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RUSSELL STATION ROAD



Russell Station Road resurfacing is reaching completion. The pictures above and below show the 60" culverts that the DPW installed to replace the previous ones, which were 36" and 48" water crossings. The larger culverts were required by the Department of Environmental Services to accommodate the potential of 100-year flooding. The two wetlands crossings were engineered by Sandford Engineering, and Merzi Trucking helped with excavation. The culvert work required re-routing traffic during the day, but the road was open at night. It was recently noted that having our DPW replace the culverts, instead of having the work done by an outside company, saved the town thousands of dollars. "It's been a learning experience," said DPW Manager Neal Beauregard. A big thank you goes out to the DPW crew. Thanks to the folks on Schoolhouse Road for their tolerance of increased traffic by their homes. Once the railroad ties are replaced, the last bit of paying will be accomplished by hand around the tracks. We are sure that the DPW will be glad to put the project to bed in the near future, and in the meantime, the crew extend their thanks to everyone on the road for being cautious and patient while the work was being done. - Greenfield Selectboard

Dr. Coville - More Than Blueberries By Lenny Cornwell

Dr. Frederick Coville had a vacation home just beyond Sunset Lake on the Crotched Mountain Road in Greenfield. He was the Chief Botanist for the USDA when he retired. Under his care also was the U.S. Arboretum in Washington, DC. Dr. Coville had been instrumental in promoting the Arboretum and eventually assumed the directorship when it finally became a reality.

After publishing a report on blueberries in 1910, Elizabeth White of Whitesbog, New Jersey, contacted Dr. Coville and the two of them began cultivating blueberry plants from both New Jersey and New Hampshire. "Brooks" and "Russell" were the names assigned to the plants removed from Crotched Mountain. The "Russell" bushes most likely came from Russell Hill as part of the Crotched Mountain area was called. The Frank Russell farm was a large farm located on the mountain; at one time, it was the biggest farm in Greenfield.

Work with the New Jersey and New Hampshire plants had been ongoing for years; 1916 is the first year the berries from the hybridized plants were ready for marketing. Other sources cite anytime between 1910 -1920. Although some question persists as to the actual year credited, the year 1916 to mark the 100th anniversary coincided with Greenfield's own 225th Celebration.

In addition to his efforts in hybridizing high bush blueberries, Dr. Coville had other interesting research travels. One in 1891 (the year of Greenfield's 100th Anniversary) took him to Death Valley to catalog plant life there for the U. S. Government. 1899 found Dr. Coville joining other scientists on the Harriman Expedition to Alaska to document plant life along with the animals, rocks and minerals of that region.

Dr. Coville was instrumental in starting the USDA Seed Laboratory. From his vacation home here, Dr. Coville foraged for what would eventually become a treat world-wide.

FROM THE RECYCLING CENTER

School season will be here soon and along with it comes new clothes, new footwear, new backpacks, new school supplies, in other words lots and lots of new things. Now much of the old must go to the Recycling Center sometimes becoming something new to someone else - recycled for yet another child. Throughout this cycle, we are always nearby to address concerns, answer questions, and offer direction as to where the best home would be for your items.

We often say "the trash industry is never boring" and here is a short story why. Recently we heard a motor running in the compactor but it was not the compactor itself. Bill "went into the trenches" to investigate and proceeded to sort through the bags to find the mystery. Normally we would also look for paperwork in the bag to identify where it came from but on this hot and humid day amidst all the slimy, smelly garbage, we chose not to. The mystery turned out to be a cordless toothbrush that was sitting directly on the metal bottom of the compactor and it was turned on. Now you ask, why go through such efforts? Facts: an unknown object in the compactor with a motor running is alarming. The landfills and incinerators have alarms for such materials as radiation (smoke/fire alarms) which would result in the load being sent back to us. At that point, we would have to unload the container and sort through all the bags to find the object. Yes, this does happen and it is not pretty. Even the pickup of our load would be refused on the spot with a noisy unknown object in it. ONLY kitchen trash is to go into the compactor. No items from clean outs of the garage, shed, basement or other rooms in the house will go in the trash compactor. Be aware that anything that is making noise in the trash or demolition calls for an investigation. And FYI rechargeable toothbrushes have a rechargeable battery in them which requires special handling. We must also be watchful of anything that could be a fire hazard. In the past year or so, there has been at least one fire in the trash at a transfer station. That is a real stinky and messy process to go through. It is important for the town that

We also have the saying "the trash industry is always changing, challenging and delightful" as you can now understand.

SUMMER HOURS: Tuesday 8am - Noon, Thursday 1pm - 7pm and Saturday 8am - 4pm. Please arrive 15 minutes before closing to allow enough time to process your load.

We have a new brochure we are handing out plus you will find it posted on the town's web site. Please take time to read it and see what is new.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE: Collections will end in October. You must take your items to Keene - information sheets are available here at the Recycling Center. To save yourself any trouble, please ask questions about your items before going to Keene.

TAKE NOTICE: All FIREWORKS must be in an open container (banana box?) so they can be checked. The town of Derry had a smoldering fire inside the building overnight recently in their trash collection and it was not discovered until morning. The fire department determined it was from fireworks that did not ignite as they should have. As you can imagine, this is very dangerous. Bear in mind - they just opened their new million dollar facility in January which houses processing of ALL materials indoors. Please help us to make sure all fireworks have ignited and are not dangerous before putting them in the trash. It makes no difference what time of year it is - this process needs to be followed for everyone's safety.

Feed bags that are plastic coated, inside or outside, are trash not mixed paper. The same goes for paper juice/milk cartons which are wax lined. With the mixed paper compactor coming soon, we must be watchful of what material is being added. Presently, we can retrieve any contaminates but with the compactor, we will not be able to do so. Your attention and cooperation in this matter is much appreciated.

REMINDERS:

• All trash must be in bags and tied closed.

• ALL METALS and BRUSH MUST BE CHECKED - We are being downgraded on our light metal container contents due to contamination. NO matter how sure you are of your items you must have them checked before depositing them in the container. If you follow the rule to have your load checked there will be no issues with the metal container contents or brush pile items. Remember it is the law that municipalities cannot burn yard waste or leaves therefore you must take your load to Mathewson Co. in Hancock - call #525-3549.

• Mini Mall and Library items must be checked. It would be very helpful to everyone if you would sort your load for the Mini Mall and Library before coming in. No fee-based items

such as electronics or furniture are permitted in these areas. Please be mindful if the items are broken, have missing pieces, are dirty, worn out or useless, no one else is going to want them. They will be considered trash and will be disposed of in another area as directed. Bear in mind if a consignment shop would not have it on its shelf to sell then we should not. I know, "it's free" but human nature is to only take into our own homes that which is clean and useful.

• Plastics, Steel/Tin cans, Aluminum cans, Corrugated Cardboard, Mixed Paper, Vegetable/Nut oils and Used Motor Oil specs are in the new handout.

• Lawn mowers and bicycles- must be checked and the history on usable lawn equipment is appreciated. All fluids must be drained and if mowers are going into the container, all tires must be removed.

THE FIRE CHIEF'S Corner

Mid summer's greetings from the Fire Department. We are experiencing an abnormally warm and dry summer. We are seeing many "High Fire Danger" days. Although most days it has been permissible to burn outside, please remember permits are required. Common sense and the law require that all outside burns be attended. There have been many brush fires state wide caused by carelessly tossed cigarette butts. We all need to be especially careful this summer.

I am pleased to report that we once again were able to save some substantial money by buying used equipment. The air bottles we depend on for interior firefighting have a maximum service life of 15 years. Our current bottles (we carry 24) will expire in the next couple of years. We were able to purchase 24 bottles from another department that were the same brand as ours with 12 years of service life left. They were upgrading to a larger capacity bottle... there is nothing wrong with these bottles. We paid \$225 for each bottle, they sell new for just over \$1,000 saving us nearly \$20,000.

Speaking of interior firefighting, we had our first serious structure fire in several years just a few weeks ago. We were toned for a Monday midday first alarm meaning we were on our usual weekday short staff. I responded to what proved to be a basement fire with reports of a "maybe there is a dog in there". Basement fires are the most dangerous and destructive fires we face. Going below ground without the benefit of windows that are easy to bail out of is not one of our favorite things to do. The fact that the rest of the house is sitting on top of the fire (and you) is a recipe for disaster. I conducted an initial search of the basement while waiting for our apparatus arrive. Sadly I was unable to reach the dog • Demo/Construction debris/ Bulky Waste and Electronics - Must see attendant. ALL have FEES applied.

When we did pull the dog out (after knocking the fire down), Peterborough's Medics intubated the dog and performed CPR... kudos to them for giving it their all. This fire could have been far worse; the extensive training that we have been doing paid off. We are grateful for such a positive result.

Two of our youngest members are leaving for the military. Trent Dubey is going into the Army and Emily Nichelsen into the Airforce. We wish these two fine young people all the best and safe passage on their journeys. But they will be missed! And so again I must ask... if any of you would like to join this department, we could use the help. We will give you the training and the tools to do this job. Remember... not all of us rush into burning buildings, some are medical only and that's OK. You will work with a very fine group of men and women who believe in service to community. You give us your time and commitment and we will help you with the rest. Give me a call (547-2222) even if you are just curious... I will be happy to give you a tour of the station and we can talk about what this job is all about. Maybe you will see something you like.

So that's all for now... until next time. And please remember, we are here 24/7 and stand ready... for all of you.




