HISTORICAL SOCIETY News

THE UTILITY SHED HAS A HOME! Our shed raffle generated lots of interest this spring. It seemed as though everyone wanted this little building so generously donated to us by New England Forest Products. The shed was moved to the Museum front yard last fall by Board member Frank Shea and volunteer, Lee "Kugi" Clough, to give folks the opportunity to look it over up close. Neal Brown of Greenfield was the lucky winner in the drawing. He, in turn, has donated the structure to the GIVers Community Gardens located behind the town office building. Chuck Setaro, owner of Chuck's Auto, offered to use his truck to transport the shed to its new site free of charge.

The Historical Society thanks all who donated and supported us through this fund raiser. There will be more events as we continue working toward our goal of raising a barn on our museum site. Donations are always welcomed toward the goal of \$60,000; to date, we are nearly halfway there.

THE LURE OF THE RAILS

Going through some photos taken around town a couple of years back, pictures involving Greenfield's railroad were noted. One depicts the square stone post with a "W" inscribed on it. This post is across from the Fire Station and the Greenfield Commons complex. The initial "W" let the train's engineer know to sound the whistle as the train approached the road crossings in that area. The other photo shows the round crossbuck RR sign posted to warn motorists of the railroad crossing just ahead. School buses, propane, and other specialty trucks must stop at the tracks in order for their drivers to "look and listen" before proceeding. It is the law for such vehicles.

For town and state highway plow truck drivers, these tracks could wreak havoc on the plows and trucks. Plows and wings will often catch on the rails and this causes the truck to stall or the plow to bounce over. Sometimes the truck, all sixteen tons of it, even slides along the tracks. If the truck hits the tracks hard enough, bolts or rivets break or the large plow frame is twisted into a pretzel.

Our town history indicates how important the railroad was in the daily life of Greenfield in its earlier days. It transported milk and other farm products, soapstone, ice from the ice houses, summer vacationing passengers, winter skiing enthusiasts, and even high school students!

Knowing that folks are still fascinated by the railroad, the Greenfield Historical Society is excited about its next "big event".

Recycling Center News

Summer has arrived along with many picnics, day trips, vacations, cookouts, boating, and of course - going to the beach. There are many fun activities this time of year to enjoy with friends and family in the outdoors, but the end result of all these events is: Trash! It multiplies during this season requiring us to be more diligent about recycling. Here is an idea to make it easier and to help our little ones learn where to put items; use bright colored totes or tubs. For example green is glass, purple is plastic, apple (red) is aluminum and pink is paper.

Here are a few facts:

• New England tipping fees are among the highest in the country. This is the fee charged to dispose of our trash, whether it is at a landfill or incinerator.

• Trash and dumpsters cause 12.5% of all fires in the United States.

Do you know?

Every month, we throw out enough glass bottles and jars to fill up a giant skyscraper. All of these jars are recyclable!
A single quart of motor oil, if disposed of improperly, can

contaminate up to 2,000,000 gallons of fresh water.

Wanted:

At the present we are in need of several tools to make our work easier: a workbench vice, large wire cutters and a hand grinder. If you have a usable item, your donation would be much appreciated.

Other Items:

REMINDER: Open hours are: Tuesday 8 AM to Noon, Thursday 1 PM to 7 PM, Saturday 8 AM to 4 PM.

The information on Hazardous Waste Collection dates is posted on the bulletin board, as well as "take home" sheets on a clipboard next to the bulletin board.

Other Information of Interest:

Please remember no paint cans are to be disposed of unless checked first. The lids must be off and the cans must be empty. Please take notice of the signs at each recycling table that tell you what items go into that particular window. We have set up the aluminum a new way inside and it is important you take time to place the aluminum and steel in the correct windows. There is a container to collect Box Tops for Education by the glass window. The school collects them and uses the money to fund various projects. On the shelf underneath this container you can place clean paper egg cartons. People who have laying hens can take the cartons for their eggs.

Packing Peanuts: I am going to set up a large tote for collecting these for anyone who needs them for shipping. PLEASE have the peanuts in a plastic bag and tied shut before depositing them into the tote. This will also help keep the grounds free of litter. Please remember that the formed styrofoam used in packing must go into the trash.

A few quick reminders:

MINI MALL: Please remember to check with me before leaving any items. Please put glass items on the new deeper shelving. NO electronics, clothing, or furniture allowed. Your attention to neatness is appreciated. Please empty boxes and set items on the shelves.

USED OIL: I have a few empty 5-gallon containers to put used oil in, if interested just ask me for them. Please remember oil that is contaminated with antifreeze, gasoline or any other foreign substance is considered Hazardous Waste. Any contaminated oil left here will cost the town for its disposal. Please be careful, someone has already made this expensive mistake once.

METAL PILE: There are fees associated with certain items that go in this area. NO fire extinguishers, propane tanks of any size, oil filters, or wood, in the metal pile. If you have these items please talk with me and I will gladly let you know where to place them. A second 55-gallon drum has been placed at the metal pile for small nails, screws and small metal pieces to keep them off the ground. Please use it for such items. Please do not climb on the metal pile, it is not safe or practical to do this.

BICYCLES & LAWN MOWERS: These are being separated from the metal pile so they are more accessible if anyone is interested in them. I am working on having bicycle racks made. Lawn mowers MUST have the oil and gasoline drained before they can be left here.

BURN PILE: Please remember the 5" rule. No logs over 5" can be left on the premises. No plywood, treated lumber, painted or stained lumber, or laminates of any sort can be left

in the burn pile. This is part of the state law on burning at Transfer/Recycling Centers. Please when you bring brush pile it together like a teepee. This makes burning it much more efficient.

COMPACTOR: NO ashes, electronics, metal, wood, or recyclables should be put into the trash compactor. A TV was thrown into the trash last weekend but luckily we were able to retrieve it. Every pound that goes into the compactor costs the town money. Please recycle these things correctly.

MIXED PAPER: Please sort the corrugated cardboard out of the mixed paper. Remember if it tears it goes into mixed paper. The stiff inner rolls from carpets, paper rolls and such can go into mixed paper. All kitty litter boxes go into mixed paper.

ALUMINUM CANS: If you have large trash bags (15+ gal.) of aluminum cans, you can put the whole bag thru the window. Then we can empty them directly into the baler. PLEASE do your best to empty and rinse the cans.

PLASTICS: Please leave the lids on oil containers and I will finish draining them inside.

• I cannot recycle plastic bags of any sort or styrofoam food or meat trays.

• If you do not completely use and rinse all of the laundry soap out of the bottles, then please leave the cap on and we will drain it inside. This residue causes a very slippery worktable and floor.

• Remember to rinse all containers, and also dispose of any container with food still in it.

TIN/STEEL CANS: All aerosol cans (aluminum or steel) will go in this window. Here are some exceptions that do not go in this window: paint cans, insecticide spray cans, metal pans, hangers, pieces of steel, rusty old tools. Yes these items are made of steel but they are considered light iron, which is not the same make up as steel food cans. Please ask and I will help you.

ELECTRONICS: There is a new electronics trailer on site. Please remember there are fees associated with these items. There is also a new way of placing items in this trailer and I will explain that process when you are paying your fee.

FEES: I am still accepting the punch cards as payment, so if you have these please use them.

CARDBOARD: Please remember cardboard with a picture is just shiny and is recyclable. I AM taking waxed cardboard now too, so ANY type of cardboard can be put in the window. The only exceptions are mostly wet cardboard or pieces contaminated with paint, oil, or meat juices. If you are unsure, please ask me.

Thank you for your cooperation in recycling.

I will gladly answer any questions and I am always open for suggestions.

News of Conservation Doings

About the Greenfield Conservation Commission (GCC)

General Info

Generally, the GCC meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Office building. Want to make a difference? Come and join us!

What is a Conservation Commission? According to the 2004 Handbook for NH's Municipal Conservation Commissions, it "...is the only local body specifically charged with protecting nat-

ural resources; it provides a focal point within the municipal government for environmental concerns. Without a conservation commission, other boards may or may not be aware of and consider natural resources in carrying out their responsibilities."

HAPPENINGS

Hurry on down to the Blueberry Jamboree Saturday, August 6th at Oak Park from 8am-3pm Rain or Shine!

The ConCom is selling blueberry bushes at the Jamboree. We'll be selling single bushes for \$20 and 2 bushes for \$36 (10% off the full price).

Spotlight on...Selecting a Professional Logger (adapted from UNH Cooperative Extension article)

Your forestland is a considerable financial investment as well as a source of personal enjoyment. Making the decision to harvest your timber warrants the same careful attention as any other business transaction. If you choose to hire a logger directly, or through a forester, consider the following points.

Check References

- Talk with landowners who have recently had a timber harvest.
- Request the logger provide a list of satisfied landowners.
- Consider visiting a site that the logger has previously harvested.

Insurance/Liability

Request copies of certificates of insurance. These may include:

- · General Liability and Completed Operations
- Auto Liability for log truckers
- Workers' Compensation: only required if the logger has employees.

Negotiating Prices

- Check stumpage prices offered for your timber with published sources, i.e. NHTOA Timber Crier Quarterly Market Report (603) 224-9699 or The Sawlog Bulletin (603) 444-2549.
- Call the local mills directly for the most up-to-date market prices.

• Delivered prices offered by the mill are significantly higher than stumpage prices, which reflect the value of your timber "sitting on the stump".

Actual stumpage prices for a given lot of timber are influenced by many factors including, but not limited to: accessibility, timber quality, road distances, market demand, sale volume, species, etc.. Keep this in mind when seeking a reasonable price for your timber. When in doubt, contact your local county UNH Cooperative Extension Forest Resource Educator.

Written Contract

- Insist on a written contract or a Timber Sale Agreement to protect the interests of all parties involved.
- Be cautious of high pressure sales tactics. (Trees are dying; markets are collapsing; my equipment is leaving and I'll never be back!)
- Never grant permission to harvest your timber over the phone.

Most established loggers want to build a file of satisfied customers and follow customary business practices. With a little homework, a landowner can find a reputable logger who can satisfy their needs.

Workers' Compensation Insurance Coverage

Under NH Law, independent contractors, who only employ themselves, are not required to carry workers' compensation insurance. Many competent and safe independent loggers do not carry this coverage because of its high cost. As with any business relationship, consider the liabilities, have a good contract, and consult with your insurance agent or a lawyer who is well-versed in these matters.

Pets

• "GoodSearch" for Monadnock Kitty Rescue and Adoption! GoodSearch. com is a Yahoo-powered search engine that pays the charity of your choice every time you use it. Shopping, too!; a portion of your purchase goes to the charity! Plug in Monadnock Kitty Rescue (or the charity of your choice) where it says WHO DO YOU GOODSEARCH FOR? and hit the verify button. Then, search or shop! It's a win-win!!!

• Owning a pet is great fun, and a great responsibility! It's not a decision to be taken lightly - a pet is for life. Remember - think shelter pet first. However, if you have your heart set on a purebred, there are rescue organizations for almost every breed of dog. Local shelters:

• Monadnock Kitty Rescue & Adoption in Jaffrey - 532-9444(http://www.kittyrescueandadoption.org)

• All dogs in Greenfield must have a license! If yours doesn't, contact the Town offices. We also have a leash law! A couple of weeks ago, I had to rescue a dog that was running back and forth across Forest Road - you don't want your dog to get hit, do you???

• You may qualify for financial help for spaying or neutering your cat or dog! Call Toll Free 1-800-990-SPAY. Remember - every litter hurts! Also see http://www.nhspca.org/community-services/spay-neuter-programs.html for all your options.

Flea Care -

• Talk to your vet about choosing the right, species specific flea treatment for your pet and never use products made for dogs on cats, or vice versa.

• Never use insecticides on very young, pregnant, debilitated or elderly animals without consulting your veterinarian.

• Avoid applying flea powders and sprays in addition to a spot-on treatment - the combination of chemicals in different products can cause an adverse reaction in your pet.

Wildlife -

• Keep on the lookout for wildlife crossing the road! Obey the speed limit, and you may avoid hitting an animal.

Invasive Species

Needed: pool owners to help protect forests! UNH Cooperative Extension is looking for volunteers.

The Asian longhorned beetle (ALB) is a serious threat to our forests and trees. ALB was found in trees in Worcester MA in 2008. Some Worcester homeowners subsequently reported they collected ALB in their swimming pools for years prior to the 2008 identification.

Last summer, this approach was tested with 34 public pools. Help out by looking at the debris from your swimming pools.

In addition to a swimming pool, you need:

- A digital camera

Eco Tips from global stewards.org

First: Reduce

Simplify: Simplify your life as much as possible. Only keep belongings that you use/enjoy on a regular basis.
Reduce Purchases: In general, think before you buy any product - do you really need it? Try the 30-Day Rule -- wait 30 days after the first time you decide you want a product to really make your decision. This will eliminate impulse buying.

• The Compact: Join or form a Compact in your area groups all across the globe committing for 12 months to not buy any new products.

• Replace Disposables: Wherever possible, replace disposable products with reusable ones (i.e., razor, food storage, batteries, ink cartridges (buy refill ink), coffee filters, furnace or air conditioner filters, etc.).

Second: Reuse

• Garage Sales: Shop at and hold garage sales - this is a great way to reuse products.

Reusables: Switch from disposable to reusable products: food and beverage containers, cups, plates, writing pens, razors, diapers, towels, shopping bags, etc.
Donations: Donate (and buy used): household items clothes, furniture, dishes, books, sports equipment, magazines, appliances, electronics, business attire, wedding attire,

etc. (to charity)

- Women's business attire (to Dress for Success)
- Computer equipment, cell phones, cameras, iPod/MP3 Players, laptops, PDAs (to Recycling for Charities)

Third: Recycle

• Recycle Bins: Create designated holding "bins" for each type of recycled product and place in convenient locations in your home/garage

◆ Recycling - GREENFIELD RECYCLES!!!

Recycled Content: Ask your local retailers to stock more products made from recycled materials and buy products made from the highest recycled content whenever possible.
Green Paper: In general, try to buy products/containers made from recycled material as often as possible to support the recycled product market. When purchasing paper products (toilet paper, etc.), look for paper that has been recycled using a minimum of 50% post-consumer waste. Also, purchase from companies that do not use chlorine to bleach their paper products (which creates dioxin waste). ■

Have you ever considered becoming a firefighter or emergency medical

technician but didn't make it your career? It's not too late.

In the revolutionary era towns like Greenfield, residents relied on volunteers for protection and emergency assistance. In those days it is said that volunteers would keep a musket or a bucket near the door. These 'minutemen' were ready to respond for any need that arose.

The fire service grew out of this early sense of community. This spirit lives today in the fire service throughout the country. Did you know that there are 1 million firefighters in the United States and 750,000 of these are volunteer firefighters?

Are you interested? If so, here are few answers to commonly asked questions.

Q: What are the criteria for service?

A: If you are over 18 years old and live in Greenfield you qualify to serve.

Q: What if I don't have any experience?

A: None of the current members had experience before starting. Formal EMT and Firefighter classes must be taken to achieve certifications; however there are several duties in an emergency which do not require certifications. You will pick up skills and informal training through drills and emergencies.

Q: I work out of town, am I still eligible?

A: Yes, many of the members work out of town. In-town, daytime members are certainly desired but this is not a requirement.

Q: What is the time commitment?

A: It is around 2-4 hours per month; one monthly department meeting and either a medical or fire drill. In addition there are several annual activities which the department members participate.
