GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

ON THE BATTLEFIELD - LOCALLY OR FARTHER AFIELD

A previous article described Greenfield's militia men who served in the Revolutionary War. It seems that these hardy settlers were always battling something - either the British or the rugged landscape and weather of New Hampshire in order to survive here.

Others had another cause for which to battle - that of "belonging" to Greenfield. In December of 1791, ten men signed a petition to the General Court expressing the dissatisfaction of those who lived in the northeastern part of Greenfield. It was "with unspeakable sorrow" that they found themselves included within the boundary of said Greenfield. These settlers all lived on the border with Francess town, attended church there, and sent their children to the schools of Francess town.

The petition signers deemed the roads of Greenfield to be worse and felt that they would remain so always. The men requested that they be rescued from the bondage of Greenfield and, instead, that their land be annexed to Francess town. Hence, the jagged boundary edge there. In 1872, additional land was added to Francess town to straighten the town line.

During its early years, then, not all of the battles waged were against another country.

ROCKIN' ROUND THE CLOCK: Our Sock Hop of February 13th was a great way to kick off the 225th Anniversary of Greenfield's founding. Some of our movies have been formatted onto DVD's for our continued enjoyment.

This NH Humanities Council program has garnered a lot of interest across the state. We will convene in the Wensberg Room of the Stephenson Memorial Library for this short business meeting and presentation.

FROM THE DPW BUILDING & GROUNDS DIVISION

The rainy season is here and every effort is being made to reduce the amount of water going into the Meeting house basement. I have isolated the largest culprit, which is the rear corner facing the cemetery. I put up a temporary 2 ½ foot sloped structure to send the water away from the building. This structure runs along the building for 16 feet. It has worked during the last two rainstorms. However, this should not be considered a permanent fix because the foundation is badly in need of repair.

All the fire alarms located in each building have gone through their annual inspection. Just to give you an idea of what's involved with annual inspections, the Meeting House has 25 pieces of equipment. All batteries on the smoke detectors that are being monitored have been replaced.

Spring cleanup at Oak Park will be started soon. I have received several requests in relation to our 225th Anniversary with spring cleanup and Oak Park.

As I wind up my employment here in Greenfield, I want to thank all the residents that were so encouraging to me. I've enjoyed working for the town and meeting all of you. My last day will be April 12th.

FROM THE RECYCLING CENTER

A HUGE THANK YOU to everyone for your support at the Town Meeting! The compactor was approved and will take several months to be installed. We are looking forward to moving along with several projects now that warm weather is here as you must be. Sunshine and warmth make all the difference as we move into spring. We are never too far away or too busy here at the Recycling Center for you to ask questions or to give direction as to where the appropriate area would be for your items. If we are not visible, open the door and give a yell.

Due to the markets "going south", we must enforce a "no tolerance" policy. Remember Greenfield has mandatory recycling. Please follow the reminders below.

Bill Gaudette has signed on again as an employee of the Recycling Center. Please give him a warm welcome back as you do your recycling.

SUMMER HOURS: Tuesday 8am - Noon, Thursday 1pm - 7pm and Saturday 8am - 4pm. Please arrive 15 minutes before closing to allow enough time to process your load.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE: Collections have started in Keene - dates are now available.

TAKE NOTICE: NO metals are to be deposited into the metal container WITHOUT permission. Please have your recyclables sorted before coming to the recycling center. This will help with the congestion at the recycling windows.

PLEASE SLOW DOWN: Recently someone came "flying" around the corner only to encounter a very busy area where you often find children.

Drug Take Back Day is on April 30th 10am - 2pm. This is for unused, expired or unwanted prescription and over the counter drugs. The tenth event was held in September 2015, the first in September 2010; cumulatively, these events have collected 5,525,021 pounds of drugs. Use these events as a means of safely disposing of medications. No more down the toilet or in the trash as both methods cause contamination in the water supply or leaves exposure to accessibility. The local locations are now available.

Remember **Roadside Round-up** is scheduled for APRIL 30th the last Saturday of April. This event will always be scheduled for the last Saturday in April - an easy way to remember it.

The paved driveway going to the Mini Mall/Library must stay open also no double parking at the compactor area. If you have items outside of normal kitchen trash and recyclables, you must have your load checked. Most likely there will be a charge involved. If you do not have the payment due,

you will have to take it back with you. Separate the metals from all other materials. You must also have your own muscle power to unload heavy items.

Please NO greasy pizza box bottoms or food donations - greasy bottoms are trash, recycle the clean box cover.

Please take off the top & bottom of tin/steel cans 46oz or larger and crush the can in half. This helps tremendously to increase the storage capacity until it goes to market.

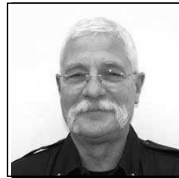
Remember to take out all packing materials in a corrugated cardboard boxes before recycling. The same goes for mixed paper; no packing materials, plastic, or other contaminants.

REMINDERS: The following will insure the most effective results for the town.

- All trash must be in bags and tied closed.
- ALL METALS and BRUSH MUST BE CHECKED - yes, the brush pile is now open
- Mini Mall/Library all items must be checked.
- Plastics - PLEASE "RCR" Rinse-CRUSH-Recap, # 1's door is BOTTLES ONLY and #2's are the same.
- Steel/Tin cans include only those that are related to food or household cleaning products. No paint cans etc.
- Aluminum-cans/pie plates/food trays/clean foil/pet food cans but NO aerosol cans - these go in steel cans
- Corrugated cardboard must be clean and dry. If it has ridges it is corrugated-TEAR to check
- Vegetable/Nut oils used or new accepted - No lard, shortenings or other products in a solid state.
- Lawn mowers and bicycles - these items need to be checked and the history on usable lawn equipment is appreciated.
- Demo/Construction debris/ Bulky Waste and Electronics - Must see attendant. ALL have FEES applied.
- Used Oil - is appreciated all year long for use in our waste oil furnace for winter heating purposes. The requirements are posted at the door and remember contaminated oil is an expense to the town. Thank you for your contributions.

We strive to help make your time at the center an enjoyable and productive experience.

THE FIRE CHIEF'S CORNER

First and foremost, all of us on the Greenfield Fire Department want to extend our sincere thanks to the town's people of Greenfield for their support at Town Meeting. We asked for your support... and you certainly delivered, thank you so much! Now we can get back to work.

Speaking of which, we have recently taken delivery of our "new to us" ladder truck. We need to get the truck re-lettered and change a few things and then we can get it in service. Next up we are looking for a used vehicle to replace our ailing brush truck. We are fortunate in the sense that the back end of our brush unit... meaning the bed, pump, water tank and equipment are in great shape. The truck, the cab and chassis are pretty rough. A new cab and chassis run 50K and up... we are looking to spend under 20K by going the used route, again a substantial savings.

As I reported last time, FF/EMT Doug Batty is an experienced grant writer. Now that we have straightened out our mandatory incident reporting requirements with the State, and are back in compliance, we are again eligible for federal grant money. Doug has spent countless hours crafting a grant to replace our aging tanker truck. It is a 5% match grant which if we receive it will allow us to buy a brand new \$400,000 tanker with the town only responsible for a \$20,000 match. The exciting news is that we have made the first cut, the cut where the largest number of grants is denied. This is not a done deal, but we survived round one... now our chances are much better. We thank Doug for his excellent work!

We have also taken receipt of our new Zoll cardiac monitor/defibrillator. Given the very high cost of this monitor, I reached out for financial help. Just as they had done 17 years ago when I purchased our last monitor, Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center again donated \$10,000 towards the purchase of this new state of the art monitor/defibrillator. Due to a substantial discount and a flexible arrangement with Zoll Medical Systems, Greenfield has a year to pay off the balance on the monitor. We will fundraise as much as possible to minimize tax payer impact. If any town money is needed, it will be a fraction of the \$32,000 price tag on this much needed life saving device. None of this would have been possible without the generous support of Crotched Mountain and we thank them for it.

We are still collecting contributions for the Fire Training Building that we hope to build next year. American Steel & Precast Erectors (ASPE) has made this project possible. They are donating all the steel and precast walls to build this structure. And... they will donate the labor and specialized equipment necessary to erect the building. A project of this magnitude could never possibly happen without extraordinary generosity of ASPE and the Cilley family. With their

Benedict Arnold: Patriot and Traitor?
A NH Humanities Council presentation by George Morrison

Thursday, April 14 at 7 pm in the Wensberg Room

We all think we know the story of Benedict Arnold, the American

Revolutionary War general who fought for the Continental Army but then defected to the British. Recalled mainly as a traitor for his 1780 defection, Arnold had risked his life and fortune for American freedom in courageous exploits between 1775 and 1778, when the dream of independence was at its most fragile. As an officer in the Continental Army, Arnold ably led American forces in desperate circumstances - against impossible odds, in a blinding snowstorm, through a howling wilderness, and against the extraordinary might of the Royal Navy. George Morrison will take you on a journey through New England, Canada, and New York tracing the

complex story of this infamous American icon.

New Hampshire's Long Love-Hate Relationship with Its Agricultural Fairs

The first agricultural fair in North America was held in what is now Londonderry in 1722, and it would become a wildly popular event lasting for generations until it came to be so dominated by gambling, flim-flam, and other "scandalous dimensions" that the legislature revoked its charter in 1850. But fairs have always had strong supporters and eventually the state came around to appropriating modest sums to help them succeed. Temperance groups and others would continue to attack the fairs on moral grounds and their close connection to horse racing was a chronic flashpoint. Steve Taylor will discuss the ups and downs of the fairs down through years and how public affection for rural traditions helps them survive in contemporary times.

help, we are going to build a state of the art training center without using any taxpayer dollars. To put this in perspective, a building like this typically costs several hundred thousand dollars! We are deeply grateful for the Cilley family's generosity. A committee has been formed to shepherd and oversee this process. Several Fire Chiefs from surrounding towns are participating as well as a representative from the NH Fire Academy. There is much work to be done, but we are moving ahead.

2016 has started out quietly, our call numbers are down a little bit from last year. We did however have a nice stop on a basement fire. We had a very prompt response on a week-day day time call and knocked the fire down before it got away from us. We have spent a lot of time on fund raising, negotiating purchases and training... all of which needed our attention. So into spring we go... stay safe, but if you need us... don't hesitate to call!
