HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

A NOTABLE FROM GREENFIELD'S EARLY DAYS

According to the town history, Peter Peavey settled into a log cabin he built in the southeast part of town (in the vicinity of the present Gulf Road) on land he bought in 1789. His brother followed him in 1790, buying neighboring land.

Peavey's structure was considered a typical pioneer cabin, built by those clearing forested land. It measured about eighteen feet and was a square building. A stone fireplace rose a bit above the loft floor before it became of stick and clay composition. There was no glass in the door or windows. However, oiled paper was used for one window; the other window openings were covered with boards that were removed at times to allow light into the cabin. The door opening was large enough to permit a hand-drawn sled loaded with logs for the large fireplace to be hauled inside the cabin.

The fireplace supplied light as well as heat and a cooking source. Pitch pine knots were often burned by the homesteaders to help light their homes. The knots were used like torches. A lot of the pitch pine came from the "plains" between Sunset and Otter Lakes.

Peter moved his belongings from his former Wilton home to Greenfield with a team of oxen. Mrs. Peavey followed on horseback with Peter, Jr. in her lap. The horse also had saddlebags, a large bundle behind the saddle and a lantern hanging from the saddle pommel. The horse made faster time than the ox team, so at the last house on the route, Mrs. Peavey lit the lantern candle so as to have a means of starting her fire at the new home. This last neighboring house was also the final one at the end of a well-traveled path. From there on, Mrs. Peavey had to rely only on blazes incised on the trees to guide her home.

Peter, Jr. grew up to volunteer in the War of 1812. He also became a deacon of the church and a leader of the choir for more than forty years. He lived to be ninety-one years old. On February 15, 2014, the Historical Society's Museum will

be open from 10 AM - noon as part of the Winter Carnival activities. Look for the schedule of events around town. The day's activities always add up to fun for the entire family.

The Historical Society Museum is open the last Saturday of every month, with the exception of December, from 11 AM until 1 PM. On those Saturdays, a work bee occurs prior to the opening (from 9 AM - 11 AM). During that time, all sorts of tasks (identifying people in photos, filing, and in warmer weather, outside gardening chores) are undertaken. Volunteers are always welcome to stop in and assist in the work bee.

The Historical Society is seeking the whereabouts of the Greenfield Cornet Band drum that was displayed in the Meeting House during the town's Bicentennial in 1991. We would like more information about this piece of memorabilia.

Monadnock Trail Breakers Partner with Rock the Hills VT Snowmobile Hillclimb Series

Local snowmobile club, MonadnockTrail Breakers, a non-profit organization, has spent the last several months preparing for exciting upcoming fundraising & community events. Namely, a first time event called the "Trail Breaker Challenge" to be held on March 1, 2014. The Monadnock Trail Breakers have partnered with a snowmobile racing series, Rock the Hills VT, to create a day of family-friendly snowmobile fun & education in Dublin, NH.

Located at the Engine Meet Field off Rte. 101 in Dublin, NH, this event will feature 2 professional snowmobile stunt shows by the freestyle riders from Treeline Sled Style. These riders fly over 40 feet high through the air with their machines performing acrobatic tricks in the air. Other featured events will be Snowmobile Side by Side Drag Racing; Obstacle Course & Barrel Race; Oval Track for Youth & Vintage Racing; and Vintage Snowmobile Snow. Vendors and concessions will also be present throughout the day.

The MonadnockTrail Breakers is a non-profit organization and is largely responsible for making the recreational use of many local trails possible through the winter months. The Trail Breakers belong to the NH Snowmobile Association and are very active in the Cheshire & Hillborough County Districts. Funding from this event will directly benefit the trail system through grooming & maintaining trails from Dublin through Peterborough, Greenfield, and all the way through Hancock for Walkers, Runners, Hikers, Equestrians, Skiers, Snowshoers, Snowmobilers and other winter recreational activities as well as maintaining club equipment. A portion of the event proceeds will also be donated to the Easter Seals. Currently the club is able to provide these trails for public use through fundraising and the volunteer efforts of members.

RECYCLING CENTER NEWS

Before we know it we will be seeing Robins in our yards and the sunny warmer days will be here. Another time of year to shed off our belongings that we are casting out. Remember to ask about your items so we can best recycle or dispose of them. Springtime also brings the start up of the Household Hazardous Waste collections and in April the Take Back Day Program, where you can safely dispose of old and unused medications. Dates for these events will be posted when available.

WINTER HOURS:

Hours: Tuesday 8am - Noon, Thursday 1pm - 5 pm, and Saturday 8am - 4pm.

Please arrive 15 minutes before closing to allow adequate time for taking care of your load.

Summer hours will start April 1st.

2013 recycled tonnage kept out of the trash this year:

CARDBOARD - 16.78 ALUMINUM CANS - 2.82 MIXED PAPER - 57.63 STEEL CANS - 7.2 REG. PLASTIC - 15.36 BALED PLASTIC - 3.15

This comes to 102.94 tons kept out of the trash. You saved: \$9,264.60 (would have cost \$90 a ton). This is in addition to the revenues from selling materials.

GLASS - Approximately 54 tons a year kept out of the trash. You would have paid \$5130 to put it in the trash (@ \$95 a ton). If the warrant article, for \$4860, is passed at town meeting, we will begin to clean up the large pile we have been accumulating. If we removed it all at once and kept up with the monthly accumulation, it would cost over \$11,000 but if we spread it over time, it will be easier to handle in the town budget. It will take 3.5 yrs to do this at \$4860 a year but this amount will include the yearly amount we recycle. We will pay \$23. + \$17.50 = \$40.50 a ton to remove the glass (includes hauling charges) but by doing it this way, we save \$54.50 a ton over putting it in the trash. Once the large pile is gone, we will be able to reduce our cost to approximately \$1792 a year (\$23 a ton + two hauls a year @ \$550).

CARDBOARD - remember anything that is corrugated is accepted. Packaging with printing and pictures on it, if corrugated, is accepted with all packaging materials removed. We are even utilizing waxed cardboard. The only cardboard not accepted would be if it were contaminated with paint, oil, grease or animal secretions. Sometimes it is hard to determine corrugated or not - when in doubt-tear it and you will see the waffle board - or not.

ALUMINUM CANS - we are also including aluminum pie and food pans/trays along with aluminum pet food cans. Empty and rinsed cans are vital for rodent and insect control.

PLASTIC - remember to rinse all jugs especially laundry soap containers. This slippery soap is a health hazardous for all.

MIXED PAPER - There are a few things that cannot be recycled here. These include used Kleenex and paper plates also wrapping paper, foils, waxed papers or any corrugated items.

STEEL CANS - Aerosol cans that are food related and household cleaner products can be deposited here. No spray paint cans or bug, pesticide, paint or automotive related cans. These are to be deposited in the metal container.

SCRAP METAL - Recycled separately from the trash - 20.33 tons this year. This number does not include the metals we separate out for a source of higher revenues for the town. Revenue from this is included in the above recycled revenue figure.

These are some other items you recycle but probably do not think of:

TEXTILES - no weights available as yet BOOKS - for reuse MINI MALL - household items for reuse CELL PHONES - varies FLAGS - varies

This is not a complete list but as you can see you have done very well with your recycling efforts in 2013.

Here are a few facts: It takes 2,250 plastic bags and plastic film to make one 16' composite decking board.

About 5% of all fabric manufactured is made from some type of recycled plastic.

Do you know? These materials will be reclaimed in the process of recycling 1 million cell phones: 35,274 lbs. of copper, 772 lbs. of silver, 75 lbs. of gold and 33 lbs. of palladium.

All Containers - glass, plastic, aluminum and steel - must be rinsed and clean. This is a safety and health issue for the staff and residents alike.

USED OIL: Please leave caps on the empty containers, as we will continue draining the last drops inside. Now there is a separate barrel at the plastics window just for these empty containers. Please remember to use a sturdy and secure container to drop off your used oil in - milk jugs are too flimsy and the lids are not secure. Thank you for your waste oil contributions which are used to heat the building.

METAL CONTAINER: We are recycling certain metals separately to bring in higher revenues for the town on these materials. So PLEASE have all your metal items checked. You may

CONSERVATION TRACKS

News of Conservation Doings

About the Greenfield Conservation Commission (GCC)

GENERAL INFO

Generally, the GCC meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Office building. Want to make a difference? Come and join us! (always double-check the meeting calendar on the town website, in case it has been moved).

What is a Conservation Commission? According to the 2004 Handbook for NH's Municipal Conservation Commissions, it "...is the only local body specifically charged with protecting natural resources; it provides a focal point within the municipal government for environmental concerns. Without a conservation commission, other boards may or may not be aware of and consider natural resources in carrying out their responsibilities."

What does the GCC do?...

The GCC is charged with protecting our natural resources, assisting landowners who want to put their land in easement, as well as managing conserved or designated town properties. We are in the process of developing management plans for the George Proctor and Koch-Brown properties. What does this mean? For parcels that have been given to the town for use as recreation areas or otherwise conserved, it is good stewardship to have a structured plan for its use. This could involve developing a trail system or it might call for managed forestry. Some members have taken seminars and there is a wealth of resources available to enable us to do this. If you want to help, or provide input, please come to our meetings - we are always glad to have more folks involved.

Also, since our membership is on the rise (but we are always looking for more!), we are getting involved in combating invasives! Some of us have already taken training courses. The State is making a big push now, because plant and insect invasives are really getting out of control. One member is also on the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Council (CNBRLAC), which is getting some training on battling aquatic invasives such as variable milfoil.

Speaking of milfoil...the State has been treating that encroaching invasive on Otter Lake, and hopes to have it conquered this year. Variable milfoil can be spread when folks take their boats from lake to lake without cleaning them off. GCC is at the heart of a new coalition to address it there and on the other lakes in town by potentially enlisting the cooperation of all interested parties. Although Sunset and Zephyr Lakes are not infected, it's only a matter of time! Training classes are targeted for May and August - watch for bulletins!

Two folks attended the Hillsborough County Conservation District meeting on December 11th. At that meeting, two of the three awards spotlighted Greenfield! The "Teacher of the Year" award went to Rachel Lunan-Hill from Greenfield Elementary School, and the "Tree Farmer of the Year" award went to Crotched Mountain Foundation. A rousing Congratulations! to Ms. Lunan-Hill and to CMF. The GCC is grateful for your commitment to the environment.

Don't forget Earth Day - coming up in April! The GCC celebrates by hosting the annual Roadside Round-up - save the date - April 26th!

Spotlight on...Forest Stewardship & Management...adapted from UNH Cooperative Extension

Forest landowners hold the key to protecting New Hampshire's environment. Three quarters of the state is owned by 84,000 people in properties averaging 40 acres.

What is Forest Stewardship?

Taking the time to care for your land is called "steward-ship"- the desire to leave the land better than you found it. The more you know about your land, the better. Good stewards of the land consider water quality, aesthetics, fish and wildlife habitat, timber, recreation, soils, wetlands and other unique places, rare plants and unique natural communities, forest protection, and cultural and historical features.

Forest management is the practical application of scientific, economic, and social principles to achieve forest stewardship goals and objectives.

The science of forestry is known as "silviculture" (the art and science of establishing and growing trees) and "silvicultural systems" are a planned series of treatments for tending, harvesting, and re-establishing a forest.

The trees we see today are here because of the climate, topography, soils, and past uses of the land. Forest management and silviculture gives us the tools to help us shape what our forests will look like in the future.

Here are a couple of excerpts from the booklet "Owning A Piece of the Forest" from the Extension:

Why Own Woodland?

Reasons for owning forest land are many and varied, including protection, income generation, aesthetics, wildlife, timber and fuel wood production, recreation, speculation, self-sufficiency or any combination of these. Most forest land lends itself well to multiple uses.

If you currently own woodland or plan to purchase property, you should find answers to the following questions.

- 1. Does the property have the characteristics which meet your objectives?
- 2. If a major objective is to produce forest products and generate income, what is the potential?
- 3. Where can you get sound advice?
- 4. Is there an accurate boundary description and map of the land? Is there a licensed survey?
- 5. Is the property enrolled in current use?
- 6. What are the state and federal tax considerations related to woodland ownership?
- 7. Has a comprehensive management plan been prepared?

Assessing your objectives will help you decide what type of woodland best suits your needs and provide you with direction.

Stewardship Planning

Forest landowners are encouraged to have a forest steward-ship plan prepared by a licensed forester or other qualified natural resource professional. The plan matches the land's capabilities with landowner objectives in a customized working document. A stewardship plan addresses fish and wildlife habitat, water resources, recreation, forest protection, soils, timber, wetlands, aesthetic values, cultural features and endangered species. Besides giving management direction, a plan is necessary for certain current use assessment categories and certified Tree Farm status.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Conservation Commission: This committee is involved with the protection of Greenfield's natural resources. If you have an interest in conservation and protecting the natural environment, you may call, Carol Irvin at 547-2037.

COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS EXTEND TO A PRINT VERSION

In April 2012, the Planning Board began a series of Community Conversations designed to solicit information about what residents valued in town and goals they felt we should aspire to achieve. Growing out of those ideas, a vision statement was developed and adopted by the Planning Board in August, 2012. The Board then began to explore the availability of resources, (grants) that would enable us to accomplish those goals. We applied for one of those grants, the Community Planning Grant #2, using federal HUD money disbursed by the NH Housing Finance Authority, and were awarded that grant (\$23,300) on March 12, 2013. We have a number of requirements about how that money is to be spent. One of those requirements, Outreach, requires that we create new ways to reach out to the public we serve. We have accomplished this grant requirement in different ways:

- Several articles have appeared in the Greenfield Spirit in 2012 and 2013 informing residents of outreach efforts, apprising readers of the progress of the initiative and promoting future events.
- Two colorful historically themed post cards have been sent out to all households informing them of upcoming conversations.
- We have created an EDDM (Every Door Direct Mail) letter that we sent out in December to reach out with information.
- The last of these new outreach efforts from the Planning Board will be to create a "Spirit-like" Community Conversation mailing for every household in which we try to inform the public about the upcoming Town Meeting, including ballot questions and warrant articles that will appear.

Though modelled after the "Greenfield Spirit", the intent of this edition is a bit different in that it is a tool the Planning Board is using, funded by our grant, to try to help voters understand the local issues they face. We hope you'll find this outreach informative and helpful as you try to decide how to cast your votes. Look for this outreach in late February or early March, in time for Town Meeting.

Last season we boiled 4,000 gallons of sap which turned into 61 gallons of maple syrup. We have sap lines in Greenfield and Hancock and of course had to hang some buckets for the picturesque look! New Hampshire Maple weekend takes place on March 22 and 23. Sugar houses are opened throughout the state for you to tour.
