ARE YOU CONNECTED?

Are you on the internet? Are you thinking about it but not sure? Want to know more? Read on!

Many people use the internet for only one or two things, such as e-mail and online shopping. Yet there is a vast wealth of information out there, freely available through search engines (Google, Yahoo, etc.). In addition to educational information (online encyclopedias, college and university courses, etc.) there are places to socialize, such as My Space, Second Life, social game sites, pen-pal and online dating sites, etc.

INTERNET INFO

Here are some basic terms relating to

the internet:

Dial-up: where you have to phone up to get on the internet because you do not have one of the broadband connections (DSL or cable), which are much faster.

E-mail: Most people are familiar with e-mail addresses using yahoo or hot-mail - the problem with them is that you often end up with a log in name not of your choosing. However, as I have my own website and a domain name, I am able to have a special e-mail address david@davidlloyd.ws, which is more informative than my ISP (Internet Serve Provider) address of bachgen@verizon.net.

Websites: Locations on the internet that contain information for others to access.

- Many people think that websites are only for companies or organizations, but more and more personal websites are appearing on the internet these

days. Here are examples of the kind of website I mean:

- Hobby Sites: For people who want to share with others their interests in such areas as poetry, painting, collections, model trains, etc., or want to display handicrafts or offer items for sale.

- Special Occasion Sites: These sites are places to share special occasions with families and friends, and include weddings, graduations, family albums, etc.

- In Memoriam: These sites contain memories of a loved one, such as photos and contributions from friends and family.

I design websites as a hobby, and have a diverse range of clients, including artists, poets, musicians, a gun trader, florists and landscaping organizations, etc. As you can see, the possibilities for websites can be as varied as one's imagination.

Website Hosting: When a website is

designed, it needs to be stored in a specific location on the internet accessible 24 hours a day. This service is provided by a web hosting company. There are a variety of hosting companies available, but many of those are available to spammers (organizations and people who send out bulk/junk e-mails.) I have found a local company in Peterborough by the name of CharlesWorks which owns its own servers (storage machines) and has safe-guards in place so that spammers cannot get at them!

In a subsequent article, I'll focus on basic computer tips and tricks.

NEWS FROM THE TOWN RECYCLING COMMITTEE (TRC)

The TRC is a group of Greenfield citizens convened by the the Conservation Commission to advise the Board of Selectmen (BOS) with respect to the administration and future of the Greenfield's Recycling Center (GRC). We meet at the Town Office Building at 7 PM on the first Thursday of each month, and the public is welcome to attend. Meeting minutes are posted in a timely manner on our link on the Town's website.

The current TRC membership includes: Neal Brown (Chair), Candi Fowler, Patrick Foy, Bob Jennings, Roger Lessard (Vice-Chair), Miriam Lockhart, Kent Vincent (Secretary), and Dan Wolaver. For more information about the TRC, contact Neal Brown at 547-2023 or at neal.brown@glsynthesis.com

CURRENT ACTIVITIES: (See meeting minutes for detailed agenda). Since our last Spirit article, we spent most of our time on two major tasks: (i) helping Frank Pelkey put together the 2007 GRC budget and (ii) developing a 10 year plan and "vision" for the GRC. Frank's budget is ready for presentation to the BOS on Nov 16th, and, thanks to the help and advice of Greenfield's Myron (Mike) Steere, we have made good progress in developing a long-range plan for the RC site. We have briefed the BOS on a preliminary version of the plan, and we hope to have a final, BOS-approved plan and accompanying 3-D model in place for public inspection before Town meeting next March.

GET INVOLVED IN RECYCLING - JOIN THE GRC VOLUNTEERS We are a group of 9 citizens which

includes Dan Beard, Neal Brown, Candi Fowler, Patrick Foy, Roger Lessard, Jim Orr, Everett Reed, Kent Vincent, and Dan Wolaver. We work exclusively on Saturdays, the busiest day at the GRC. We sort and process the various recyclables and, thus, free up Frank to maintain order in the Saturday-busy yard. At our present number, each volunteer works only one 3 hour stint per month - from either 9 AM to 12 noon or from 1 to 4 PM.

Given volunteer turnover, we constantly need more members to keep the monthly workload to the 3 hr minimum. So, inspired reader, how about answering the call and do your thing for Greenfield recycling? It's only 3 hrs' service per month, it's fun, and it's where most Greenfielders meet and greet. DEVELOPMENT AND OPEN SPACE

Have you heard about the major subdivision of duplexes off of Gulf Road, or the large subdivision being designed on Sawmill Road, or the smaller subdivisions either recently approved or being designed for Old Bennington, New Boston, Muzzey Hill, Cornwell, Miner, and Holden Roads? We could have hundreds of new homes and families in Greenfield in the next few years.

Although the current building boom has passed, it is inevitable that Greenfield will change and that we will grow, but we need to balance growth with protection of what makes Greenfield, Greenfield. Now is the time to start the process of balancing growth with protecting Greenfield's high-quality natural resources, its natural habitat and the animals that live here, its recreation opportunities, its forests and valuable wood products, and its rural scenery.

Many of us have land in current use, which is taxed at a lower rate than developed land. Whenever a landowner decides to develop a parcel that has been in current use, a penalty, called the land use change tax, is paid by the landowner to the town. At Town Meeting in March the Open Space Committee will be asking Greenfield residents to dedicate the funds from the land use change tax solely to conservation. The warrant article will request that all the funds from the land use change tax be put into the Conservation Fund. Currently, the Conservation Fund receives 100 percent of the funds with an annual cap of \$5,000, the balance goes into the General Fund. A \$5,000 annual cap does not provide nearly enough funds for preserving open space. In the next issue of the Spirit, we will provide more in-depth information and explain why this warrant article makes economic sense.

Like Sara Lee, nobody doesn't like the Mini-Mall, and there are probably few of us who hasn't found some treasure there. We all benefit by being able to recycle usable items to other residents rather than just toss them into the compactor or designated dumpster. However, we do not benefit when the Mini-Mall is used simply as a more convenient trash dumpster.

For the record, Greenfield residents should know that the Mini-Mall, as originally conceived, is a citizen-operated unit with no allocation of tax

dollars in the Recycling budget to keep it "neat" This means that the Greenfielders who use the Mini-Mall are also responsible for looking after it. Given this caveat, we suggest two ways to remedy the Mini-Mall problem. First, The TRC will consult with Frank about putting up more signs to better guide Mini-Mall users. Second, and most important, a hard-core Mini-Mall user needs to step up to the plate and volunteer to visit the facility on a regular basis and maintain order. If any of you is so moved, please contact me ASAP and I'll be pleased to help

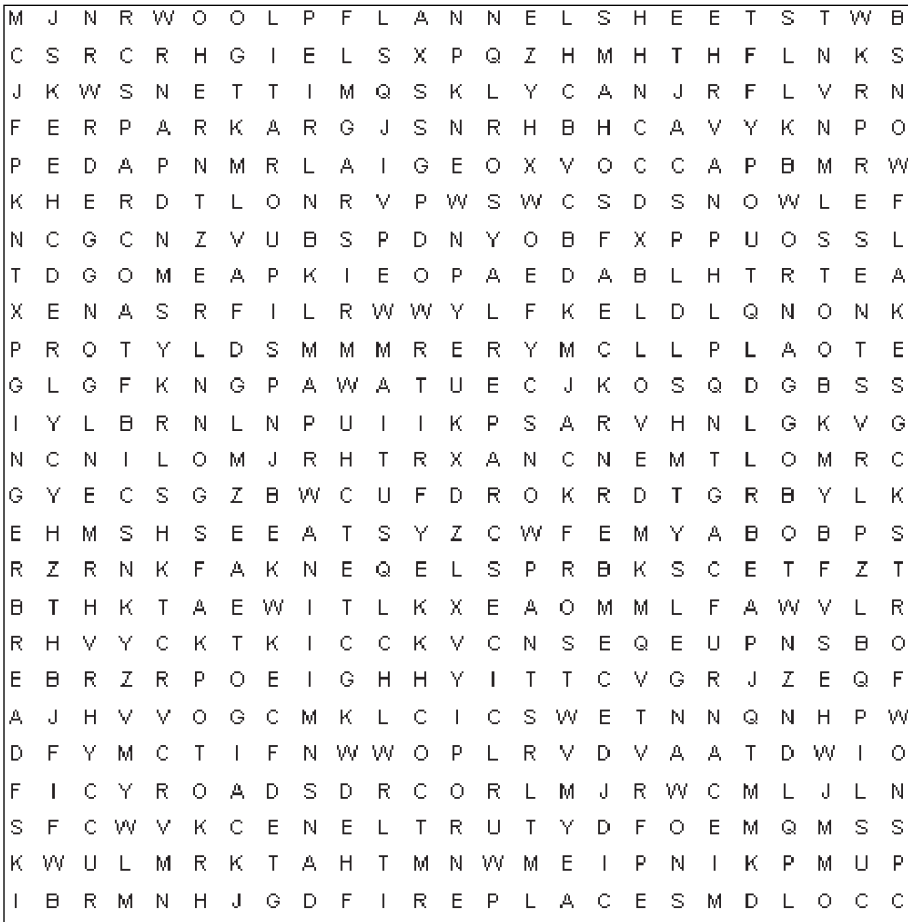

MAKE YOUR OWN HOLIDAY DECORATIONS

Ever wonder what to do with those left over branches from your Christmas tree? If a wreath sounds too difficult, try making holiday decorations such as swags, or table arrangements from them and a few simple materials. Here are a few tips.

Choosing Greens

Cone bearing or needle evergreens are commonly used in holiday decorations. You can purchase greens or carefully prune them from your home landscape. Some of the most suitable types are:

Balsam fir	Red pine
Douglas fir	White pine
False cypress	Red cedar
Austrian pine	Juniper
Yew	Scots pine

Avoid hemlock and spruce for indoor use since they drop their needles quickly.

Broad-leaved evergreens are commonly used as holiday greens where they grow as hardy landscape plants. Holly and boxwood are excellent choices. Others include barberry, Oregon holly-grape, English ivy and rhododendron.

Special care should be taken when harvesting this type of material not to damage the ornamental value of the plant.

Materials

In addition to greens, assembly of holiday decorations will require most of the following materials:

- Pruning shears, knife, or old scissors
- Wire, strong twine
- Wood pieces
- Hobby or florist's foam
- Sphagnum moss
- Cones, berried branches, ribbon, candles, etc.

Swags

A swag is an artistic bunching of one or more evergreen branches. Swags are one of the easiest and most effective decorations for a door.

You can make a simple swag by wiring three or four 18-to-30-inch-long branches together, tips down. Decorate with cones, ribbons, bells, seed pods, ornaments, gourds, toy musical instruments or fruits.

To make a shaped swag (for instance, an "S"), bend No. 9 wire into the desired shape; then wire on evergreen branches as you would in making a wreath, and add decorations to complete it.

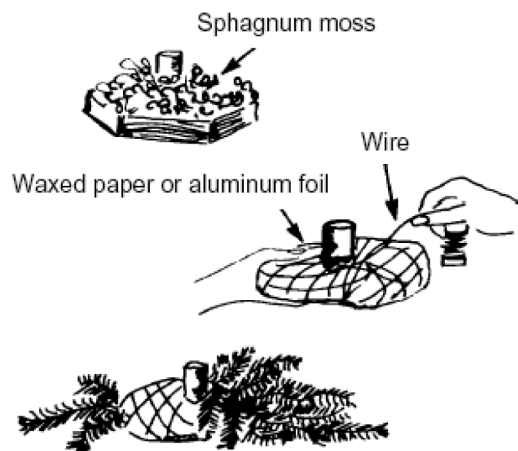
A large bow is usually fastened near the top.

Table Centerpieces

A table centerpiece should be planned well in advance to fit the table and its intended use. Centerpieces function as dividers at dining tables or as accents on coffee or side tables. Simple base shapes such as rectangles, circles, squares or triangles are most pleasing. Usually the height should be kept below the eye level of the

people at the table. Plan any candle arrangement before beginning construction. Small centerpieces can be made in low bowls filled with moss or florist foam. Sprays of cones, berries, or evergreens can be arranged in a bowl using a pincushion holder.

To construct your own centerpiece base, cut a wooden board to the desired size and shape. The dimensions should allow for the evergreen foliage to extend about 6 inches beyond the base all around. Drill appropriate holes for candles as desired. Place moist sphagnum peat moss on the board, wrap with waxed paper or aluminum foil and bind firmly with wire (see drawing below). Hobby or builder's foam may also be used as a base material without moss. However, this type of construction will cause the greens to dry out more quickly.



Prepare a centerpiece base by securing moss to a base board. Then insert cut ends of greens into the moist moss.

Next, sharpen short pieces of the desired evergreen foliage and stick into the moss or foam. Start at the outer edge with evergreen sprigs 6 to 7 inches long. Place them close together to cover the edge of the base. Continue to build the mound with shorter pieces of evergreen until the base is entirely covered. Candles should be added next. Place them in the holes that were drilled in the base earlier. Note that candles present a very real fire hazard in close proximity to cut greens. They should be lighted only when someone will be in the room. Tall candles, at least 15 to 18 inches high, are generally safer than shorter ones.

Each and every resident is welcome and encouraged to come to Town Meeting and help to shape the future of our town.

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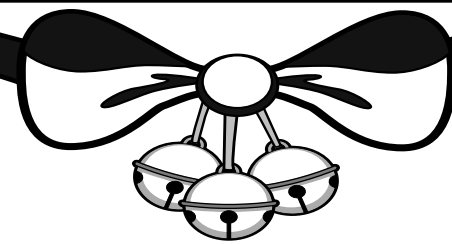

*A Gift from the Past - Eleanor has been gone for a long while from Greenfield
but her cookie recipe is remembered by many. Enjoy!*

Eleanor's Eastman's Old Fashioned Vanilla Sugar Cookies

4 cups flour
1 tsp baking soda
1 tsp salt
1 cup shortening
1 tbs vanilla extract
2 cups sugar
2 egg yolks
1 cup buttermilk
2 egg whites

Sift flour, baking soda, & salt together, set aside.

Beat shortening with vanilla extract in a large bowl. Add sugar gradually creaming thoroughly. Beat in the egg yolks until mixture is light and fluffy. Alternately add dry ingredients in fourths and buttermilk in thirds to creamed mixture, beating only until blended after each

addition. Using a clean beater, beat egg whites until stiff (not dry) peaks are formed. Fold into batter until blended. Drop about 2 tbs batter for each cookie onto greased baking sheets spacing batter 3 inches apart. Using the back of a spoon, spread & shape each into a 2 ½" round, ½" high. Sprinkle generously with vanilla sugar or colored sugar sprinkles.

Vanilla sugar: Bury 1 dried vanilla bean in a container holding 2 cups confectioner's sugar or regular granulated sugar. Cover the container tightly. The sugar will be sufficiently scented with vanilla to be used in a week or so. Add more sugar to the jar when you use some of its contents; the beans will be effective for many months.

Bake at 375 degrees for about 15 min. or until browned around edges. Immediately remove to wire racks and sprinkle with vanilla sugar. Makes 2 ½ dozen.
