From the GREENFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT

Greetings to the residents of Greenfield from your Fire Department. This past spring many of you read in the local papers that we, like so many fire departments nationwide, are struggling with volunteer recruitment and retention. Volunteerism is declining all across the country in almost every arena... not just the fire service. Generational differences, both spouses working full time jobs and a host of other socio-economic forces have changed the volunteer landscape. As many of you are aware our Fire Chief, Loren White, requested and helped put together a study committee to analyze this decline and make recommendations. The committee is comprised of Fire Department members past and present, a member of the Police Department, representatives of the Board of Selectmen as well as other concerned citizens. We thank all involved and look forward to their forth coming recommendations.

In the mean time, we have continued with our mission. We are extremely pleased to announce several new members that have joined in the past few months. Chaz Babb, Brenda Parker, Jeff Rychwa and David Simmons have all joined in the last year. Chris Borden, wife of our Lt and Code Enforcement Officer Mike Borden has also just joined. This is a wonderful start. We thank all of these good people for their commitment. Several of our newer members are currently enrolled in a Medical First Responder course and plan to be certified and licensed to respond to rescue calls by year's end. This is a step forward, but we still need more help. Daytime response remains a significant challenge as many of our members work out of town. If you are available in the daytime... we could really use your help.

Quality training is an essential component of volunteer fire departments. The State Fire Academy in Concord has much to offer... but is regrettably not close by and does not provide much in the way of evening trainings. The members of the Greenfield Fire Department have jobs, children and the other responsibilities that come with life. Going to Concord for training is often not practical. Lt. Borden has proposed that we build a training building so that we, and neighboring departments, can participate in fire training locally... here in town. We can build a fire training simulation building at a very low cost by doing the building ourselves. We need only to raise the money for the materials, the rest we will take care of... we have the skills and knowledge. We are reaching out to you for help. We are your neighbors, your friends and fellow citizens. All of us have made a substantial commitment to the welfare and general betterment of our community. But we can't do it all. We are looking to raise approximately eight thousand dollars. We are asking all that can to please send a donation... \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100 or more if you possibly can. If many give a small amount this will happen.

Your contributions are tax deductable, we have a firefight-

ers association like most volunteer departments so that we can raise money. On a personal note, I retired from this department six or seven years ago to devote more time to my rapidly growing business. I have recently returned to the department specifically to help with training and policy development. In the spirit of "putting one's money where their mouth is", my company will make the first donation (\$250) to the "Building Fund". I will also participate in the design and construction of the building. There are not many businesses in town, but we will be calling on them and asking for their donations as well.

So, although we have experienced a decline in membership in recent years, there has been some very positive movement of late. You may have noticed that we have been around the firehouse a lot more lately. This is an exciting time. If you have ever considered joining the department, this would be a wonderful time to do so. If you would like to talk about it, if you have questions about what we do, please call me at my office here in town... 547-2222. If you have new building materials, 2x4s, 2x6s, full sheets of plywood or drywall, etc left over from a renovation project that you would like to donate, call me as well. If we can use them, we will make arrangements to pick them up.

Thank you for reading this. We thank all of the town's people for all your support over the years. If you can donate, please make the check to the Greenfield Firefighters Association and mail it to PO Box 146 here in town. If you don't have a stamp... I'll come to your house and pick it up! Want a tour of the department? I'll meet you there.

We are deeply committed to this project and equally committed to the rejuvenation of this department. We look forward to your support as we look forward to better times.

RECYCLING CENTER NEWS

Fleece jackets are beginning to feel pretty good as we get into the cool days of fall. We hardly seem to have time to admire the beauty of it all as we rush around getting ready for winter. The holidays will be here before we know it so let's slow down a little and take time to enjoy our families and the season.

TAKE NOTICE - WASTE OIL NEEDED! We are in desperate need of used oils for heating this winter. These oils include; motor oil, hydraulic, crank case, transmission, power steering fluid, diesel and kerosene fuel. Oils contaminated with water, antifreeze, gasoline or other contaminates are not accepted as these are considered hazardous waste and not usable in the furnace. We use waste oil in our furnace here at the Recycling Center so that we don't have to buy as much with your tax dollars. We stretch it as far as we can by not running the furnace every day but when it is cold, we do need the heat to be able to work. Presently we only have about 1/3 of what we usually have at this time of year. We appreciate your contribution no matter the quantity.

THANK YOU's: There are several people to thank for the new sign at the boulder by the compactor. Mark (owner) and Rick (painter) of Fine Lines Auto Collision Repair of Brookline, NH have graciously provided the labor and materials to give a professional finish to the bare metal supplied to them for some large signs (Two-4'x4' metal signs - this is one of them). Also thanks to Neal Brown and Dan Wolaver for providing and applying the lettering to the sign. Also, a thank you goes to Mary Ann Grant for watering the hanging plants on our off days this summer.

SUMMER HOURS - WINTER HOURS:

Summer Hours: Tuesday 8am - Noon, Thursday 1pm - 7 pm, and Saturday 8am - 4pm until November 1st.

Winter Hours: Tuesday 8am - Noon, Thursday 1pm - 5 pm, and Saturday 8am - 4pm starting November 1st.

Remember Halloween as the turning point of Thursday's hours changing.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE: October is the last month for collections in Keene, information sheets are available and we are ready to answer any questions you may have about your items.

WINDOW CHANGE: The plastic window for #1 and #3-7's is transitioning to <u>only</u> #1 bottles. #1 bottles are described as the neck being smaller than the bottom and see through or clear.

This change is in progress and will be for a short time, so that you have time to change your recycling habits. A new display will be up shortly. Containers with #'s 3 thru 7 will go into the trash as will the other #1's such as the clamshells.

Caps: We can make a little extra money on caps if we leave

them on #1 and #2 plastic bottles. If you remember "RCR" (Rinse - Crush - Recap) when doing your plastics, it will make it easier. We greatly appreciate your cooperation and patience through this transition for all of us.

DO YOU KNOW? A leaking faucet at 10 drops per minute wastes enough water annually to run 60 dishwasher loads. The typical office worker throws away 180 pounds of recyclable paper every year. One ton of recycled cardboard saves 46 gallons of oil.

MARKET FACTS: Due to the down turn of the markets and the low demand for fibers overseas another mill shut down in July in Connecticut that took in fibers (cardboard and paper) to process and sell. A paper mill in Maine has just closed recently as well and BFI in Hooksett closed unexpectedly in late June. BFI was also a MRF (Materials Recovery Facility) that took in multiple types of materials to process and sell. The commodities market resembles Wall Street in its ups and downs and in the past several years it has been slowly and steadily declining. In this climate it is hard for towns to make much money so we are all trying to find the best way to achieve the most in revenues from our recyclables.

CORRUGATED CARDBOARD: Please do not stomp on to flatten. The baler does flatten the cardboard but stomping on boxes does not leave a flat piece to bale. We load the baler with flat cardboard only which gives us a tighter and heavier bale. Since we started this practice our bale weights have gone from an average of 700-800 #'s to 1200+ #'s. The result is better revenue for the town. Please take wet cardboard home and dry it, then bring it back to recycle.

VEGETABLE OILS: we are collecting all types of vegetable and nut oils - we are getting a little \$\$\$ for it! See the sign that at the door.

METAL CONTAINER: Please have items checked before placing in the container.

BICYCLES & LAWN MOWERS: Please see attendant

ELECTRONICS: Please see attendant. Fees are associated with the disposal of these items.

MINI MALL and LIBRARY: Please help keep these buildings neat.

Remember the Recycling Center is a great resource for the town. If there is an event happening in town - bring a poster to the center ahead of time so it can be posted on the bulletin board.

We are always ready to answer your questions and always open for suggestions.



New England, with industrial centers along its many rivers was, not surprisingly, the home to one of the first railroads in the U.S. The Boston and Lowell was built between the named cities in 1835. Three years later, the Nashua and Lowell continued the line into Nashua, NH.

Most of the towns in the Monadnock Region wanted rail service after that first line reached Nashua. Rails were laid from Nashua to Ponemah (Milford) in 1850. The following year, the line was extended to Wilton. Greenfield very much wanted a railroad line to their town, but lacked a real industrial base. Peterboro, however, was the town that had the mills. That would not be a very easy route to go on because of the mountains that lay to the south and east of The easy route to Peterboro would be through Greenfield. This route would not pass through the village of Greenfield, but would run through the area now known as Gulf Road. This did not please the people of Greenfield. It would be very costly due to the very rugged terrain. Rather than pay the money and risk hard feelings with Greenfield, Peterboro began looking for an alternative. The town of Peterboro negotiated a deal with The Monadnock Railroad. This line would run from Winchendon, MA, through Jaffrey. This line was built in 1871. Greenfield was still trying to attract a railroad. One of the attractive features that was put forward was that the line could continue on to Hancock and then, on into Keene. This would give Keene a direct route to Nashua and into Boston.

The Town of Greenfield put up \$10,000 toward the cost of this line. One condition put forth by the town was that the line had to be built within 1/4 mile of the center of town. The line was completed to Greenfield in December of 1873. As a ploy to make it easier to sell stock in this line, it was named The Peterboro Railroad. The first train arrived in town on January 1, 1874. Because the tracks ended in Greenfield, people caught stage coaches from there to Peterboro, Antrim, Bennington, Stoddard, and Marlow.

Many products such as apples, potatoes, and blueberries in season were shipped by rail from this area. Other products included soapstone, lumber, cordwood, and ice. The railroad, however, worked in both directions. People came from the cities to get away to the country. They boarded at local farms and such places as Tucker's Tavern in Peterboro and The Hollywood Lodge on Otter Lake in Greenfield.

Also at Weston Lodge, Adams Inn and Favor Farm in Bennington. There was Greystone Lodge in Antrim and The Mayfield House in Greenfield. The Mayfield House burned in 1910 and the present house was built in 1914. It was purchased by Pearly and Angie Russell in 1916, and is now the home of Dale and Kathleen Russell - the third generation of Russells to live there.

The dairy farmers of the area benefitted greatly by the railroad. They were now able to ship their milk directly to the city. Up until this time, they would make cheese or butter for shipping because of the time required for it to reach the markets in the cities.

Two of the mainstays of the railroad in later years were the Monadnock Paper Mills in Bennington and the E.C. & W.L. Hopkins Grain Mill in Greenfield. In 1976, a devastating fire leveled the mill complex in Greenfield. The Monday after the fire, ironically, was the first day of the B & M's track rehabilitation program starting in Hillsboro and working toward Milford. The rail service to Bennington and Hillsboro continued on an "as needed" basis until 1979 when the B & M abandoned service beyond Bennington. The last train to Bennington ran in the spring of 1986. This ended most all rail service in this area. Wilton and Milford still have occasional trains from

B & M successor, Pan Am Railroad. The Milford-Bennington Railroad runs to the gravel quarry in Lyndeboro and back to Granite State Aggregates in Milford during nice weather from spring into fall.

The Greenfield Historical Society

The Greenfield Historical Society was founded on September 10, 1973, by a group of Greenfield citizens who had an interest in preserving Greenfield's long and tumultuous history.

The present Museum on Forest Road was made possible through a generous act of Robert and Frances Blaisdell of Pennsylvania. Frances Blaisdell traced her roots back to the Fitch and Peavey families, early settlers of Greenfield. The Blaisdells gifted the Society with a house in Concord, Massachusetts, with the intent that it would be sold and the proceeds used to build a permanent home/museum for the GHS. This was completed in 2004.

In 2011, the barn behind the Museum was built by students in ConVal's building construction program. Again, generous donations from community members in terms of site preparation work and in kind donations aided this project. The barn houses larger items that have been donated, including one of the town's first fire engines, a Hopkins Grain delivery wagon, and Dr. Cheever's horse drawn sleigh.

The Greenfield Historical Society is very active with the June Fair, the Annual Train Show as well as special events throughout the year. Currently the main work is in cataloging and preserving, and adding to the artifact collect. The Society Board also researches requests about family genealogy from all over the country.

Present endeavors that need the assistance of members and volunteers include:

- scanning photos (We have thousands!)
- cataloging
