HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Thinking about the Blueberry "JAM"boree on Aug. 1st also got me thinking of a story one of my uncles told. His name was Harold Eastman. He married my mother's sister Eleanor (Quinn). Harold had two nick names. "Red" and "Chick". He was born in South Peterborough in 1909. According to him, the summer he was about 11 or 12 years old, a man hired him and another youngster to pick blueberries.

TheY were brought over to Francestown and left for a period of time to camp out and pick berries every day on Crotched Mountain. The man would stop back every day or so to get their crates of blueberries.

It got hot enough at one point that the boys took their shirts off picking the berries. Someone went to the Sheriff and complained. He came up and brought the boys to the old wooden jail to be held until the fine was paid by someone. Being an old and small building, the boys managed to escape. They left all of their belongings at the camp and got back to Peterborough as fast as possible. That ended his blueberry jobs.

Later in his life he was Superintendent of Noones Mills in Peterborough. Being on call 24/7 was not to his liking after a few years. Hunting and fishing were a huge part of his life. Around 1953, I think it was, he bought a hunting camp on Old Bennington Road in Greenfield. It was definitely a camp, not really made for year round living. But my aunt and he fixed it up some and stayed there for about 25 years. In the meantime, he resigned from Noones Mills and milked cows for my father and mother for about 15 years. The owner of Noones Mills thought he was joking when he gave his notice. But a couple months later they called over to his place and my aunt told them he was milking cows for her brotherin-law.

Uncle Chick was happy to have time off between the milkings to go fishing or hunting. He was a very fascinating person who had a lot of diverse experiences.

As a teenager he rode race horses at Oak Park Fairground among some of his doings. He was a very good friend and received lots of support from "Major" Goyette in Peterborough, who at one point owned the land for Oak Park here in town. I could write several more pages just on my Uncle Chick, as well as my Aunt Eleanor, both had very interesting lives.

Our June Fair allowed for our lovely museum to be enjoyed by many. Once again Knotty Pine Appraisals were a huge hit. People from the area dropped by to have items appraised. Conrad and Ellen Dumas drew a lot of attention with their sheep and felting displays in the front yard. This went nicely with Cynthia De Stueben, who had a spinning wheel also set up outside. On loan from the Fletcher family is a beautiful needle point done by Harriet Fletcher in 1829 in honor of her family. Some of Harriet's Fletcher ancestors are still in Greenfield. To be able to share this piece of history from one of Greenfield's founding families is very exciting. The Historical Society is grateful for this opportunity. Also on display were many Whing Ding photos and posters along side Oak Park Fair items. These drew a great deal of attention, too. A fun part added for the fair were old bill heads and receipts from different businesses in town and from Peterborough. Many people recognized these and it generated a great deal of conversation. Another collection of different milk bottles and containers took us another step back in time which generated memories of a bygone era.

Even the 2009 Ice storm photos/journal brought back thoughts of that time and experiences were shared by many of the visitors. If anyone has photos or printed stories of their time "In the Dark" the Historical Society would like to copy them or perhaps have some donated for our files.

August 1st is the Blueberry "JAM"boree. We will be there with displays and, new to us, we will have the 50/50 raffle. So stop by and take a chance or two.

Our September meeting for the general membership meeting looks to be on a Saturday in mid to late September.

Details will be worked out and we will keep you posted. Also watch the signboard by our sign.

The museum is open the last Saturday of the following months - July 25th, August 29th, September 26th from 11 a.m.- 1 p.m. or by appointment Call 547-2198 or 547-2759.

How to keep the beaches clean

The town beaches are for residents and

taxpayers of the Town of Greenfield, NH ONLY. Guests are permitted when accompanied by a resident or taxpayer. A Greenfield facilities sticker is required on your vehicle. You may obtain the facilities sticker from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons may obtain a temporary permit.

In addition to monitoring the beaches for bacteria, the NH Department of Environmental Services offers programs to maintain clean beaches. Keeping the beaches clean of litter by supporting the carry in/carry out policy is very important.

Please, whenever you visit a beach:

- · Bring a garbage bag to take home all the trash you create.
- · Recycle bottles and cans instead of throwing them away.
- · Smokers: Put butts in a proper receptacle. Butts are made of plastic and do not decompose.
- · Secure your belongings from the wind
- · DO NOT FEED THE BIRDS. Bird droppings contribute bacteria directly to the beach.
- · If you see any trash that may have been left behind, please dispose of it properly. There is a trash can for the lifeguards, I am sure they would be happy to help.
- · Dog Owners: Sorry you are not allowed to bring your dog to the beach.

Please help us to keep our Greenfield beaches free from harmful organisms and litter. A clean beach is more enjoyable for everyone!

Monitoring the Beach:

The water is tested by the Department of Environmental Services once a month throughout the summer. This is a cooperative effort between the DES and the Town of Greenfield. The Town does incur a small fee for the testing. Beach inspectors collect water samples from the bathing area for bacteria analysis. They gather samples of the water and test for pathogens, also inspecting the water for algai blooms, scum etc. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swimming, please abide by the signage posted. The beach was tested on June 30, 2009 and the results for both Zephyr and Sunset Lake were well within the state standard. The beaches will again be tested on July 29 and August 20.

Swimming in lakes, rivers and coastal waters should be an enjoyable experience. However, it can expose people to health hazards, so the NH DES inspects the water at the public beaches. The DES monitors both disease-causing pathogens and toxin producing cyanobacteria. Although reports of illnesses contracted from public beaches in state are very rare, the DES and the Selectmen want the public to be aware that contact with contaminated water could cause a person to become ill, and want to avoid that.

- · Pathogens Pathogens causing diseases can be carried in feces of humans, waterfowl, livestock and domestic animals. The pathogens are transferred to public bathing areas when the feces from an infected warmblooded animal enters a waterbody from nearby farms, septic systems, wildelife, storm drains or similar sources.
- · Cyanobacterie this is generally referred to as blue-green algae. It forms a dense layer of blue-green or bright green scum on the water's surface. This bacteria can cause an entire lake to take on a blue-green hue, or the blooms may resemble floating paint chips or bright green balls. Many cyanobacteria are potentially toxic to

domestic animals, livestock and humans. Blooms should be avoided.

· Microorganisms - This is not something that is monitored. Though, if a lake is contaminated, it could cause problems like "swimmers itch".

OTHER RECREATION MATTERS:

DOG CONCERNS AT OAK PARK

It may sound like a broken record but.....Again, it's great that the track is being used, and that you enjoy walking your dogs. For those of you that walk a dog, remember that you must clean up if a mess is made. We would like to maintain a mess-free park for all to enjoy. If dog messes continue, dogs will not be allowed at the park.

TRASH CONCERNS

There have been concerns about trash being left behind at Oak Park and at the beaches. All Town of Greenfield facilities are carry in/carry out. Pick up after yourselves. Remember to take your trash, water/soda bottles, diapers and anything else you bring with you when you leave.

PLAYGROUND FACILITY

Recently, an inspection was done of our playground equipment. The good news is, it's relatively safe. The plan is to replace some pieces of equipment and remove some. Nothing drastic, but if there are any interested parents, let's get together to do some brainstorming, fundraising etc. and really plan out what to replace the equipment with. Your feedback is appreciated.





LYME DISEASE

The Lyme disease bacterium normally lives in mice, squirrels and other small animals. It is transmitted among these animals and to humans through the bites of certain species

of ticks. Ticks bite the infected animal and then bite humans or other animals.

In the northeastern and north-central United States, the black-legged tick (or deer tick) transmits Lyme disease. In the Pacific coastal United States, the disease is spread by the western black-legged tick. Other major tick species found in the United States have not been shown to transmit Lyme disease bacterium.

Blacklegged ticks live for two years and when infected, it remains infected for the rest of its life.

Other suggested modes of transmission:

PERSON-TO-PERSON

There is no evidence that Lyme disease is transmitted from person-to-person.

During Pregnancy & While Breastfeeding

Lyme disease acquired during pregnancy may lead to infection of the placenta and possible stillbirth, however, no negative effects on the fetus have been found when the mother receives appropriate antibiotic treatment. There are no reports of Lyme disease transmission from breast milk.

FROM BLOOD

Although no cases of Lyme disease have been linked to blood transfusion, scientists have found that the Lyme disease bacteria can live in blood that is stored for donation. Individuals being treated for Lyme disease with an antibiotic should not donate blood.

FROM PETS

Although dogs and cats can get Lyme disease, there is no evidence that they spread the disease directly to their owners. However, pets can bring infected ticks into your home or yard. Consider protecting your pet, and possibly yourself, through the use of tick control products for animals.

OTHER TRANSMISSION

You will not get Lyme disease from eating venison or squirrel meat, but in keeping with general food safety principles meat should always be cooked thoroughly. Note that hunting and dressing deer or squirrels may bring you into close contact with infected ticks

There is no credible evidence that Lyme disease can be transmitted through air, food, water, or from the bites of mosquitoes, flies, fleas, or lice.

LYME DISEASE SIGNS OF INFECTION

The first sign of infection is usually a circular rash at the site of a tick bite after a delay of 3-30 days. A distinctive fea-

ture of the rash is that it gradually expands over a period of several days, reaching up to 12 inches (30 cm) across. The center of the rash may clear as it enlarges, resulting in a

bull's-eye appearance. It may be warm but is not usually painful. Patients also experience symptoms of fatigue, chills, fever, headache, and muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes. In some cases, these may be the only symptoms of infection.

LYME DISEASE DIAGNOSIS

Lyme disease is diagnosed based on symptoms, objective physical findings and a history of pos-

sible exposure to infected ticks. Validated laboratory tests can be very helpful but are not generally recommended.

When making a diagnosis of Lyme disease, health care providers should consider other diseases that may cause similar illness. Not all patients with Lyme disease will develop the characteristic bulls-eye rash, and many may not recall a tick bite.

TREATMENT

Patients treated with antibiotics in the early stages of the infection usually recover rapidly and completely. A few patients, particularly those diagnosed with later stages of disease, may have persistent or recurrent symptoms. The authors of studies sponsored by the National Institutes of Health have concluded that these patients may benefit from a second 4-week course of therapy and that longer courses of antibiotic treatment are not beneficial. Longer courses of antibiotics have been linked to serious complications, including death.


