PROPERTY TAX RELIEF APPLICATIONS

(May 1 - June 30) Deadline

*Are you single with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$20,000?

*Are you married or head of a NH household with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$40,000?

If you answered "YES" to one of these questions, and

- You own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax; and

- You resided in that homestead on April 1 of the year for which the claim for relief is made,

You may be eligible for relief on your property taxes. Claims for state education property tax relief shall be filed with the Department of Revenue between May 1 to June 30th.

THE CONTOOCOOK VALLEY TRANSPORTATION COOPERATIVE (CVTC)

The CVTC has formed a board of Town Representatives whose role is to pull together a group of citizens in each town to develop transportation options within their communities.

In addition to ridesharing and volunteer driver networks, CVTC plans to develop new transportations options such as fixed route transit along major routes, and to coordinate existing and future transportation options through information sharing. CVTC will offer technical assistance to municipalities and other groups such as transportation funding, liability insurance, and vehicle leasing and purchasing. Options will be accessible through a single toll free number and a website.

A very intriguing tale was told at the April meeting of the Historical Society - Woman's Club. Marcia Schmidt Blaine kept the attention of the audience with the true story of Susannah Johnson's family and some neighbors who were captured by the Indians and taken to Canada from Charlestown, New Hampshire in the 1750's. Money was the motive for the capture. Held for ransom, money paid helped fund the French War effort.

Amazingly, all of the people in their group survived to come back home seven years later. A truly captivating

THE GIVers' EXCELLENT NEW ADVENTURE: A COMMUNITY GARDEN

Rationale: Whether we like it or not, the era of cheap fossil fuel is rapidly coming to an end. To accommodate this, most of us will have to make major adjustments in how we live. One of the most important adjustments will be how we obtain a secure food supply. The current system of industrial-scale factory farming, a system highly dependent on fossil fuel-driven techniques and fossil "fueled" interstate transport of goods - will no longer be economically feasible. In its place we will have to develop a more local system for producing our food - i.e., a system like we had in the '40s, driven by local farms and home gardening (How many were kids with a "Victory" Garden in the early war years of 40s?). After pondering the above scenario, our group has been seeking a way to re-acquaint ourselves and our fellow Greenfielders with the art of growing one's own food.

Vision: We are seeking to develop a Europeanstyle Community Garden - an enterprise in which a Greenfield family may have a small plot of its own on which to garden.

Where will this garden be? On Town land in full public view. Specifically it will be located on the old ball field by the Town Offices. Our use of this land has the blessing of the Selectboard. It is well situated to capture maximum sun, it is well drained, it is handy to water, and it is big enough to accommodate a large number of citizen plots. In sum, it is next to an ideal site.

First step: By the time this Corner goes to press we should have constructed our first "demonstration" beds to showcase the approach we plan to take.

Details of organization: We plan to take an allorganic approach and employ wood-framed, raised-bed plots. Beyond this, there is much left to be decided. i.e., What signage will we need? Will there be a fee or not to join? Should we have a gartenmeister? Should we have a communal compost pile? Do we need an anti-varmit fence around the perimeter or a shed in which to keep tools? Etc., etc.

So, fellow Greenfielders, are you with us? If you are interested in signing on for a plot or if you would consider contributing your time or materials (i.e., compost, lumber for building beds, loam, wood chips, bark mulch, fencing materials, etc.), please call Neal Brown at 547-2023.

GREENFIELD GROWS!

Recently, eighteen Greenfield residents met at the library to discuss the rising cost of food and fuel and how Greenfield as a community might address this new challenge to our lives. Many ideas were presented. It was noted that in 1944, 44% of the nation's fruit and vegetable needs were raised by amateur gardeners. We identified that we had many talented gardeners and farmers and a tradition of self-sufficiency in New England. However, it was mostly agreed that a new paradigm needs to be developed around food. The GIVERS are in the process of establishing a demonstration garden plot in the old school field behind the Town Office Building. Some of us thought that we could expand the GIVERS idea by offering our expertise and support to establish additional garden plots for individuals and families in Town who would like to grow some of their own food.

As a group we hope to continue meet-

ing informally, sharing ideas, food and establishing a network of support with each other and with others. A Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on your vehicle. You may obtain the sticker from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons may obtain a temporary permit.

The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.

NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beach!

No open fires are permitted.

No vehicles are allowed on the beach.

Disturbing noises and/or music is prohibited.

Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.

Alcoholic beverages are prohibited.

Do not feed the ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.

Listen to the lifeguards at all times.

Lifeguards have the discretion to ask

parties to leave the beach premises.

Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.

No Horseplay.

Floatation devices are allowed with caution and care.

Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!

The beach water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swimming, please abide by the signage posted. It's there for your safety. These conditions will also be posted on the Town Website, should the need arise.

Zephyr Lake Beach does not staff a lifeguard. Swim at your

own risk. At Sunset Lake Beach: A No Lifeguard on Duty sign will be posted when there is no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

OAK PARK REMINDERS: DOGGIE DO-NOT~

For those of you that walk a dog, please remember that you must clean up if a mess is made. We would like to maintain a mess-free park for all, including Rover, to enjoy! Please also make sure that Rover is leashed at all times.

Reminds me that when my parents came to town in 1946, my father started growing truck garden produce. He used horses to work the land. Growing several acres of cucumbers, string beans, and other vegetables to be sold to a broker. In the end, the buyer found fault with the cucumbers, so a lot lower price was paid. The string beans sold that year, but not the next. My mother canned lots of them. So many, it was about 30 years before she would let any more be grown on the farm, and none of those were canned. I still have two horse drawn cultivators my father used then. Now both are painted up and used only as garden accents.

LET'S "PAWS" FOR ANIMALS by J. Romanelli

Turtle time! Between May and July, female turtles will leave the water and seek out soft, sandy soils in which to dig a hole, lay their eggs, and then return to the water. Unfortunately, turtles are often seen laying eggs on the soft shoulders of roads. The best thing to do is to leave them be, and hope for the best. The eggs will hatch sometime between September and October. Once hatched, the infant turtles' instinct is to head for the water. Often a turtle may lay eggs in an area that is going to be disturbed, such as a child's sandbox or a pile of loam that is going to be spread. If this is the case, you can attempt to relocate the nest in a nearby area that will not be disturbed. Carefully dig up the eggs, noting how deep they were buried, and relocate

Summer Cleaning and Ladder Safety

Nature is undergoing a fresh start and so are homeowners who are ready to clean up the debris that has been accumulating in basements, storage sheds, and garages over the winter.

• Household and pool chemicals, paints, and poisons should be properly marked and stored under lock and key, away from children's reach. Dispose of any that are leaking, expired, or that look bad.

• When cleaning up hazardous chemicals wear rubber gloves and follow the safety directions on the packaging.

• Never mix chemicals in the same container if you don't know how to dispose of them, seek outside advice. Never put them into the trash or pour down the drain.

• Make sure gasoline and cleaning fluids are well marked and stored in a cool, dry place away from the house and out of the reach of children and pets. Use only approved con-tainers for gasoline storage.

• Never use gasoline to clean skin, clothes, auto parts, or floors.

• Clean up work areas. Put dangerous tools, adhesives, matches, or other work items away from children's reach.

• Check your barbecue grill for leaks and cracks, and be sure to store any propane tanks away from your house and garage.

• Remove all fire hazards, including stacks of rags, newspapers, and magazines. Pay special attention to the spaces around your furnace, hot water tank, fireplace, space heaters, and dryer, as well as under the stairs.

Ready to do some home repairs? On average about 145,000 people in the US visit emergency rooms each year because of ladder mishaps. Here are a few ladder safety tips.

• Read the manufacturer's instructions that come with your ladder. They contain guidelines for weight and height limits as well as for the proper use of

their product.

• Inspect the ladder before using it to make sure there are no loose or broken rungs.

• Make sure the ladder is the right height for the job. Many accidents happen when people over extend their reach because their ladders are too short.

• Never stand on a ladder's bucket shelf.

• Make sure the ladder is completely open and that all of its feet are planted on a firm, level surface. Extension ladders should not be placed at an angle that is too extreme.

• Avoid using a metal ladder near electrical sources.

• Face the ladder when climbing down and make sure your weight is centered.

them in a similar soft/sandy soil at the same depth. With any luck, come September or October, the eggs will hatch.

Turtle crossing! Because female turtles are crossing the road seeking higher ground to lay their eggs, please avoid hitting them and if possible, you might want to help the turtle across the road - but remember always to move turtles in the direction they are headed. If they are moved back to the side they came from, they will just try to cross the road again. Caution - be careful handling those snappers! Once the eggs hatch, be on the watch for babies crossing the road headed for the water. Sawmill Road, Francestown Road, Zephyr Lake Road and Forest Road around Russell Station Road are some areas that see a lot of turtle traffic - anywhere around ponds, lakes and wetlands - so, slow down and be careful! Doggone it! Forgive me if I am stating the obvious, but...we have a leash law. Sometimes when folks move to the country, they think, "wow, now my pets will be free to roam!" In many ways it is more dangerous for your dog to run loose in a rural area like ours - for one thing, there's more wildlife for dogs to tangle with. Just ask any dog owner who's had to deal with a dog-nose full of porcupine quills. Also, as much as you love Fido, remember his natural instincts as a predator. I'm fully aware that squirrels are not an endangered species, but I have watched a dog kill a squirrel - it's not a nice thing for you or your children to see. I have also seen a





dog terrorize a cat, and if folks let their cats out (which I hope they don't, see my article in last month's Spirit), it could be disastrous. Naturally, neighbors can work out their own compromises, but...be thoughtful and considerate of them. Also, don't forget those dog licenses!

Black bears are very active this spring because they had only a thin layer of fat when they denned this winter. To avoid conflicts, follow these guidelines: • Take down, clean and put away bird feeders (should have been done by April 1). Store the bird feeder until late fall. (Birds will do just fine with the natural foods available.) Bear damage to bird feeders is a common and growing spring complaint.

• Clean up spilled seed below feeder stations.

• Keep garbage in airtight containers inside your garage or storage area. Double bagging and the use of ammonia will reduce odors that attract bears.

• Garbage for pickup should be put outside the morning of collection and

Have you ever heard of a Fireman's Muster?

Bet you didn't know the first Fireman's Muster was held in Bath, Maine on July 4, 1849. Yeah, 159 years ago! Five fire engines vied to see who could pump water the furthest. Back then they used what folks called "hand-tubs" and the winner was the team that could pump a stream of water the highest. As you can well imagine, measurement was difficult and disputes numerous. What are hand-tubs? Handtubs were hand-pulled, hand pumped fire engines that required many people to operate. During 1850's, each year an average of 19 musters were held with an average of 10 engines competing. Rivalries between fire companies developed and competitions were held to prove their water pumping prowess. The Fireman's Musters soon blossomed throughout New England and New York and rules were changed to measure horizontal distance not vertical.



There are still hand-tub Musters today. These competitions are governed by the New England States Veteran Fireman's League which was founded in Boston in November, 1890. To be eligible to compete, an engine must have been built prior to January 1, 1896 and must have worked at least one fire. Some firemen's associations have preserved the old hand-pumped fire engines and still use them at musters. Muster teams continue to "muster" for the same reasons they did a century and a half ago, pride, enjoyment and proving that their "team" is the best.

Muster - to show, convene, assemble, to call the roll, accumulate, to call forth, rouse, to amount to, an act of assembling, critical examination, an assembled group!

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
