Lasko Recalls Box Fans Due To Fire Hazard

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the firm named below, announced a voluntary recall of the following consumer product. Consumers should stop using recalled products immediately unless otherwise instructed. It is illegal to resell or attempt to resell a recalled consumer product.

Name of Product: Box fans

Units: About 4.8 million units

Manufacturer: Lasko Products Inc., of West Chester, Pa.

Hazard: An electrical failure in the fan's motor poses a fire hazard to consumers.

Incidents/Injuries: Lasko has received seven reports of fires associated with motor failures, including two house fires and one barn fire, resulting in extensive property damage. No injuries have been reported.

Description: This recall involves Lasko box fans with model numbers 3720, 3723, and 3733 and Galaxy box fans with model number 4733 that have date "2002-03" or "2003-04" stamped on the bottom of the metal frame. "Lasko" or "Galaxy" is printed on the front of the fan. The model number is either stamped or printed on the bottom of the fans.

Sold at: Mass merchandisers nationwide from July 2002 through December 2005 for between \$12 and \$25.

Manufactured in: United States

Remedy: Consumers should immediately stop using the recalled fans and contact Lasko to receive a free fused plug safety adapter.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY News

CORN OR HOP CRIBS

At the junction of Route 31 South, Woodland Lane and Miner Road, stands the big yellow house built by Paul Cragin. Across from it is a small diamond-shaped building that I always called a corn crib, a structure used for the drying of whole ear corn. Slats between the boards allowed air to flow through the corn to keep it dry for its grinding into flour or to be fed to livestock.

In the mid to late 1800's, Mr. Cragin's son-in-law, Hugh Abbott, used this building to store and dry hops. Mr. Abbott would sell the hops in Boston. He bought the hops from other farmers in the area. While in Boston, he would also do errands for other people. A photo of this house and corn crib may be found on page 87 of the town history. A brief history of the house is given on page 225, and served as the resource for this information.

Zephyr Lake, at one time, was known as Cragin Pond. The old 1858 map lists it as such. Most all of the "lakes" in town have changed names over the years. Gould Pond is now Sunset Lake, and Otter Lake was once Pollard Pond. I don't know who used the word "lake" rather than "pond" when renaming these water bodies. Perhaps the term "lake" had more tourist appeal when summer places/hotels opened up as a vacation destination.

Our annual June Fair will be held on Saturday, June 4th, between 10 AM and 2 PM at the Museum. The team from Knotty Pine Antiques and Appraisals will be there to appraise your items. Please limit your treasures to three pieces. This will give everyone a chance to meet the experts. And, again, they will not discuss jewelry.

The June Fair will be the last chance to get your raffle tickets for the wooden

shed building. The drawing for the structure will be at 1:30 PM. There has been a lot of interest in this nice, utilitarian, multi-purpose shed donated by New England Forest Products.

Also, David Bridgewater will be demonstrating an old hand powered wood turning lathe at intervals throughout the day. Additionally, a small Flea Market will set up on the grounds and run from 9 AM to 2 PM.

We will have our 1928 fire truck out and other displays at the Museum, too. Hopefully, next year, the fire truck and a few other items will be on permanent display in our new barn.

Plans for our barn are progressing! We how have a design for a size-appropriate barn completed by Sheldon Pennoyer who also originally designed the museum building. Sheldon, an award-winning architect lives in Greenfield. Paul Freeman, also a Greenfield resident and the owner of Brooks Post and Beam, Inc., will do the framing. Mike Borden, another Greenfield resident, will do the groundwork for us while Jeff Creighton, also of town and the owner of J.C. Foundations, will pour our footings and The ConVal Applied foundation. Technology students will be hands-on in actually building the structure. Chet Bowles, the ATC Director, reports that the school is excited about undertaking this project.

Later in the summer (the first Saturday in August), the Historical Society will have a booth at the Blueberry Jamboree. Stop by to see our display, get a 50/50 raffle ticket, join the Society or buy some of our books about Greenfield.

The Museum is now open the last Saturday of the month through September from 11 AM to 1 PM or by appointment by calling either Lenny at 547-2198 or Jane at 547-2759.

Recycling Center News

This is the time for spring-cleaning. It begins in the home, and then on to the garage, next the shed or barn, then the yard and lastly the car. This clean up can accumulate a variety of items to be disposed of. Everyone has an idea of where to dispose of these items but to be sure, please take a minute and ask what to do when you get here. This will insure that it goes in the proper place.

Here are a few facts:

The percentage of NH waste that goes to landfills is 44%. The 3 private landfills in NH are: Rochester (the biggest), Berlin, and NCS (in the north country). The 3 cities that own lined landfills in NH are: Nashua, Conway, and Lebanon. By the year of 2025 there will be no capacity left available in NH landfills at all.

Do you know?

• More aluminum goes into beverage cans than any other product and we use over 80,000,000 aluminum soda cans every year.

• Drainage pipes, toys, carpet, sleeping bags and cassette casings are just a few items made from plastic bottles.

• The United States Post Office has just come out with a set of new stamps to encourage recycling called "GO GREEN". A copy is posted on the bulletin board.

Wanted:

We have a goal: We would like to paint the inside of the Recycling Center building with oil based paint to cover the dirty walls. Once we have a good base coat, latex paint can be used as the second coat. Contrary to popular opinion, you can paint latex over oil but the problem is that oil paint is becoming harder to find. That being said: If you have left over oilbased paint that is USABLE, we might be able to put it to use here. We MUST check the paint when you bring it in to determine if we can use it. If we cannot use it here, then it must go to Keene as Hazardous Waste.

Please do not "drop off" any of this paint; together we will decide what is appropriate.

Other Items

The information on smoke alarms is available and posted on the bulletin board as well as the Hazardous Waste Collection information. There will be more dates from July to October posted as soon as they come out.

Shopping bags from various stores that have a recycling symbol on them are not recycled here. The grocery stores and Wal-Mart do a good job of collecting them and recycling them. Another way to recycle them is to use them as trash bags in your small trash receptacles. You are then reusing the bags and saving money in the process.

The location for items that contain refrigerants has been moved. Remember fees apply. Please see me if you have these items to drop off.

Other Information of Interest:

• Please remember no paint cans are to be disposed of unless checked first. The lids must be off and the cans must be empty. We will gladly direct you to the proper area to leave them in and what to do if you have left over paint. Please do not abandon any paint cans that are not empty at any of the doorways or any other area on the premises.

• Please rinse all recycled containers: plastic, steel, and aluminum. This is the only deterrent to bugs and rodents except insecticides and rodent control measures. We are trying to control these critters without extreme measures and with your help.

• Please remember to flatten your cardboard instead of stomping it down, which creates creases that will not lie flat in the baler.

• There is a container for "Box Tops for Education" between the battery skid and the glass window. These are on General Mills products and other food/staple items. The school is collecting them and your help is appreciated.

• Please be aware that the car batteries and the other small batteries on the pallet by the doorway are town property. They provide revenue from the Recycling Center for the town. Recently quite a number of these were removed from the pallet, which resulted in lost revenue.

On a daily basis items are being abandoned on the premises that should be taken to the Hazardous Waste Collection in Keene. If you need assistance in determining what to do, PLEASE ASK.

The result of these actions may end up costing the town extra money for their proper disposal. You as a resident can take these to Keene at no expense but once they are abandoned on the Recycling Center property they become an expense to the town.

A few quick reminders:

MINI MALL: New shelves have been installed and more renovations are coming. Please remember to check with us before leaving any items. Please put sharp objects on a higher shelf so children will not grab them. No electronics, clothing, or furniture allowed.

USED OIL: Please remember oil that is contaminated with water, antifreeze, gasoline or any other foreign substance is considered Hazardous Waste. We cannot burn these mixtures in the furnace, so please do not leave them on the premises. Synthetic oil is also considered to be Hazardous Waste and we cannot burn it either. PLEASE, do not leave it here.

METAL PILE: Please see us if you have items for the metal pile, together we can determine where to put them. There are fees associated with certain items that go in this area. The metal pile is being used as a "hiding place" for items that should go to Keene. Once they are left here, the burden of the cost will be on the town. Please do not put fire extinguishers, propane tanks of any size, or oil filters in the metal pile. We will take oil filters inside and drain them. A 55-gallon drum has been placed at the metal pile for small nails, screws and small metal pieces to keep them off the ground.

BICYCLES & LAWN MOWERS: These are being separated from the metal pile so they are more accessible if anyone is interested in them. We are hoping to have bicycle racks made from metal tubing from the metal pile. Lawn mowers MUST have the oil and gasoline drained before they can be left in this location.

BURN PILE: Please remember the 5" rule. No logs over 5" can be left on the premises. No plywood, treated lumber, painted or stained lumber, or laminates of any sort can be left in the burn pile. This is part of the state law on burning at Transfer/Recycling Centers.

COMPACTOR: No ashes, electronics, metal, wood, or recyclables should be put into the trash compactor.

MIXED PAPER: Please sort the corrugated cardboard out of the mixed paper. The 1/2 gallon containers of orange juice or soy milk are waxed cartons and cannot be recycled. If you are not sure how to determine these items, please ask.

ALUMINUM CANS: If you have large (15 gal. or bigger) trash bags of aluminum cans, you can put the whole bag thru the window. This will allow us to empty them directly into the baler.

PLASTICS: If you have oil containers to recycle please bear in mind that we can only recycle those that have NOT had used oil in them. If you leave the lids on we will finish draining them inside. If you have large (15 gal. or bigger) trash bags of only #2 plastics, you can put the whole bag thru the window. Again, this will allow us to empty them directly into the baler.

TIN/STEEL CANS: The lids that have been removed from tin/steel cans are also recyclable. Please put all aerosol cans (aluminum or steel) in this window as well. Since we bale aluminum cans we cannot have aerosol cans in with the aluminum cans. Paint cans do not go in this window or other non-food related containers. Please ask and we will help you.

ELECTRONICS: Please remember there are fees associated with these items.

FEES: We are still accepting the punch cards as payment, so if you have these please use them.

The skid steer has arrived! We will have it parked by the red electronics container for all to see.

We appreciate your efforts in keeping the grounds free of litter and in recycling!

We will gladly answer any questions and we are always open for suggestions. Here's one for you.

There are 40 species of reptiles and amphibians in New Hampshire, including amphibians, frogs, toads, snakes and turtles. Check NH Fish & Game's website for identification tips, calls, and volunteer programs.

_____ Turtles of New Hampshire (adapted from NH Fish & Game)

> This is the time of year that females cross the road to lay their eggs, so drive carefully!

> In New Hampshire, we have seven turtle species that are considered to be native (see below). Painted and snapping turtles are fairly common. Other species, like the Blanding's turtles, are becoming increasingly imperiled. The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department maintains a database of all reptile and amphibian reports through its Reptile and Amphibian Reporting Program (RAARP). The first step to reporting a sighting is accurately identifying the species. Information and photographs were compiled for all of New Hampshire's native turtles to aid in this identification process:

Blanding's Turtle (Emydoidea blandingii) Eastern Box Turtle (Terrapene carolina carolina) Common Musk Turtle (Sternotherus odoratus) Eastern Painted Turtle (Chrysemys picta) Snapping Turtle (Chelydra serpentina) Spotted Turtle (Clemmys guttata) Wood Turtle (Glyptemys insculpta)

In addition to these 7 native species, occasionally a nonnative turtle is observed in New Hampshire resulting from released pets, most commonly red-eared sliders. Never release pet turtles into the wild!! Report non-native species to Fish and Game.

Eastern Painted Turtle (Chrysemys picta)

Painted turtles are colorful turtles with yellow markings on the head and neck and orange to red marks on the limbs and shell margins. Hatchling painted turtles are small and have an orange plastron (lower shell). Painted turtles can be observed basking on logs, sometimes many individuals can be observed together. Painted turtles use a variety of wetland and open water habitats.

NH Conservation Status: Not listed

State Rank Status: Widespread and abundant.

Distribution: Throughout state, less common in northern New Hampshire.

Description: a 4-6 inch turtle with a smooth carapace and light lines running across the back (created from the straight rows of the large scutes on the back). The head and neck streaked with red and yellow stripes. There are two yellow spots behind each eye.

Commonly Confused Species: None

Habitat: Wetland areas with an abundance of vegetation and basking areas such as shallow ponds, marshes, bogs, slow-

Hopefully with the gorgeous warm weather that summer is presenting, you are out and about and enjoying one of Greenfield's greatest assets- those beautiful, winding dirt paths between the trees. They are perfect for meandering along on your mountain bike, zigzagging in your trail running shoes, wandering around on the backside of your horse, or even just strolling through to take in nature's relaxing beauty.

However, it is important to remember that a lot of effort went into those trails

by the volunteers who build and maintain them all year long. And GTA would like to keep it a positive experience for all, but since they can't be out on the trails 24/7 patrolling, GTA is asking all patrons to help out by:

submerged logs.

• Carrying garbage out. If you come across trash on the trail, be kind and pack it out.

• Removing your animal's waste products. Even if you feel its "biodegradable", stepping over it can be unpleasant for others.

• Refraining from using during muddy/rainy periods. Your tracks can quickly harm and erode them.

• Leaving the trail as you find it- most trails are laid out in careful consideration for plant and animal life. It is better to slosh through a puddle than to widen the trail. • Not deviating from the trail. It might

Removing obstacles in the trail, like tree limbs, to make it safe for other users. If they are too large for you to move, notify a GTA member.

And finally, GTA's annual meeting is coming up- July 20th at 6pm at the Town Office meeting room. This meeting lets everyone know where we have been and where we are going. It also lets GTA know what you are thinking. We would love to see you there! And yes, I will make cookies!

Non-Resident fee is \$30 per child, per session, Non-refundable.

WHEN: Two Sessions are offered throughout the summer.

American Red Cross (ARC) Swimming Lessons are offered by age and ability level. American Red Cross certified Water Safety Instructors (WSI) teach lessons. The WSI reserves the right to transfer students to the proper class level, which will be determined once your child is observed in the water. Our goal is to make every effort to conduct lessons at the lake. Lessons will be cancelled if it is raining heavily or any thunder and/or lightening present. This is at the discretion of the guard staff. An adult MUST accompany children during lessons for safety reasons. Please have your child(ren) on time so lessons can run smoothly. SWIMMING LESSONS ARE STRUCTURED AS FOLLOWS:

Sunset Lake Beach Rules

1. The beach is for Greenfield Taxpayers, Residents and their guests and non-residents who have paid \$75.00 for a seasonal beach pass ONLY.

2. A Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on your vehicle. Non-residents may obtain temporary permit for \$75.00. 3. The beach is under the supervision of the certified lifeguard from 12:00 Noon - 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday, June 27th thru August 30th. The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Presence outside of these hours is considered trespassing.

4. The lifeguard will NOT assume responsibility for unattended or unsupervised children at anytime.

5. Supervised swimming permitted in designated area inside the roped area.

6. Alcoholic beverages prohibited.

7. Listen to the lifeguards at all times.
 8. Flotation devices are NOT allowed

while lifeguards are on duty.

9. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.

10. NO dogs, horses, or other animals are allowed on the beach.

11. Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!

12. "No lifeguard on duty" sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.

13. Beach closes at 10 p.m.

14. Do not feed the ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.

15. Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.

16. No Horseplay

17. Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.

FLOATING RAFT RULES

1. No rough play.

2. No tipping of the floating raft.

3. No other flotation devices will be allowed on the floating raft while lifeguards are on duty.

4. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the rafts.


