Here's an interesting bit of local trivia; In the 216 years of the Greenfield church's history, what pastor has had the longest tenure? For starters, you'd have to go all the way back to the 1820s to find the second place tenure of about 14 years, but first place belongs to none other than the church's current pastor Rev. Dan Osgood.

Recently the church celebrated Rev. Dan's twentieth year of ministry here in Greenfield with a surprise event at Carter Hall at Crotched Mt. Rehabilitation Center. Members of the church used song and skit to highlight some of the major events in Rev. Dan's life. Did you know that after going to college and getting a degree in secondary education, Rev. Dan did a stint as a dairy farmer in Vermont? After attending seminary in Bangor Maine, his first pastorate was here in Greenfield, and he's been here ever since.

As well as pastoring the local church, he is also the Chaplain at Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center, holding services for students and staff every Tuesday evening. He also serves on the ethics board at Monadnock Community Hospital.

GREENFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

We have had a busy and productive summer. Since we are opened on Saturday we have 3 hours to do tasks along with helping our visitors. Some of us have been putting 2 -3 hours one other day a week to work at the museum. Many thing have been accomplished such as, cataloging, sorting, and filing articles.

The historical Society had a booth set up at the Blueberry "JAM"boree with various articles on display from the museum. A few Greenfield Histories were sold also.

During the summer a few members were invited to get a look at an old house that is having some work done. It was an opportunity to see how houses of 100's were built. It is a rare opportunity to get to observe the structure of a house of this age.

In September and October the museum will still be open on Saturdays from 2 -5 pm. "The Pause That Refreshes" will continue to be on display through the end of October. It is a collection of painted and applied label soda bottles, crates, carriers, and other odds and end. Also on display are newspaper articles and posters from the Whing Ding and some information about the blueberries and how the high bush got it start here in Greenfield.

The Historical Society now has a post office box, PO Box 316. This gives us a permanent address rather than changing it whenever there is a change of officers. Eventually, it would be great to have a telephone installed (a working one not an antique on display) and

RECYCLING CORNER

TRC and its volunteer corps to take a break

After 15 months as a regularly scheduled advisory committee, the TRC has decided to end its regular meetings.. We have petitioned the Selectmen to remain "on the books" as an ad hoc Recycling advisory group serving at the pleasure of the Board. The TRC also will no longer provide regularly scheduled Recycling Center (RC) volunteers when the current schedule runs out on Oct 28. Thereafter, volunteers will serve on an ad hoc basis at the request of the RC Attendant

There were two major reasons for our decision to end regular meetings. First, we had achieved most of the goals that we had set 15 months ago.. And second, the current BOS had clearly gotten on top of the most pressing recycling issues, and therefore no longer needs a "standing" advisory committee as it moves forward.

We chose to disband the regular volunteers in part because of "burnout". As Kent Vincent, a former TRC member and RC volunteer aptly put it - "Spending your Saturdays sorting through your neighbor's garbage can become tiring." He was right. After 2 Saturdays a month for 15 months, most of us simply needed a break..

Our other reason for disbanding volunteers was to encourage the Selectmen and RC Attendant to finally bite the bullet and end the RC's dependence on volunteer help - a dependence rarely, if ever, seen among any of the RCs of surrounding towns. Given the experience of working at the RC, we firmly believe that volunteer independence can be achieved simply by hiring the 10 hr/week helper which was approved in the RC budget at the '07 Town Meeting. In sum, we believe that a 40 hr/wk RC Attendant, given a 10 hr/wk helper and an Angelo-type "cover" man, should be able to efficiently manage the RC to the satisfaction of both the Board and the public without additional help.

Trash Talk

Coming soon to an RC near you - the mother of all loading docks!

- If you have been wondering about the digging up at the RC, it's not the work of woodchucks! It's phase I of the construction of the new loading dock. Duffy and his intrepid DPW crew have been selected by the Select Board to do the whole thing - A to Z.- and have it completed by mid-October.

Citizens, help stop those darn RC scofflaws - they're costing you money!

- Could it really be true? Although I find such rumors hard to believe, I've heard that certain townspeople are not playing by the rules! They're said to enter the RC during days that the facility is closed to the public, and deposit unsorted trash into the open trash dumpster. Tsk., Tsk, You know who you are! Shouldn't you know better?
- And how about the bozos who steathily drop off noxious items like containers of strong (and very dangerous) masonry cleaning acid by the mini-mall? You can bet that they know better!
- And the same goes for the "fee duckers" who plot to avoid disposal fees by "mini-malling" their non-functional feesensitive items. - like non-working TVs and microwaves? Will it never end!?




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

"At WonderWorks, we are always working to maintain a safe, healthy and educational environment for all children," said Lynn Queen, Director of WonderWorks Learning Center. "We focus our child care around the individual, recognizing that everyone is different. We are extremely proud to achieve Licensed Plus status. I have worked with my staff over the past two years encouraging education and training to continuously improve their performance and to meet the high standards of quality child care."

WonderWorks' incentive award is for \$1,600.00, which is 5% of child care payments for children who received child care subsidized by the state during the previous calendar year. Licensed Plus was proposed by DHHS, and approved by the New Hampshire Legislature as part of the last budget as an incentive program for child care providers. WonderWorks' is one of only 63 child care centers in the state who have achieved this distinction, and only one of four facilities in the eastern Monadnock Region.

Wonderworks' Licensed Plus certification is effective until December 2009.

"Part of the reason WonderWorks was chosen for Licensed Plus status is due to the fact that our 17 member staff has been credentialed through the Early Childhood Professional Development System. Funded by DHHS, it is a voluntary program that recognizes experience, self-study and education through a set of "career lattices" of which child care professionals can continuously move up in level. DHHS issues a credential to child care professionals who meet or exceed criteria set forth in the child care licensing regulations," added Queen.

WonderWorks Learning Center provides quality care for children of the Monadnock Region of New Hampshire, ages six weeks to 12 years.




- * Walk, slither, and sneak on sidewalks, not in the street.

OCTOBER IS NATIONAL FIRE SAFETY MONTH

The history of National Fire Prevention Week has it roots in the Great Chicago Fire which occurred on October 8, 1871. This tragic conflagration killed some 300 people, left 100,000 homeless and destroyed more than 17,000 structures. The origin of the fire has generated speculation since its occurrence, with the fact and fiction becoming blurred over the years. One popular legend has it that Mrs. O'Leary was milking her cow when the animal kicked over a lamp, setting the O'Leary barn on fire and starting the spectacular blaze. How ever the massive fire began, it swiftly took its toll, burning more than 2000 acres in 27 hours. The city of Chicago quickly rebuilt, however, and within a couple of years residents began celebrating their successful restoration to memorialize the anniversary of the fire with festivities.



Intending to observe the fire's anniversary with a more serious commemoration, the Fire Marshals Association of North America (FMANA), decided that the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire should be observed not with festivities, but in a way that would keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) continues today to make National Fire Prevention Week a priority and counts on the participation and efforts of tens of thousands of fire and safety professionals, emergency volunteers, and other individuals working to reduce the risk of fire and the toll it takes on our society.

In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation.

In 1925 when President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed the first National Fire Prevention Week, he noted that in the previous year some 15,000 lives were lost to fire in the United States. Calling this loss "startling," President Coolidge's proclamation stated, "This waste results from conditions which justify a sense of shame and horror; for the greater part of it could and ought to be prevented...It is highly desirable that every effort be made to reform the conditions which have made possible so vast a destruction of the national wealth."

Every year since 1925, the president of the United States has signed the proclamation pronouncing the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which October 9th falls a national observance. For 70 years, the nonprofit NFPA has selected the theme of Fire Prevention Week, honoring the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire and using the events to increase awareness of the dangers of fire.

According to the National Archives and Records Administration's Library Information Center, Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record.

Please celebrate National Fire Prevention week at home, at work, and at school. Practice your escape plan, have your chimneys professionally inspected and cleaned, have your furnace cleaned and inspected in preparation for the heating season, use space heaters properly, check electrical wires for wear, and replace batteries in smoke and CO2 detectors. And help keep Halloween safe for all by visiting http://www.nsc.org/library/facts/halloween.htm for Halloween safety tips.
