Sunset Beach Open Lifeguards on Duty



This type of event requires a lot of organization, planning and communication.


The formation of a Memorial Day Committee has been presented to the Board of Selectmen. This committee would be responsible for all Memorial Day activities.

GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Roads and Highways, part III

To help small towns improve their roads, the state granted Town Road Aid (TRA) money. This helped make roads safer for motorized vehicles. Some of the improvements involved taking the sharp corners out or widening the travel portion of the roads.

Each state district had a TRA Supervisor. Greenfield's supervisor was out of Swanzey. The last person serving in this capacity when the program ended in the 1980's was Elwin Bailey, Jr. His father had been Greenfield's Road Agent for quite a few years, off and on.

Tar was used as a quick, cheap way to build a solid road surface. The tar was sprayed on the roadway in order to penetrate the gravel roads. It soaked into the top to a depth of about one inch. The tar was allowed to sit for a few days before driving on it was permitted. Next, a layer of sand was laid over the tar to soak up any excess and to keep the tar from "bleeding" through, creating slick spots.

Sometimes, the tar was sprayed out into a windrow of sand. Then, a grader worked it back and forth in order to mix the road covering of tar. This would be rolled afterward and lightly sanded. A hard surface was achieved at a cheaper cost than that for hot top. Every few years, this would be spraysealed with tar again and lightly sanded. The grit would be pounded into the layer of tar with a roller to make a longer-wearing surface.

The actual coal tar was a good product for these roads. It was tough and the coal tar really glued everything together. After it was regulated out of use, a water-based emulsion was substituted. This emulsion was not as sticky and it didn't adhere to the roads as well. Applied at a thinner rate, the water-based emulsion did not hold the small rocks. Stone chips were better than sand, but this proved more costly.

A lot of roads passed between or in front of houses and barns. Some of these buildings were so close to the road that modern travel made it scary to step out the door. When these structures were built, horses and foot travel were the mode of transportation. Also, the roads were basically wheel ruts and not very wide. *****

Speaking of barns... Plans for the Society's barn are progressing. We are working on various fund-raising activities. Donations are always welcome. We are pleased to announce that some have already been received! If all goes well, we would like to have the footings and frost walls poured this fall and continue with fundraising towards the total goal of \$60, 000 and the building of the remainder of the barn.

Look for the Greenfield Historical Society's exhibit at the Blueberry Jamboree at Oak Park on Saturday, August 7th. In addition to the displays, we will also be doing a 50/50 raffle. The lucky winner will have some money for summer fun, and we will be that much closer to the completed barn.

The staff will really appreciate your efforts to reduce the odors in bottles, cans and plastics by using a small amount of water to rinse them before putting items in your recycling bins to bring to the center. Since we have no running water available at the recycling center, smelly recycling bins cannot be rinsed, and the tables that catch the recyclables are washed with water from the water dispenser and chemically treated. because of the response from you all, the town collected 1.16 tons of debris. Thanks goes to Monadnock Waste Disposal for the donation of the dumpster, to the Conservation Committee and the GIVers for their time and the blue bags mailed to residents, and a shout out to Conrad Dumas and friends who brought in a dump truck load of debris, by far the largest single contribution to the dumpster. Every bit of clean up helps, and to those that sorted roadside debris for recycling (and there were a lot of you brave souls), our hats are off to you. We'd also like to mention the people that pick up along the sides of the road year round. Your efforts are always appreciated and not ignored. Thanks!

According to the Northeast Resource Association Recovery website (www.nrra.net), scrap metal recycling is alive and well, with revenues to be made by the towns that participate in their program. Greenfield has recycled 10.27 tons of scrap metal this year and has been paid \$1153.08 for it. Scrap metal recycling is beneficial for other reasons as well, "because it conserves limited landfill space by removing it regularly, and it conserves natural resources by replacing the need for virgin raw materials needed to produce new metal goods with recycled scrap. Recycling one ton of scrap metal saves 1400 pounds of coal and 129 pound of limestone." (NRRA fact sheet, 2009). Greenfield usually has two to three scrap metal pick ups a year, and the 10.27 tons we recycled is the first time it has been picked up this year.

At the Annual Recycling Conference held in June 2010 and hosted by the NRRA and New Hampshire the Beautiful, our neighbor Francestown was recognized as having the most (recycling) tonnage per capita through the NRRA for a population between 1001 and 5000. That's our category, folks, so let's see if we can get the award next year!!!

Finally, it's been three years since we had such a great success raising funds for the purchase of a skid-steer for the recycling center. Jezebel (my name for the forklift) continues to limp along and need expensive repairs. She could still net some money if sold when she is replaced with a skid-steer, so stay tuned for another fund raiser in September or October. Thanks to all of you for your support and commitment to recycling!

Sunset Lake Beach Rules

- 1. The town beach is for residents and taxpayers of the Town of Greenfield, N.H. only. Guests are permitted when accompanied by a resident or taxpayer.
- 2. The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
- 3. NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beach!
- 4. No open fires are permitted.
- 5. No vehicles are allowed on the beach.
- 6. Disturbing noises and/or music is prohibited.
- 7. Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.
- 8. Alcoholic beverages prohibited.
- 9. No horseplay.
- 10. Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!
- 11. Do not feed ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.
- 12. Listen to the lifeguards at all times.
- 13. Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.
- 14. Only Coast Guard approved floatation devices allowed.

"No lifeguard on duty" sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.

Floating Raft Rules:

- 1. No rough play.
- 2. No tipping of the floating raft.
- 3. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if a person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the raft.
- 4. No swimming under the raft.

Zephyr Lake Beach Rules

Zephyr Lake rules are the same with these exceptions:

Zephyr Lake Beach is "Swim at your own Risk", as there is no lifeguard on duty at any time.

Fishing allowed outside of where others are swimming.

All other rules apply except those pertaining to lifeguards and rafts.

Sunset and Zephyr Lakes

The beach water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swim, please abide by the signage posted.

Greetings from Greenfield Trails Association!

As I sit here on the couch and recover from my recent knee surgery, I was secretly and unanimously nominated by my humorous fellow members to quickly write to y'all to tell you what we've been up to in the last year. (Nothing like adding insult to injury- thanks, guys... I'll be remembering this!)

Greenfield Trails Association (GTA) takes great pride in the hard work of trail maintenance, mostly because it involves sweat, volunteerism, and a few smashed thumbs from hammers. Since 1999, GTA has worked diligently to maintain the vast network of trails that exist in Greenfield and, in some cases, connects to other town trails that expands further the enjoyment of users. Maintenance includes clearing overgrowth, raking out sticks and debris creating clear paths, using environmental friendly techniques to reduce erosion by runoff or overuse, building bridges to protect brooks and wetlands, to just simply taking out an obstructing fallen tree from a crazy ice-storm. 


