Community Wastewater System Update

On April 20, 2005 the Town of Greenfield entered into a contract with Scott Construction Company, Inc. (SCI) from Ludlow, Vermont for the construction of the community wastewater system. SCI is scheduled to begin construction on May 16, 2005 and should be substantially completed in 120 days. The project manager will be Ed Gaudreau. He will be on-site during construction.

It is anticipated that by September the system will be ready to accept wastewater from the designated users. Hook-ups will be located for the home/business owners to connect to. This connection will be done at the home/business owners expense and will be supervised by a town official.

The Selectmen are anticipating several meetings with the potential users. These meetings will be advertised and participation is highly encouraged. We would like everyone

to know what to expect and have a chance for questions to be addressed.

Please remember that the wastewater site (the former East Coast Steel lot) is a construction zone and no one should be on the site. If you must enter the site, a hard hat is required. Once again, the Selectmen ask for your cooperation and regret any inconvenience this project might cause. This is the last project from the 2000 Bond vote and we are very excited to have it underway. As always, if there are questions or concerns, please direct them to the Town Office.

Greenfield Fire Department Safety Tips *Brought to you this issue by EMT-I Linda Dodge.*

Gas Grill Safety

Safety tips to reduce the risk of fire or explosion with gas or charcoal grills:

- * Check and replace propane supply hoses that are cracked or brittle to prevent leaks. Make sure there are no sharp bends in the hoses or tubing.

- * Move gas hoses as far away as possible from adjacent hot surfaces and dripping hot grease.

- * Always keep propane gas containers upright.

- * Never store spare propane or other fuel containers indoors or near the grill.

- * Never store or use flammable liquids, like gasoline, near the grill.

- * Never keep a filled propane or fuel container in a hot vehicle or trunk.

- * Make sure your spark igniter is consistently working to ignite and burn the propane gas.

- * Never operate an outside cooking device inside the house.

- * Never operate your grill near the siding of your home or other flammable materials.

- * Never use an outside fryer on or near a deck or other flammable materials. Cooking oil that splatters from a fryer can easily ignite anything the oil contacts.

Charcoal Grill Safety

Charcoal as well as other forms of fuel that are completely or adequately

burned produce carbon monoxide (CO) when burned. CO is a colorless, odorless gas that can accumulate to toxic levels in closed environments. To reduce the risk of CO poisoning:

- * Never burn charcoal inside homes, vehicles, tents, or campers.

- * Charcoal should never be used indoors, even if ventilation is provided.

- * Since charcoal produces CO fumes until the charcoal is completely extinguished, do not store the grill indoors with freshly used coals.

TOWN BEACH REGULATIONS

Sunset and Zephyr Lakes

1. The town beaches are for residents and taxpayers of the Town of Greenfield, N.H. only. Guests are permitted when accompanied by a resident or taxpayer. Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on your vehicle. You may obtain the sticker from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons at Sunset Lake may obtain a temporary permit.
2. The beaches are open to residents between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
3. NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beaches!
4. No open fires are permitted.
5. No vehicles are allowed on the beaches.
6. Disturbing noises and/or music is prohibited.
7. Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. These are carry in/carry out facilities.
8. Alcoholic beverages prohibited.
9. Flotation devices allowed with caution and care.
10. Fishing allowed outside of where others are swimming and roped beach areas.
11. Do not feed the ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.
12. No horseplay.

The beach water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swimming, please abide by the signage posted.

MORE INFO ON ZEPHYR LAKE

- The picnic tables at Zephyr Lake Beach will be getting refurbished as well as a new coat of paint. We will also be mowing the lawn there.
- Zephyr Lake Beach is "**Swim at your own Risk**", as there is no lifeguard on duty at any time.

MORE INFO ON SUNSET LAKE

- Lifeguard will be on duty starting mid to late June.
- "No lifeguard on duty" sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.
- Listen to the lifeguards at all times.
- Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.
- Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.

Floating Raft Rules:

1. No rough play.
2. No tipping of the floating rafts.
3. No other flotation devices other than noodles to the floating raft.
4. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the rafts.
5. No swimming under the rafts.
6. No dogs.

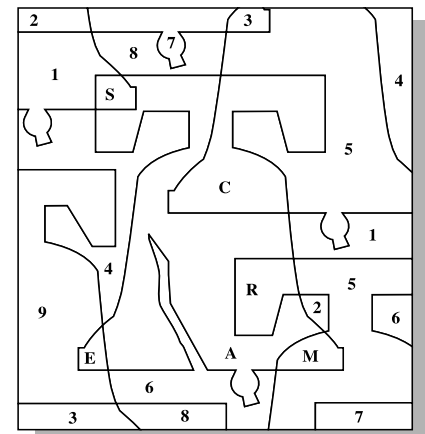

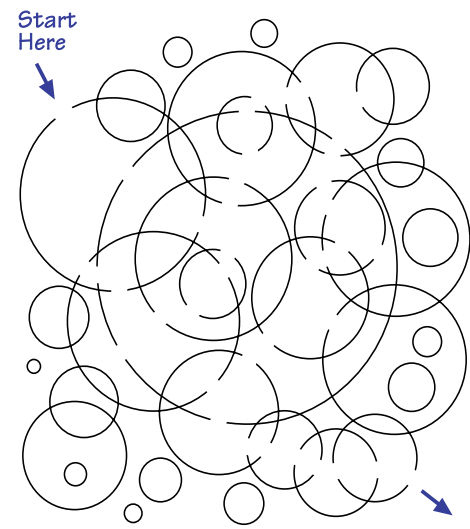

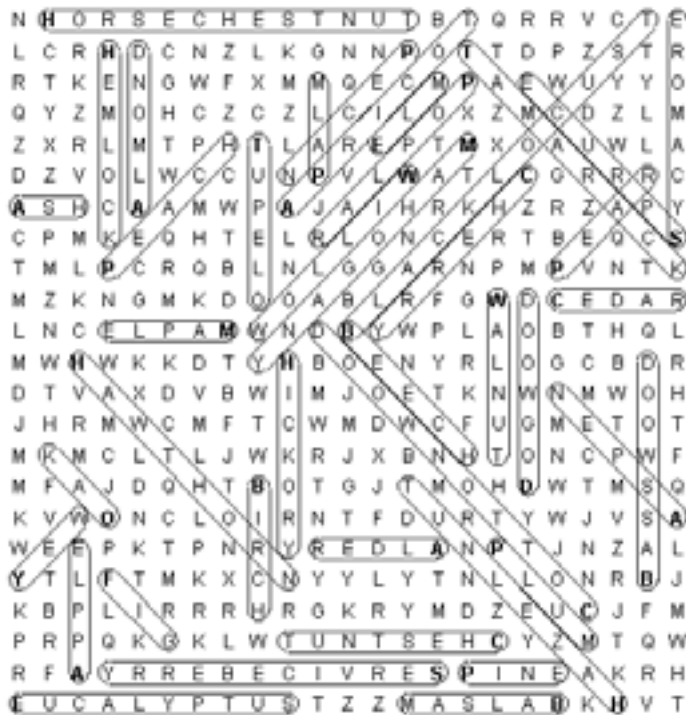

The Piscataquog Watershed Association urges you to learn to identify and control these problem plants in your area.



**Multiflora Rose,
Rambler Rose
(Rosa multiflora)**



Bad Habits: Can dominate a forest understory by creating dense, impenetrable thickets that crowd out other vegetation; inhibits regrowth of native plants and ultimately slows down forest regeneration; grows in moist and dry soil.

Look For: Robust perennial shrub with thorny arching stems; alternately arranged compound leaves with seven or nine leaflets; large clusters of fragrant white or pink flowers bloom in June and July; small red hips are eaten and transported by birds.

Management:

- 1) Repeat cuttings (6 in each of two years) of small infestations, or bulldoze large areas with responsible disposal.
- 2) Apply glyphosate or triclopyr to leaves.

Native Alternatives: Common blackberry, flowering raspberry, pasture rose, swamp rose.

Greenfield has many natural attractions for outdoor enthusiasts. We have a state park with over 200 campsites, 3 lakes, 4 mountains, and 50+ miles of trails.

Our trails need attention today, so that they will be here tomorrow. Twenty miles of trails have become unusable due to underbrush, bridges in disrepair, new beaver habitats and erosion. It is the goal of the GTA to rehabilitate these trails to make them easily accessible to the public.
