PUBLIC NOTICE WINTER PARKING BAN

By order of the Board of Selectmen, the Town of Greenfield in accordance with Town Ordinance Chapter 1, Section 4, as well as, RSA 105, Sections 6-7-8, no vehicle shall be left standing on any street in said Greenfield between the hours of 11:00 pm and 6:00 am. Effective, November 1, 2012 - April 1, 2013. This is to allow plowing of the streets during snowstorms.

LCHIP AND THE STEEPLE

In the August-September volume of the Spirit, I wrote that the Town had explored several grant resources to see if there were funds available to help restore the Meeting House. When the article was written, grant institutions were reporting that grant funds were not available and that they did not expect funds anytime in the near future. However, the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) announced a grant round in late summer, and the Town began reviewing the requirements during the month of August. The grant round was comprised of monies that were leftover from completed projects or from projects that had been withdrawn. LCHIP Grant Round 11 is a matching grant program that will provide up to 50% of project costs.

LCHIP Grant Round 11 has approximately \$500,000 to disperse. Projects are generally historic renovations or preservation, and land conservation (purchasing land for conservation purposes). Restoration of the Meeting House steeple is a qualifying preservation project. The deadline for the application submittal was September 7th and the Town's application was accepted by LCHIP prior to the deadline. The Town has requested \$30,000 in grant funds to match the \$30,000 in funding that was provided to Capital Reserve Funds at the 2012 Town Meeting. As outlined in the August-September volume of the Spirit, this amount will cover the structural and cosmetic aspects of the steeple as well as provide care for the bell and the bell's support structure.

On September 14th, LCHIP announced in a news release the number of applications and the total dollars requested: "the applications include 40 historic buildings and 11 land conservation projects totaling 4,325 acres. Proposed projects are found in 33 towns and 6 cities and in each of the ten counties of the state. Grant requests range from \$1000 to \$150,000." The total amount of funds requested was \$2.6M, against the \$500,000 available. The Town of Greenfield Meeting House is one of forty historic buildings applying for funding. This is obviously a competitive grant program. LCHIP will announce winners in November. The grant schedule dates are:

MONADNOCK RSVP VOLUNTEER CENTER

The Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) announced that over \$4 million in RSVP funding has been awarded to support organizations and nonprofits across the country that utilize senior volunteers to tackle pressing community needs.

Nearly 40 grants, provided through the 2012 RSVP Relinquished Funds Competition, include 22 new sponsors for RSVP programs that engage an estimated 7,550 new RSVP volunteers. The funding also includes 16 RSVP augmentation grants to existing RSVP sponsors for increased funding to focus on veterans and military families.

Monadnock RSVP Volunteer Center has been awarded a \$7,000 grant to recruit veteran volunteers age 55 and older to transport veterans to medical appointments through a local volunteer transportation program. Veteran volunteers are also being recruited to serve in RSVP's independent living program, Neighbors-In-Deed, to provide companionship and assistance to enable veterans and military family members to remain in their homes as long as possible.

RSVP is part of Senior Corps, which is administered by CNCS. Senior Corps counts more than 330,000 volunteers serving through three key programs: Grandparents, Senior Companions, and RSVP. Established in 1971, RSVP is now one of the largest senior volunteer organizations in the nation and engages older Americans in opportunities that meet the most urgent needs in primary focus areas including: education, healthy futures, economic opportunity, environmental stewardship, disaster services and veterans and military families.

Monadnock RSVP provides services in 33 towns of the Monadnock Region and RSVP offices are located in Keene (357-6893) and Peterborough (924-7350). Monadnock RSVP is sponsored by Monadnock Family Services, a Monadnock United Way Agency.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

FALL WAS FAIR TIME!

School resumed in mid to late September during the 1890's and early 1900's. The village school usually started a week or more before the outlying, small, local schools. Farm work probably had a lot to do with the schedule.

In 1875, the Oak Park Fair Association was formed by people from various local towns. Stock was sold at five dollars per share. The first fair was held on September 16-17th, 1875. group met at a hotel. The hotel owner, Mr. Dunklee, gave the Association the use of the grounds for five years, and paid the taxes himself. The first fair was a great success! The Fair continued to be held from 1875 - 1886. It became an end-of-summer event before school began, and lots of items from local gardens were exhibited. By 1894, however, all buildings on the fairgrounds were removed.

In 1899, a new Oak Park Fair Association was formed. Stocks at that time were sold at \$25.00 per share. A new board fence was erected around the 40 acres of grounds, new stalls for stock were built, a new exhibition hall and a grandstand were constructed. The half mile track for horse racing was put into shape. Many activities were provided for those attending. The fair became so popular that reduced rates were offered by the railroad and special trains were run. This group held fairs until 1915. Trains were advertising rides from Boston, Fitchburg, Nashua, and Manchester to Greenfield.

The Hillsborough County Fair Association was then formed. The last fair was held August 26-27th, 1925. Wonder if school started earlier than this date of the fair?

(This information is a smattering of that found in our town history.)

The Historical Society's Board of Directors recently had the fortunate opportunity to acquire an Oak Park Fair cloth banner! The banner is believed to be from the 1800's. No such banner had been seen before by the Society Board members, nor did the Directors have any knowledge of such a treasure.

Info & Tips on Pets, Wildlife and Eco Issues by Janet Renaud

Pets

Oh, no, it's "Lost Cat Sign" season again. Fall and early winter are especially bad times to let your cat out. Predators are trying to fatten up now. Fishers are vicious! Keep Fluffy indoors!

All dogs in Greenfield must have a license! If yours doesn't, contact the Town offices.

Want a pet? Someone I know recently went to a breeder to get a puppy. FOLKS, SHELTERS ARE FULL OF DOGS AND CATS, PUPPIES AND KITTENS! Even if you want a purebred, there are rescue organizations for EVERY BREED. A close friend of mine is involved in Lab rescues! She's fostering a yellow RIGHT NOW! If you need info about purebred rescues, e-mail me @ jromane202@myfairpoint.net, and I will hook you up. Otherwise, visit "our" animal shelter, the Monadnock Humane Society in Swanzey: http://www.monadpets.org or 352-9011.

Responsible pet ownership: The story of the yellow lab that my friend is fostering is a very sad story of neglect that should never have happened. This dog was kept in a basement for four years. Do you have a pet? Give your pet love and attention every day.

Wildlife

Watch out for deer and turkeys (as well as other animals) crossing the road. I

hit a deer on 202 in Antrim right around this time last year! They're "on the move!"

Bird Migrations - Here is some info from Henry Walters, NH Audubon hawkwatcher (/writer) for the fall hawkwatch up on Miller State Park, via Francie Von Mertens: Pack Monadnock Raptor Migration Observatory is entering its eighth consecutive year of data collection. The gate for Miller State Park's auto road will be open 9:00-5:00 each day, weekends and weekdays. You will have to pay the regular park fee. All sightings, raptor and non-raptor alike, are being posted each day at www.hawkcount.org

Bird Feeding - if you ever thought about feeding wild birds, this is the time to do it, as soon as there is snow cover. it will be very difficult for them to find natural food after this. Remember, though - it's a commitment! If you do it, keep them up, clean and filled until April 1st.

Selected nature observations by the week - adapted from Northern Woodlands

October - week 1: The date of the first frost varies widely, but it now averages about six days later than it was in 1960. October - week 2: Yellow leaves of winterberry holly have fallen, revealing bright red berries.

October - week 3: Orionids meteor shower; yellow, stringy blooms of witch hazel are the last to flower in the northeast.

October - week 4: Foxes, deer and porcupine fatten up on apples; red squirrels stuff mushrooms into tree crotches.

November - week 1: Minke, fine, humpback, and right whales are heading for the Caribbean.

November - week 2: Whitetails are "on the move." Crabapples might be full of waxwings.

November - week 3: Leonids meter shower from the 13th to the 20th, peaking on the 17th & 18th.

November - week 4: Look to the east around sunrise to see the conjunction of Venus and Saturn, within 1 degree of each other.

Eco Tips

Thinking about paving your driveway? DON'T! Black, impervious surfaces are bad for the environment. Why? 1) Asphalt is a petroleum product - think of the resources that are used to produce it, it's toxic, etc., 2) black absorbs heat and spreads it around, making the air and ground too hot for plants, animals and insects, 3) water runs off it instead of being absorbed back into the ground and has nowhere to go but out into the street, onto more asphalt, or into a storm drain and ultimately into a waterway, and 4) the water that runs off it is hot and toxic, which is bad for the same reasons as above. Use gravel, or just leave it as dirt. Hey! You live in the sticks - act like it! If you have a "melty" driveway, as some folks do who live in hilly areas, consult a road construction expert to find out about dry channels, water bars, and other ideas.

You've heard of reduce, reuse, recycle, right? Now there's also...(adapted from globalstewards.org)

Fourth: Refuse

- * Refuse Products that Create Waste: If available, instead of buying processed food, bring your own bags and containers and buy from the bulk and produce sections of the grocery store. Minimize or eliminate other types of purchases that generate waste. You can aspire to be a zero-waste household while creating a far more satisfying and affordable lifestyle.
- * Avoid Single Use Products: Instead, choose (or bring) reusable products or consider doing without. Avoiding plastic single use items is especially important because of their toxic load and, if landfilled, exceptionally long life. These can include food and beverage containers, cups, plates, straws, writing pens, razors, diapers, towels, shopping bags, etc.
- Refuse Giveaways: When a business or individual offers you a free giveaway that you don't need, politely refuse. This can be anything from a straw in a restaurant to promotional gifts to paper handouts. This not only saves the company or individual money, but it keeps

Emma Gipson Forest

The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests ("the Forest Society," as it is commonly known), is one of only two land trusts that serve the entire state (the other is the Nature Conservancy). The Forest Society manages conservation easements for landowners and also owns a large number of properties outright. These parcels are managed to various criteria - some are managed for timber, some for recreation, and some are just left alone. The Emma Gipson Forest is such a parcel, right here in Greenfield, right next to the post office. It is a little over 12 acres and is used casually by many local folks for low-impact recreation. Focus on...Exemplary Natural Communities

The New Hampshire Natural Heritage Bureau, a unit of the Division of Forests & Lands of the New Hampshire Department of Resources & Economic Development, finds, tracks, and facilitates the protection of New Hampshire's rare plants and exemplary natural communities. Their database contains information on more than 6,000 species, natural community, and system occurrences throughout the state.

Plants, Animals, and Natural Communities Tracked by the NH Natural Heritage Bureau

The list (link at the end) notes the rare plants, rare animals, and exemplary natural communities and systems that the NH Natural Heritage Bureau has on record in each town.

Rare Plant Species

The NH Natural Heritage Bureau tracks the state's rarest and most imperiled plant species. They have identified these species in cooperation with researchers, conservation organizations such as The Nature Conservancy, and knowledgeable amateur botanists. Population locations for these species are obtained from a variety of sources including herbarium specimens (some dating from the late 1800s), personal contacts, scientific literature, and extensive field research. The NH Natural Heritage Bureau undertakes surveys on private property only with landowner permission.

Rare Animal Species

The NH Natural Heritage Bureau tracks rare animal species in cooperation with the Nongame & Endangered Wildlife Program of the NH Fish & Game Department. The Nongame Program has identified these species in cooperation with researchers, conservation organizations such as the Audubon Society of New Hampshire, knowledgeable amateur biologists, and the NH Natural Heritage Bureau. Wildlife locations were obtained from sources including museum specimens, personal contacts, the scientific literature, and through extensive field research.

Exemplary Natural Communities

Natural communities are defined as assemblages of plants and animals that recur in predictable patterns across the land-scape under similar physical conditions. They are different types of habitats or ecosystems such as forests, wetlands, grasslands, etc. Most of the New Hampshire landscape is covered by relatively common natural community types. Scattered throughout the state, however, and usually in predictable areas, are distinctive communities found in few other places.

Particular sets of natural communities tend to co-occur in the landscape and are linked by a common set of driving forces (such as landforms, flooding, soils, and nutrient regime). These groups of communities are referred to as natural community systems (sometimes just referred to as systems). Systems are often at an appropriate scale for many applications, including mapping and predictive modeling, identifying wildlife and wildlife habitats, and conservation planning.

NH Natural Heritage Bureau

The NH Natural Heritage Bureau tracks "exemplary" natural community and system occurrences. To qualify as exemplary, a natural community or system in a given place must be of a rare type, such as a calcareous riverside seep, or must be a relatively undisturbed occurrence of a common community in good condition, such as an old-growth spruce - fir forest. Exemplary natural communities and systems represent the best remaining examples of New Hampshire's biological diversity.

Federally/state listed as endangered or threatened? No

Reported once in Greenfield, and 21 times in the state.

Plants

Name: Sweet Coltsfoot (Petasites frigidus var. palmatus) Federally/state listed as endangered or threatened? Yes, listed as Endangered in the state

Flag:Not flagged as rare

Reported historically in Greenfield, and 9 times in the state.

Vertebrates - Birds

Name: Bald Eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus)

Federally/state listed as endangered or threatened? Yes, listed as Monitored federally, and Threatened in the state

Flag:** (Very High A marginal example of a global rarity or a good example of a state rarity)

Reported once in Greenfield, and 73 times in the state.

- Composting: Start a compost pile with yard trimmings and food scraps. Learn more at Wikipedia's Compost page.
- Grasscycling: Leave grass clippings on the lawn as fertilizer and to reduce the amount of yard trimmings disposed in landfills.
- Mulching: Mulching mowers are available which will convert cut grass into a natural fertilizer.

in a landfill. According to the 2010 EPA study of the municipal solid waste generated from 1980 to 2010 the recycling rate has increased from -10% to 34% and the amount of municipal solid waste going into landfills has decreased from 89% to 54%. Kudos for recycling!

- Do you know? An average baby will go through 8,000 disposable diapers and they last centuries in landfills.
- Every year nearly 900,000,000 trees are cut down to provide raw materials for American paper and pulp mills.

A few quick reminders:

MINI MALL, LIBRARY, AND THE METAL AND BURN PILES: Please have your items checked.

USED OIL: Thank you for your contributions. This oil will help to heat the Recycling Center this winter. We do NOT ACCEPT oils contaminated with

antifreeze, water, gasoline, sludge or other contaminates.

BICYCLES & LAWN MOWERS:

All lawn mowers must be checked before dropping them off and all gas and oil must be removed.

COMPACTOR: NO ashes are accepted in this container. See attendant for disposal.

CARDBOARD: ANY type of CORRU-GATED cardboard is accepted. Thank you for all your efforts and cooperation in recycling.


