be able to see how the statewide model was developed.

Picking our Battles: Enhancing Success of Invasive Plant Control Projects

Invasive plants can cause significant ecological and economic harm and are changing the face of America. They may impact wildlife by choking out natural habitats such as freshwater wetlands, causing loss of available food, or altering habitat structure.

The importance of minimizing the spread of invasive plants across the landscape means they are a common focus of restoration projects. However, invasive plants know no boundaries and can easily reestablish from surrounding areas unless a landscape-scale strategic approach is taken to prioritizing control projects.

The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department and the N.H. Natural Heritage have teamed up with over 120 community members, natural resource managers and academics to develop a statewide strategic prioritization plan for the control of upland, wetland, and intertidal invasive plant species.

Only by working together on shared invasive plant "battles" across differing land ownerships and political boundaries, can we effectively protect our native plants and wildlife habitat in the long term.



CLOVERLY FARM - OUR NEW (OLD) FARM



Cloverly Farm has been in my family for centuries. For most of its life this was a dairy farm, sporting prize-winning Ayrshire cows. I grew up there after the cows were gone, but I spent hours running through the fields of thistle and clover and exploring the young woods. This small farm in Southeast Greenfield is much different now than it was 100 years ago, and we're putting the land back to work in a new way.

In November of 2009, Dan Legnard and I sat down and talked about what is really important. We had much different perspectives, but we agreed on one thing: Sustainability matters. We weren't just talking about using less water, or driving a hybrid car. We were talking about local food systems, resilience in the face of global disasters, and communities bonding over what they could create together. We talked about the power of making (instead of just consuming), teaching young people about where food comes from, and how a carrot can be a start of social change. Then we decided to start our own version of Cloverly Farm - a farm for sustainability in our community.

We decided vegetables were the place to start, and we had two successful seasons in 2010 and 2011. We were in the Peterborough Farmers Market and Fresh Chicks Market, and we had a CSA with 10 shareholders. The fields were left fallow for 2012 and 2013 while I finished school and Dan worked on developing his skills at Farm and Wilderness camps in Plymouth, Vermont. This year we are back, with new ideas and renewed excitement.

For the 2014 season, we will be selling vegetables at the Peterborough and Fresh Chicks farmers markets again, and now also through Delay's Harvester Market in Greenfield. We are also offering more CSA shares this year. CSA (Community Supported

Agriculture) shares allow you to purchase a share of the farm's harvest, and foster a closer relationship between you and your farmer. For example, our shareholders have access to things we don't sell at the market, like flowers, unusual vegetables, and special events happening at the farm. Most importantly, a share provides you with a full compliment of vegetables every week for the entire growing season, for either a family (full share) or an individual or couple (half share).

But how does a farm actually start change in a community? We believe a farm can't just produce; it has to engage. Throughout the summer we have planned dozens of workshops and events to teach gardening and homesteading basics, from seed saving to canning to wild edible hikes, all free for shareholders. Greenfield residents should have access to good food, as well as knowledge of how the food was grown (sufficient knowledge, in fact, that they could grow it themselves!).

We want our produce itself to be engaging, so this year we chose to grow heirloom vegetables. Heirlooms are vegetable varieties that have been around for centuries (just like Cloverly!) and carry fascinating stories beyond just their flavorful taste and unique appearance. The Round Black Spanish Radish, for example, is a very hot radish with unusual black appearance traced back to 16th-century conquistadors. This spring, our shareholders will get to taste it!



Of course, sustainability means practicing good stewardship of the land, as well as nourishing people. Organic practices are fully aligned with our values, so we steer clear of chemicals and pay close attention to the health of our land. Organic certification is on our horizon.

Greenfield is the perfect place for a farm like ours, and we want to thank everyone for the support we have seen as we develop our business. Several other farms in Greenfield and nearby have been extremely welcoming and helpful, and we couldn't ask for a better community to join.

Growing up, climbing through the old barns and following fox tracks through the woods, I knew there was something special about the old farm, and I would do something great with it someday. Now we are working there to bring people together over incredible food, and there's really nothing better than that.
