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NOTICE TO ALL DOG OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF GREENFIELD

The Greenfield Police Department reminds all dog owners that the Town has a LEASH LAW in effect.

Dogs are not permitted to run at large or be a nuisance at any time.

The Greenfield Police will strictly enforce animal control laws. Dogs found running at large will be picked up and a summons will be issued to the owner of the dog for court appearance.

Dog owners whose dogs are deemed a nuisance will also be summoned to court.

DPW STARTS WORK FORCE TRAINING PROGRAM

Public Works Director, Kevin McDonald, has developed and implemented a Work Force Training Program for Greenfield's Department of Public Works. The program is designed to bridge the gap between formal academic education and real-life experience. The program offers the intern the opportunity to gain valuable experience in the operation of various construction equipment, planning and organizing work, and understanding administrative duties. This experience will allow the intern the opportunity to develop key skills needed to meet unique challenges presented in the daily operation of a public works department. This program will help meet the need for future public works employees. As public works employees retire, it has been realized that there are few qualified persons that have the wide variety of skills needed to do the job. This occupation demands the knowledge of heavy equipment operation, welding, truck driving and mechanical skills. In recent years the demand for more training is clear, in the wake of many new federal mandates requiring public works to be responsible for regulatory changes as well as increasing involvement with FEMA and emergency management.

The Work Force Training Program will allow students from various schools to intern with the Department of Public Works and learn many aspects of this trade. Kevin worked in cooperation with School to Career Coordinator, Mary Lou O'Neil from ConVal Regional High School. With ConVal's School to Career program already in place, it was easy to transition one of its interns into our new program.

The first intern to pilot the program for our town is Heidi Blanchette of Greenfield. She is a senior at ConVal and has two welding certificates from a previous internship. She is very enthusiastic about learning how to operate heavy equipment and is very interested in the public works field.

Roads and Highways

As more people moved into small outlying towns from the larger settlements, wider and better roads were required. More traffic, bigger wagons, and the stagecoach demanded improved roadways.

Scoops, dumpcarts, and levellers, became the way of the road agents. Horses and oxen supplied the power for these pieces of equipment. A lot of these implements were actually created for the building of railroad beds. Then, the equipment pieces became more commonly used by towns and counties to maintain and construct roads for wheeled vehicles.

In the late 1800's, towed, steel "graders" were made. Heavy enough to cut ditches or to level road surfaces and pulled by a minimum of two horses, these machines saved a lot of hand labor! Eventually, these were pulled by tracked tractors until the self-propelled units were developed. Even the motorized machines took a lot of work by the operator to perform its task. "Arm strong" steering was a common term for all sorts of motorized equipment. Trucks, cars, and other equipment had no power steering at all. Cranking the grader's moldboard up and down as well as fighting the steering wheel gave the operator quite a workout!

In the 1920's, hydraulics came out on some machines to lift or turn the grader blade. At the Society's Museum, we have a few photos in our albums of a horse-drawn grader being used in town by a road commissioner or road agent. A crawler tractor was purchased in the late 1920's for the Highway Department. The first self-powered road grader was purchased and used in 1955 for about \$10,000. The town also had its own dump truck at that time. In 1946, a 2 1/2 ton International Harvester truck was acquired for the Highway Department at a cost of \$3,109.94. A heater for the cab was also added for \$21, a Good Roads plow and wing were also purchased for \$841 minus a \$291 trade-in

credited on an old plow. Tire chains for the truck added \$52.75 to the cost.

(Various resources were used as the basis for this article.)

We are very excited about a recent donation of a GPS map and photos of some of the cellar holes in town. This was a late winter/early spring project undertaken by Ben and Adele Hale. A large map of the town will indicate where a lot of these cellar holes are located.

Greenfield Fire Department Safety Tips

Food Safety: Flooding and Power Outages

Please follow this advice to avoid becoming ill from food involved in flooding and power outages.

If Flooding Occurs:

- Drink only bottled water that has not come in contact with flood waters.
- Discard all food that has contact with flood waters, including canned goods.
- Discard wooden cutting boards, plastic utensils, baby bottle nipples and pacifiers that may be contaminated.
- Thoroughly WASH all metal pans, ceramic dishes and metal utensils that come in contact with flood water with hot soapy water and sanitize by boiling them in clean water or by immersing them for 15 minutes in a solution of one teaspoon of chlorine bleach per quart of water.

During Power Outages:

- Never taste a food to determine its safety.

- Get block ice or dry ice to keep your refrigerator or freezer as cold as possible if power is going to be out for an extended period of time.

- Discard refrigerated perishable food such as meat, poultry, fish, soft cheeses, milk, eggs, leftovers and deli items after four hours without power.

- If the food in your freezer still contains ice crystals or is at 40 °F or below, then the food is safe to cook and eat, or refreeze.

When in doubt, throw it out!

WALKING TIPS

1. Walk early. Morning is a great time to walk. It's cool and bugs aren't as active then.
2. Walk in town where bugs are fewer near paved areas.
3. Take plenty of water. Lack of water can make your body feel weak.
4. Walk with a friend. When you walk and talk, it makes the time and miles go by.
5. Take binoculars and watch the birds.
6. Plan a picnic and walk to a nice place to eat.
7. Walk to work or to the store.
8. Walking has the lowest dropout rate of any physical exercise.
9. Walking as little as 30 minutes a day provides heart health benefits.

Zumba Party

Zumba is an international dance fitness program which combines upbeat Latin and world dance rhythms, e.g. merengue, salsa, and cumbia, with low impact aerobics. Each 60-minute class uses the interval training principle, alternating fast and slower rhythms to give participants an effective calorie burning workout that's so much fun, it doesn't feel like a workout! Sunset Lake Beach Rules

1. The town beach is for residents and taxpayers of the Town of Greenfield, N.H. only. Guests are permitted when accompanied by a resident or taxpayer.
2. The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
3. NO DOGS, horses, pets or animals of any kind are allowed on the beach!
4. No open fires are permitted.
5. No vehicles are allowed on the beach.
6. Disturbing noises and/or music is prohibited.
7. Littering, including the careless disposal of cigarettes is prohibited. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.
8. Alcoholic beverages prohibited.
9. No horseplay.
10. Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!
11. Do not feed ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.
12. Listen to the lifeguards at all times.
13. Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.
14. No floatation devices.

"No lifeguard on duty" sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.

Floating Raft Rules:

1. No rough play.
2. No tipping of the floating raft.
3. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if a person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the raft.
4. No swimming under the raft.

Zephyr Lake Beach Rules

Zephyr Lake rules are the same with these exceptions:

Zephyr Lake Beach is **"Swim at your own Risk"**, as there is no lifeguard on duty at any time.

Fishing allowed outside of where others are swimming.

All other rules apply except those pertaining to lifeguards and rafts.

Sunset and Zephyr Lakes

The beach water is tested by the State. Any time the beach is deemed unsafe for swim, please abide by the signage posted.

Complaints and comments should be directed to the Town Office at 547-3442

Emergencies and vandalism in progress should be reported to the Greenfield Police Department by dialing 911.

For other non-emergency police issues, please contact the non-emergency dispatch number at 547-2525.

It is our mission to make the beaches a safe, fun place for your family and community to be proud of!

IMPORTANT!

All vehicles will be required to display a permit sticker in order to park at the beach.

A Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on resident's vehicles. This free sticker may be obtained from the Town Office. Non-residents registered for swimming lessons may obtain a temporary permit after June 15th for \$75. This rule will be enforced by the Greenfield Police Department.



BICYCLE SAFETY

Summer is a great time to ride bicycles. Kids do it all the time. In case you've forgotten, here is a quick reminder of the rules of the road for bikers. Teach your kids the rules so that they can be safe while they are having fun!

Bicycles are Vehicles

According to New Hampshire law, bicyclists have the same rights and duties as drivers of motor vehicles. (RSA 265:143)

However, the reputation of all bicyclists is hampered by the few cyclists who ride outside the law. Riding by the same set of rules as motorists makes you predictable and greatly reduces your risk of a crash. Law-abiding actions send a message to motorists: "I belong here – and I'm going to share the road in a predictable, courteous way; just as I expect you to."

Two Wheels or Four, The Law is the Same

- Before entering the roadway, yield the right of way to approaching traffic. (RSA 265:32)
- A bicyclist traveling at less than normal traffic speed shall remain on the right side as far as possible except when unsafe to do so. (RSA 265:144-11)
- Stop and yield to cross traffic at a stop sign. (RSA 265:30-I)
- Don't cross the stop line when the traffic signal is red. (RSA 265-30-I)
- Stop for pedestrians in a crosswalk without traffic signals, and don't pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. (RSA 265:35-I&IV)
- In preparing to turn left, do so from the farthest left lane available. (RSA 265:42) To prepare for the turn, first look behind and merge to the center line or left turn lane as traffic permits, signaling to get the cooperation of following drivers as necessary.
- Don't ride on sidewalks (RSA 265:26-a)
- Don't ride the wrong way on a one-way street (RSA 265:23-II)
- Any bicyclist shall stop upon demand of a peace officer and permit his bicycle to be inspected. (RSA 265:144-8)
- A bicyclist must wear at least one item of reflective apparel such as a reflective vest, jacket, or helmet from ½ hour after sunset to ½ hour before sunrise. (RSA 265:144-12)
- Always wear a well-fitted bike helmet – it can save your life!

NH cities and towns have the power to make additional ordinances regulating cycling within their boundaries.

Where to Ride on the Road

- Ride on the right side of the road, with the flow of traffic. (RSA 265:16-II) Motorists and pedestrians do not look for bicyclists coming from the wrong direction. Riding against traffic is the single largest cause of collisions with cars.
- Look ahead for potholes, debris, and other obstacles. As soon as you see one, look behind and merge left, as traffic permits, well before you reach the obstacle.
- Do not ride so close to parked cars that opening doors may hit you. In an urban situation one may have to ride close to parked cars, look ahead through the cars' rear windows to look for drivers who may be about to open their doors.
- Do not pass on the right of cars turning right.
- Where there is space, leave enough room for faster traffic to pass. You may occupy any part of a lane when your safety warrants it. Never compromise your safety for the convenience of a motorist behind you. (RSA 265:23-II)

Special Rules for Bicyclists

- Persons riding bicycles two or more abreast shall not impede the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and, on laned roadway, shall ride within a single lane. (RSA 265:144-5)
- No bicycle shall be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped. (RSA 265:144-2)
- No person operating a bicycle shall hitch onto a car or any other vehicle moving upon a way. (RSA 265:144-3)
- No person operating a bicycle shall carry any package, bundle or article which prevents the rider from keeping at least one hand on the handlebars. (RSA 265:144-4)
- No bicycle shall be operated unless the steering, brakes, tires, and other required equipment are all in safe condition. (RSA 265:144-9)
- Riders under the age of 16 must wear a helmet when operating a bicycle on a public way. (RSA 265:144-10)
- When bicycling after dark you must use a white front headlight and a red rear light or rear reflector visible for 300 feet. (RSA 266:86)

FASTROADS

If you have been keeping up with the minutes of recent Selectmen's meetings, you may have seen a reference to the Fastroads project. It is summed up best in an open letter from one of our newest residents.

To all of my fellow Greenfield Residents:

Recently my family and I became Greenfield residents and have enjoyed every aspect of the town, save one. The one shortfall was that we discovered after we closed on our new home that there is a lack of true high speed Internet to every resident of the town. It did not take us long to exhaust every option for service before we finally had to settle for a connection through our cellular company. Needless to say, it is less than an ideal solution. Despite these reasons, I was excited to be present when New Hampshire FastRoads presented a possible solution to the Greenfield Board of Selectmen, a statewide open access network. By combining forces with the State of New Hampshire and UNH, FastRoads is applying for Federal grant dollars to build the infrastructure needed to allow service providers to provide rural communities, such as ours, broadband service without the providers having to make the costly investment of installing all of the infrastructure. This new system will not have nearly the same distance restrictions from the center of Greenfield, as is the case now, but rather give a statewide network to allow much cheaper solutions of routing service to every corner of Greenfield. While this is a multi year process (they predict 2-3 years) it is vitally important to Greenfield's chances of being included in the plans that its residents let all entities involved know now that they are interested in participating in this service, should it become available. This is why I hope that you will please join me in filling out the non-binding interest form on page 9 and help start the process of bringing broadband internet to all Greenfield residents.
