BARBARA C. HARRIS CAMP

The Board of Selectmen has reached a settlement agreement with the Barbara C. Harris Center with regards to a "payment in lieu of taxes" (PILOT) - a portion of that settlement includes:

1. "Camperships" to allow two children from Greenfield who need financial support to attend the summer camp programs at the center free of charge for up to two weeks per/child.
2. On an "as available" basis, to allow the ballfield to be used for local baseball or softball league play.
3. They will also be offering a "community day" at the center. Residents of the town will be invited to visit the center to make use of the facilities that are conveniently usable for such an occasion. The Center shall determine the date of the community day and services and facilities that can be made available for the occasion.
4. The center will also offer short term emergency support for the emergency

needs of residents of the community for food & housing as available.

Greenfield Fire Department Safety Tips

Fireworks safety tips from the NH Department of Safety

1. Follow local and state laws regarding the display and possession of fireworks. Make certain to read and follow all directions, caution labels and warning labels on each individual firework device.
2. Never allow children to handle, play with and/or light any type of fireworks.
3. Do not consume alcohol while handling fireworks.
4. Always display fireworks in a clear, open area free of overhead objects. Always provide for a safe distance between buildings and any viewing audience.
5. Always light fireworks on a hard, flat and level surface to insure stability of the device.
6. Never extend any part of your body over the top of any device.
7. Always ignite one device at a time.
8. Never attempt to re-ignite, alter, or fix any fireworks device which has failed to fire.
9. Always have a form of fire suppression nearby. (fire extinguisher, hose, or bucket of water)
10. Be cautious of igniting aerial devices during high wind conditions.
11. Never aim, point, throw, or shoot fireworks at another person.
12. Always store fireworks in a cool, dry place and dispose of properly.

160-C: 11 Possession and display of Permissible Fireworks

~ Any person 21 years of age or older may possess permissible fireworks except in a municipality which has voted to prohibit possession.
~ Any person 21 years of age or older may display permissible fireworks on private

property with the written consent of the owner, or in the owners presence, except in a municipality which has voted to prohibit display.

Certain Sparklers Prohibited; Penalties 160-B: 16

- I. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the sale, possession or display of class "C" sparklers or those consisting of a wire or stick which contain chlorates or perchlorates is prohibited.
- II. Any person who sells or possesses with intent to sell class "C" sparklers or sparklers consisting of a wire or stick which contain chlorates or perchlorates shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- III. Any person who displays or possesses without intent to sell class "C" sparklers or sparklers consisting of a wire or stick which contain chlorates or perchlorates shall be guilty of a violation.

UPDATED: DECEMBER 30, 2003 DEFINITIONS

Permissible - No Restrictions: The local community has no adopted ordinance for the possession and/or display of Permissible Fireworks.

Permissible - Permit Required: The consumer must obtain a local permit, contact your local fire department.

Prohibited: The possession and display of Permissible Fireworks is prohibited.

Prohibited - Display Only: Only the displaying of Permissible Fireworks is prohibited.

UNREGULATED NOVELTY FIREWORKS

Pursuant to NH RSA 160-B and 160-C retail stores not possessing a license to sell

New Hampshire approved permissible fireworks are only allowed to sell the following unregulated consumer firework devices which are classified as novelties:

SPARKLERS: A wire or stick coated with a pyrotechnic composition, not exceeding 3.5 oz per item. Pursuant to NH RSA 160 - B: 16, sparklers shall not contain any chlorates or perchlorates.

PARTY POPPERS: A small plastic or paper item containing not more than 0.25 grains (16 mg) of explosive composition that is friction sensitive. A string protruding from the device is usually pulled to ignite it. This item expels non-flammable paper streamers or other non-flammable novelties, or both, and produces a small report.

SNAPPERS: A small, paper wrapped item containing not more than 0.02 grains (1 mg) of explosive composition coated on small bits of sand, and packaged with sawdust in individual containers of not more than 50 units. When dropped, the device explodes, producing a small report.

SNAKES: A pressed pellet of not more than 0.07 oz (2g) of pyrotechnic composition and packaged in retail packages of not more than 25 units that produces as the primary effect a snake like ash upon burning. The ash expands in length as the pellet burns.

NON-PERMISSIBLE FIREWORKS

Firecrackers, Reloadable aerial shells, Missiles, Bottle rockets, Smoke Bombs / Balls, and salutes are examples of New Hampshire Non-Permissible Fireworks.

CONSERVATION NEWS

Turtle Time!

Between May and July, female turtles will leave the water and seek out soft, sandy soils in which to dig a hole, lay their eggs, and then return to the water. Unfortunately, turtles are often seen laying eggs on the soft shoulders of roads. The best thing to do is to leave them be, and hope for the best. The

eggs will hatch sometime between September and October. Once hatched, the infant turtles' instinct is to head for the water.

Often a turtle may lay eggs in an area that is going to be disturbed, such as a child's sandbox or a pile of loam that is going to be spread. If this is the case, you can attempt to relocate the nest in a nearby area that will not be disturbed. Carefully dig up the eggs, noting how deep they were buried, and relocate them in a similar soft/sandy soil at the same depth. With any luck, come September or October, the eggs will hatch.

Turtle crossings!

Because mother turtles are crossing the road seeking higher ground to lay their eggs, please avoid hitting them and if possible, you might want to help the turtle across the road - but remember always to move turtles in the direction they are headed. If they are moved back to the side they came from, they will just try to cross the road again. Caution - be careful handling those snappers! Once the eggs hatch, be on the look out for babies crossing the road headed for the water. Sawmill Road, Zephyr Lake Road and Forest Road around Russell Station Road are some areas that see a lot of turtle traffic. The Conservation Commission has posted signs this year as a reminder to slow down and be careful!

Your Pets

Keep your cats and very small dogs inside at night, which is when predators are most active. Fisher, fox, and coyote are all species located throughout the state that prey upon small animals, which include squirrels, chipmunks, rabbits, as well as cats, very small dogs, or livestock such as chickens. When your pets or livestock are roaming outside, they are leaving their scent wherever they go. This is what attracts any of these predators. If you feel you must let your cat out, you may want to consider being outside with it since fisher, fox, and coyote keep their distance from humans. If you have a small dog, be outside when it is outside. If you have livestock, such as chickens, keep them in a pen instead of

letting them roam. You can contact wildlife control operators to remove fisher, fox, or coyote, but as long as the cat, dog, or livestock are allowed to roam around, predators will return.

Bears

Black bears are very active this year because they had only a thin layer of fat when they denned this winter. To avoid conflicts, follow these guidelines:

- Take down, clean and put away bird feeders (should have been done by April 1). Store the bird feeder until late fall. (Birds will do just fine with the natural foods available.) Bear damage to bird feeders is a common and growing Spring complaint.

- Clean up spilled seed below feeder stations.

- Keep garbage in airtight containers inside your garage or storage area. Double bagging and the use of ammonia will reduce odors that attract bears.

- Garbage for pickup should be put outside the morning of collection and not the night before.

- Do not place meat or sweet food scraps in your compost pile.

- Do not leave pet food or dishes outdoors at night.

- Clean up and/or store outdoor grills after use.

- Use a bear-proof dumpster.

- Never intentionally feed bears to attract them to your yard for viewing.

These guidelines are recommended so that you can stay safe while enjoying the wonderful wildlife that we have been blessed with here in Greenfield.

Open Space Supports Our State's Economy

Open space is big business in New Hampshire, where tourism and recreation, working forests, vacation homes and agriculture make important contributions both to our landscape and to our economy. Economic uses of open space in New Hampshire directly and indirectly contribute 25% of the gross state product and employ 16% of our workers. Thirty five percent of state and local taxes are generated by open space-related activities. With the state's population growing at 12,000 to 15,000 people a year, each town needs to find the most suitable places for affordable homes and businesses to support the growing population. Smart growth will plan for a variety of employment options and housing types, so both the young and old, working or wealthy can live in our town. The bottom line is that protecting open space means lower taxes in the long run.

According to the 2000 Census, New Hampshire has the fastest growth rate in the Northeast. Southern New Hampshire is absorbing most of the state's population growth and resulting residential development. In fact, projections indicate that 85% of the state's growth will occur on just 33% of the land area - mostly in Rockingham, Hillsborough, Merrimack, and Strafford counties. This growth is undermining the high quality of life

rooted in our natural and working environment and rural character. Not coincidentally, most of the communities that passed funding for protection of open space in the past two years are in these counties and are along major traffic corridors, including Interstate 93, Route 101, and Route 16 where new residential growth is most concentrated. Citizens in these areas recognize that growth will continue, and that the most direct and permanent way to ensure public open space for future generations is to acquire land or conservation easements.

Greenfield's Future

Keeping in mind the now-accepted facts about how development drives up tax rates, the time has come for us to take action to protect our beautiful town. If you own land that you would like to protect, contact us. There are ways to protect your land for future generations to enjoy, and some of those ways don't cost that much money! Learn the different ways your land and other land in Greenfield can be protected and conserved - call Karen Day, Chair of the Conservation Commission, at 547-2985.

SUMMER READING PROGRAM

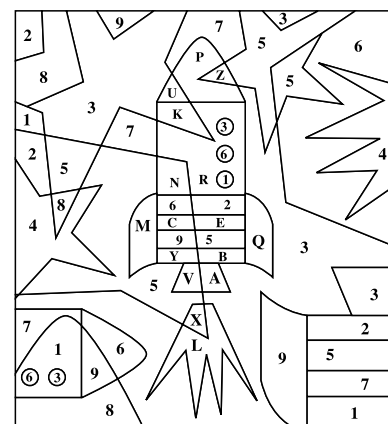

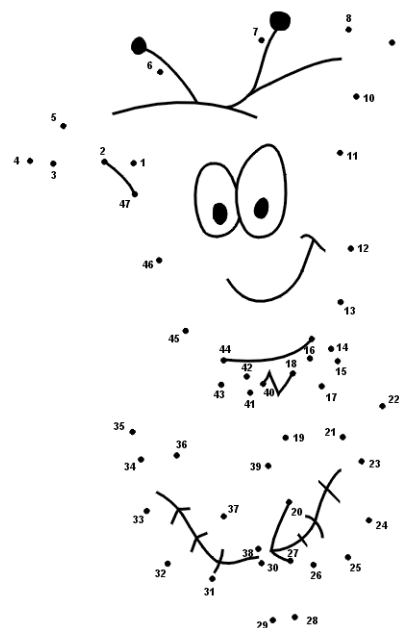

TOWN BEACH REGULATIONS

1. The town beach is for residents and taxpayers of the Town of Greenfield, N.H. only. Guests are permitted when accompanied by a resident or taxpayer. Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on your vehicle. You may obtain the sticker from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons may obtain a temporary permit.
2. The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
3. NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beach!
4. No open fires are permitted.
5. No vehicles are allowed on the beach.
6. Disturbing noises and/or music is prohibited.
7. Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.
8. Alcoholic beverages prohibited.
9. Do not feed the ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.

Zepher Lake Beach does not staff a lifeguard. Swim at your own risk.

At Sunset Lake Beach:

A No Lifeguard on Duty sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

Listen to the lifeguards at all times.

Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.

Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.

No Horseplay.

Floation devices are allowed with caution and care.

Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!

Floating Raft Rules:

1. No rough play.
2. No tipping of the floating rafts.
3. No other floatation devices other than noodles to the floating raft.
4. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the rafts.
5. No swimming under the rafts.
6. No dogs.
7. Raft may not be available during swimming lesson hours. Please adhere to the rules of the Water Safety Instructor.

The beach water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swim, please abide by the signage posted. It's there for your safety. These conditions will also be posted on the Town Website, should the need arise.

DOGGIE DO-NOT~

For those of you that walk a dog, please remember that you must clean up if a mess is made. We would like to maintain a mess-free park for all, including Rover, to enjoy! Please also make sure that Rover is leashed at all times.

DON'T THROW YOUR TRASH IN MY BACKYARD....

There has been a concerning amount of unsightly trash being thrown around the grounds of Oak Park and at the beaches. Please remember that the two beaches and Oak Park are carry-

in/carry-out facilities. When trash is around, so come the skunks and raccoons. Remember to take all of your trash, water/soda bottles, and diapers with you when you leave.

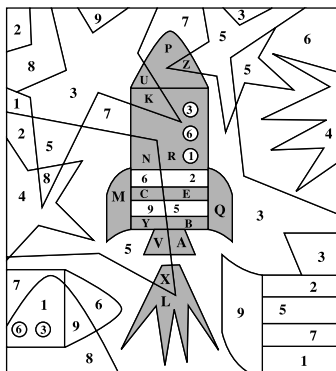
