Public Input for Charrette Planning Sought

Preliminary planning for the fall charrette is underway. At press time, we have not heard from our application to NH Charitable Foundation for a \$5000 grant but we remain hopeful. Discussion has taken place at Planning Board meetings and a progress report from the Planning Board and Town Administrator was presented to the Selectmen on May 14th. Additional outreach took place at a GIVers meeting on May 21st.

The Charrette is scheduled to take place on September 26 and 27, 2014. A tentative working calendar is illustrated below. It is important to remember that this working schedule is <u>subject to change</u> as planning evolves.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

MAIL ON THE MOVE

The Town History continues with more information about mail delivery in Greenfield noting that after the completion of improvements to Forest Road in 1831, mail arrived from Boston on a stage coach every other day. Following the construction of the rail bed in 1874, mail was transported every day by the Boston and Maine Railroad.

Two trains per day went "down" to Boston and two trains went "up" to Keene, NH. In 1936, after extensive flood damage, passenger trains did not run. However, buses operated by B & M (Boston and Maine), kept the same schedule. In 1956, this bus system was discontinued, and mail contracts for mail delivery were put out to bid, similar to that of the privately-owned mail trucks that pull into the post office today. Mail is received from and sent twice a day to Manchester, NH.

Not only did the mail move, but the post office location in Greenfield changed often. For some time, it was within a store on the site of the present library. Then, it was located in the house across the street from the library. At times, the post office was in the Hopkins Store - now known as Greenfield Meeting Place. In 1945, the post office moved into what is now the Harvester Market.

From 1964 to 1967, the Greenfield Post Office was situated in a building that originally was built and used as the Greenfield Industries Woodworking Shop. This was behind the Harvester Market - where the town septic/leach bed is currently sited. The building is now gone. The present Post Office building was built and ready for occupation in 1967.

Rural mail delivery in town was limited. Some people in the southern part of town got their mail from Lyndeborough while those in the western part received their mail from Peterborough. This was due to the fact that Greenfield had no RFD carrier service. Finally, mail carriers were incorporated into the Greenfield delivery system, and folks in all parts of town could set out a mail box for home delivery.

Please join us on Thursday evening of May 22, 2014, at 6:45 PM for a brief business meeting in the Wensberg Room of the Stephenson Memorial Library. We will vote on the proposed budget as well as elect officers/directors for the coming year. Then, at 7 PM, in conjunction with the NH Humanities Council, David Stewart-Smith will speak on "Mapping the Merrimack: An Adventure Into Uncharted Territory". There is no admission charge for the program, and light refreshments will be offered.

Our ANNUAL JUNE FAIR is scheduled for Saturday, June 7, 2014, at the Museum on Forest Road. Again, there is no admission charge, light refreshments will be offered, and there will be lots to explore. In addition to the Flea Market portion (Contact Adele Hale at 547- 3403 if interested in participating.), there will be demonstrations, exhibits, and other local vendors. We



RECYCLING CENTER NEWS

Summertime - here we are! Busy times are upon us with inside and outside chores. Projects waiting for the long winter to leave are now the focus of our energy. ALL items, other than regular household "kitchen garbage" and items for the recycling windows, must be checked before drop off. Remember Greenfield has Mandatory Recycling and fees apply to certain items. It will only take us a few moments to figure out your load.

TAKE NOTICE! Only those items in the Mini Mall and Library can be taken by the residents of Greenfield. Please note that any other items around the facility are town property.

CHANGE COMING SOON: In the near future, we will be changing the plastic window of #1 and #3-7's. When we do, we will only be taking #1's through this window but there are several factors that must be sorted out before we start the program. We appreciate your cooperation and patience.

THANK YOU's: To Neil Brown for digging a flowerbed around the sign at the gate and to Candi Fowler for providing and planting the flowers in the flowerbeds at both of the recycling center signs. Our litter clean up was provided by Greenfield's Boy Scout troupe who master a huge project within a few hours. This has resulted in our recycling center with a fresh look for the coming season. Also to Lisa Moran for her constant attention to tidying up the Mini Mall and Library.

SUMMER HOURS:

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE: Collections have started. Information sheets are available. Questions? Just ask.

Do you know? The average US citizen creates 82 pounds of textiles per year. Of that, 95% are worn or torn and can be recycled. Only 15% of that gets donated or recycled and 85% goes to the landfill. That equals 10 million tons or 260,000 tractor-trailer truckloads. Textiles are reused within a 3-grade system. Grade 1: Usable clothing is 45% - of that 5% is unusable - this recycling uses human labor which is good for the economy. Grade 2: Fiber conversion is 20% and uses the most energy of the 3 grades. Grade 3: Wiping cloth is 30% and uses human labor also and this process uses less water, energy and leaves less of a carbon footprint than the other alterative (landfill).

The EPA reports that 5-6% of landfills are used by discarded textiles but that each person who recycles their textiles EACH year saves 11 cubic yards of landfill space per year.

A quick reminder: All Containers that are recycled must be empty, rinsed and clean. Please remember this as we second handle these containers and it is a safety and health issue. Dirty containers draw insects and unclean soap containers present slippery floors that are a safety hazard to us.

CORRUGATED CARDBOARD: Please do not stomp on to flatten. Please ask us about wet cardboard.

USED OIL: Thank you for your contributions.

METAL CONTAINER: There are certain types of metals we recycle separately for the town.

BICYCLES & LAWN MOWERS: Please see attendant. All oil and gasoline must be drained. Let us know the history of the machine so we can pass it along to another resident interested in reusing the machine.

ELECTRONICS: Please see attendant. Fees are associated with the disposal of these items.

MINI MALL and LIBRARY: These are provided for your pleasure so please make sure your items are checked and help to keep these buildings tidy and safe.

Generally, the GCC meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Office building. Want to make a difference? Come and join us! (always double-check the meeting calendar on the town website, in case it has been moved).

What is a Conservation Commission? According to the 2004 Handbook for NH's Municipal Conservation Commissions, it "...is the only local body specifically charged with protecting natural resources; it provides a focal point within the municipal government for environmental concerns. Without a conservation commission, other boards may or may not be aware of and consider natural resources in carrying out their responsibilities."

Spotlight: NEW HAMPSHIRE DECLARES WAR...on terrestrial invasives!

In the last issue of the Spirit, we provided an overview of all

invasives Now, spurred on by a terrific lecture in January by Doug Cygan of NH Dept. of Agriculture, this is the year we are really attacking terrestrial plant invasives in the Monadnock region and all over the state!

Here is this great resource that provides a map for each town, with the "Most Wanted" species. See the link below, http://www.wildlife.state.nh.us/invasives/index.html and click on Greenfield.

Restoration is a Full Circle Pull, then Plant!

Invasive plant species are early colonizers of disturbed soils. Once you have cleared an area and exposed bare ground, remember to plant with native species as soon as possible.

The three "most wanted" (in other words, most NOT wanted, so get out there and pull 'em) in Greenfield, are Black Swallow-wort, Garlic mustard and Norway maple. Naturally, there are others that you hear about a lot - purple loosestrife, Japanese knotweed, honeysuckle, etc., - but the control of those will, many times, fall under the jurisdiction of DOT or DES.

Black Swallow-wort

Cynanchum louiseae Kartesz & Gandhi Milkweed family (Asclepiadaceae)

NATIVE RANGE

Europe (Italy, France, Portugal, and Spain)

DESCRIPTION

Black or Louis' swallow-wort (previously Vincetoxicum nigrum and Cynanchum nigrum) is a perennial, twining herbaceous vine. The leaves are oval shaped with pointed tips, 3-4 in. long by 2-3 in. wide, and occur in pairs along the stem. The small five-petaled star shaped flowers are dark purple to almost black with white hairs, about ½ in. across, and are borne in clusters. The fruits are slender tapered pods, 2 to 3 in. long by about ¼ in. wide, turning from green to light brown as they mature. Plants have rhizomes (underground stems) that sprout new plants and grow in clumps of several to many stems, forming extensive patches.

ECOLOGICAL THREAT

Black swallow-wort can form extensive patches that crowd

SWIMMING LESSONS AT THE BEACH

2014 "LEARN-TO-SWIM" American Red Cross Youth Swim Lessons

WHO: Youth, ages 4 and up

WHERE: Sunset Lake Beach. Resident lessons are free. Non-Resident fee is \$30 per child, per session, Non-refundable.

WHEN: One six week session will be offered this summer.

TIMES: 10:00 a.m.- 12:00 p.m. (adjustments may be made at the discretion of the lifeguard)

Dates are yet to be determined - check with the Town Office

American Red Cross (ARC) Swimming Lessons are offered by age and ability level. American Red Cross certified Water Safety Instructors (WSI) teach lessons. Each swimming lesson session consists of 10 classes, including safety program, rules, and ability assessment day. The WSI reserves the right to transfer students to the proper class level, which will be determined once your child is observed in the water. Our goal is to make every effort to conduct lessons at the lake. Lessons will be cancelled if it is raining heavily or any thunder and/or lightening present. This is at the discretion of the guard staff. An adult MUST accompany children during lessons for safety reasons. Please have your child(ren) on time so lessons can run smoothly. Children will need a towel and sunscreen for lessons.

REGISTRATION: You MUST register by contacting the Town of Greenfield, Town Administrator, Aaron Patt at 547-3442. See next page for swimming levels.

BEACH STICKERS

As of midnight July 31, 2010 at all town beaches (Sunset Lake & Zephyr Lake) all vehicles without a Greenfield Facility Sticker will be ticketed and fined.

Stickers can be obtained at the Greenfield Town Office, Monday through Thursday (9am to 5pm).

Stickers are to be displayed on the lower left windshield of the driver's side.

All questions should be referred to the Greenfield Police Dept. at 547-2525 or to the Town Office at 547-3442.

Sunset Lake Beach Rules

- 1. The beach is for Greenfield Taxpayers, Residents and their guests and non-residents who have paid \$75.00 for a seasonal beach pass ONLY.
- 2. A Greenfield facilities permit sticker is required on your vehicle. Non-residents may obtain temporary permit for \$75.00.
- 3. The beach is under the supervision of the certified lifeguard from 12:00 Noon 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday, June 21st thru August 30th. The beach is open to the residents between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Presence outside of these hours is considered trespassing.
- 4. The lifeguard will NOT assume responsibility for unattended or unsupervised children at anytime.
- 5. Supervised swimming permitted in designated area inside the roped area.
- 6. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited.
- 7. Listen to the lifeguards at all times.
- 8. Flotation devices are NOT allowed while lifeguards are on duty.
- 9. Pick up your trash and take it home with you. This is a carry in/carry out facility.
- 10. NO dogs, horses, or other animals are allowed on the beach.
- 11. Fishing allowed on the outside of roped beach area ONLY!
- 12. "No lifeguard on duty" sign will be posted when no lifeguard present. Swim at your own risk.
- 13. Beach closes at 10 p.m.
- 14. Do not feed the ducks or other wildlife present near beach area.
- 15. Parents must watch children near parking lot area. It's the lifeguard's job to watch the water.
- 16. No Horseplay
- 17. Lifeguards have the discretion to ask parties to leave the beach premises.
- 18. Sunset Lake Beach is a **NO SMOKING AREA**.

FLOATING RAFT RULES

- 1. No rough play.
- 2. No tipping of the floating raft.
- 3. No other flotation devices will be allowed on the floating raft while lifeguards are on duty.
- 4. Lifeguards have the discretion of deciding if a person swims well enough to go in deep water out to the rafts.
- 5. No swimming under raft.

EMERGENCIES AND VANDALISM should be reported to the Greenfield Police Department immediately by dialing 911.

Check Your Bicycle

Have your bicycle checked thoroughly at least once a year at a bicycle shop. Check it yourself before each use: Do the tires have enough air? Do the brakes work properly? - Not rubbing on the tire, making good contact with the rim. Is the chain adequately tight? Are the gears working properly? Are the quick release levers closed tightly?

Obey the Rules of the Road

Bicyclists fare best when they operate as other vehicles do. Using proper hand signals and obeying all traffic control devices (signs, pavement markings and signals) can significantly reduce the chance of a crash. It will also show that you respect the rules of the road. Following the rules of the road will ensure that your actions are predictable by motorists. Ride in the direction of traffic as far to the right of the travel lane as practical on the shoulder or in the bike lane in order to allow for a normal flow of traffic.

Light Your Way at Night

One third of all bicycle accidents occur at night while less than one third of bicycle trips occur at night. This clearly indicates that night riding is more hazardous.

Use a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and either a red light or 20 square inches of reflective material on you or the bike that is visible at least 300 feet to the rear. Flashing or steady red tail lights enhance your visibility and are recommended. Wearing bright, reflective clothing will also help you to be seen at night

Share the Road

Common courtesy dictates that you ride single file in most cases. Communicate with motorists and other users of the road by making eye contact and using proper hand signals. Most motorists are courteous and share the road with bicyclists. However, be aware that some may not. If you are harassed, keep your cool and remember your safety comes first.

Taking the Lane

If you are making a left hand turn or staying in a through lane when there is a right turn lane, it is legal, and safer, for you to "take the lane." Sometimes, you may wish to take the lane if the road shoulder is too narrow or is filled with debris, especially on downhills where you can maintain a speed close to that of other traffic.

Proper Helmet Fit

Helmets come in different sizes. Use one that is not too small or too large, but fits snugly and comfortably. Use the changeable pads to fine tune the fit. The helmet should be level on your head, not tipped forward or back. Straps should meet right under your ears to form a Y. Buckle it tight enough to feel the strap when you open your mouth, but loose enough so you can breathe. Make sure your helmet is certified to meet the Consumer Product Safety Commission standard for bicycle helmets.

out the native vegetation. Old field habitats of goldenrod and grasses can be replaced almost exclusively by swallowwort, completely changing their physical structure. Impacts of the change in physical structure and insect communities on grassland and old-field nesting birds is not yet known. A preliminary study of impacts on grassland birds in New York suggests that as coverage by a sister species of swallowwort (pale swallow-wort, Cynanchum rossicum) increases, grassland bird presence declines. The globally rare alvar ecosystems (limestone pavement barrens supporting unique plant communities), are threatened by many rapidly expanding swallow-wort populations in Jefferson County, New York. Black swallow-wort threatens to displace Jessop's milk vetch, a federally listed plant, on the banks of the Connecticut River valley in central Vermont. Investigations into impacts on the monarch butterfly, which requires milkweeds for reproduction, indicate that the butterfly will cue into black swallow-wort and lay eggs, but the larvae do not survive.

Garlic Mustard

Capparales > Brassicaceae > Alliaria petiolata (Bieb.) Cavara & Grande

Synonym(s): garlic-mustard, hedge garlic, sauce-alone, jack-by-the hedge, poor man's mustard, jack-n-the-bush, garlic root, garlicwort, mustard root

Garlic mustard is an herbaceous, biennial forb that is an aggressive invader of wooded areas throughout the eastern and middle United States. First-year plants are basal rosettes with green, heart-shaped, 1-6 in. (2.5-15.2 cm) long leaves. Second-year plants produce a 1-4 ft. (0.3-1.2 m) tall flowering stalk with small, white flowers in the early spring. Plants can be easily recognized by a garlic odor that is present when any part of the plant is crushed and by the strongly toothed, triangular leaves. A high shade tolerance allows this plant to invade high-quality, mature woodlands, where it can form dense stands. These stands not only shade out native understory flora but also produce allelopathic compounds that inhibit seed germination of other species. Garlic mustard is native to Europe and was first introduced into New England during the 1800s for medicinal and culinary purposes.

Norway maple

Acer platanoides

Description: Large deciduous tree 60' high by 40' wide. Bark: Grayish and somewhat furrowed. Twigs: Smooth, olive-brown. Buds: Terminal, imbricate, rounded, smooth, greenish-red. Leaves: Opposite, 4-7" wide, 5-lobed, dark green to dark red above, lustrous below. Flowers: Greenish-yellow, April. Fruit: Horizontal samara. Zone: 3-7. Habitat: Moist, well drained soils, full sun to partial shade. Spread: Seeds spread by wind and water. Comments: Leaf stalks exude milky white sap. Fast growing, buds break earlier than most native species. Naturalizes in woodlands where it can outcompete native species. Controls: Pull or dig seedlings/saplings. Cut large trees and prune suckers when

they sprout. Herbicide: foliar spray, cut-stem, bark banding, or slash bark with ax and apply to wounds.

Wrap-up:

In our area, the war on invasives was kicked off on May 13th with a garlic mustard pull at The Well School in Peterborough, where it spread from road fill. Look for occasional postings on the Greenfield blog for activities
