Greetings from the Selectboard

We wanted to take a moment to update you on the progress thus far with the meetinghouse and its proposed restoration. The Friends of the Greenfield Meeting House in collaboration with the selectboard and ultimately you the citizens of Greenfield are embarking on a journey to decide if we are able to bring our beloved meetinghouse back to its original splendor. This is a multi-faceted proposal that will include our savings, fund raising efforts and a bond.

Our meetinghouse was built in 1795 using local timber and was spearheaded by resident Hugh Gregg. He gathered 100 volunteers to raise the frame. That must have been quite a feat all those years ago using oxen, hand tools, pure muscle, sweat and ingenuity. It was no doubt a simple building compared to today's highbrid construction, but it was strong and well built to stand the test of time. It is the oldest meetinghouse in NH that has continuously served church and state.

We now find ourselves having to decide what it will take to keep it alive for the next 200 years and beyond, and that decision has fallen upon this generation of Greenfielders. There are some issues that have come to light that will require action. We also have the opportunity to make it serve the future generations better while we're at it, in a more substantial way. We have researched, interviewed, and decided on an architectural firm to help us make the most cost effective, meaningful, and sound decision path forward.

Misiaszek Turpin PLLC Architecture and Planning based in Laconia, NH has agreed to work with us and develop a plan of construction documents based on our perceived needs and building necessities, along with what will best serve our town in the future. They have developed a timeline for us that will take into consideration the completion of the necessary documents in order to apply for an LCHIP (Land and Community Heritage Investment Program) grant through the NH Historic Preservation Society. This would be prepared and applied for after a town meeting voter approval, anticipating its readiness and completion for our 2024 town meeting.

As a brief overview, we believe the important issues for our meetinghouse stem around accessibility, basement access, life safety, electrical safety, mechanical upgrades to heat, cooling, and ventilation for the building. As far as accessibility is concerned our goal would be to access all floors via an elevator. The basement would need to be waterproofed and have perimeter drainage installed much like we did at the library which was a complete success. From a life safety standpoint, a second egress from the second-floor sanctuary level and possibly a sprinkler system. The electrical service and wiring is in poor condition and will need to be upgraded no matter what we decide to do.

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Wally and Velma Stone

Wally and Velma Stone were quite involved in their adopted town of Greenfield. Both were born in Massachusetts - Wally in Sudbury and Velma in Lynn. Wally's father died when he was eight years old.

Wally and Velma met at college. He was attending Tufts University and Velma at Jackson College, the women's part of Tufts. They dated but then separated after Tufts. Velma was secretary to the CEO of Everlastic which made rubber bands. Wally continued his education at the Fletcher School for Law Diplomacy.

They began dating again and were married after the Hurricane of 1938. There was no power and no organ music available so violins were used to provide the music for the wedding. Years later, their daughter Carele wore her mom's gown when she was married. Over ten years, Wally and Velma had three daughters and two sons. When WWII came along, Wally was not eligible for service since he was the only son of a widow. His contribution to the war effort was to work at the Bendix Company making parts for the military to use.

In the late 1940s, Wally started working for the Boston Young Men's Christian Union. In 1949, he became Director of Camp Union in Greenfield. He started most of its programs for the campers. A bus owned by BYMCU would bring campers to and from Camp Union. Wally would go down to Boston and see them off from the facility there. He then would go grocery shopping buying in bulk for the camp and bring it back up to Greenfield.

At first, Camp Union was a summer camp. During winters, Wally would teach nature courses. He eventually got the city of Newton, MA, to send their students up to stay a week at Camp Union. This started the year round opening of Camp Union. Along the way, Wally and Velma established nature schools called Otter Lake Conservation Schools. The name was changed to Stone Environmental School in his honor after Wally retired in the 1970s. There were nine of these sites around the New England area. Wally selected places that would be able to feed and house over one hundred attendees. Now only one of these facilities is operating.

Wally was a gardener and was the first male member of the Peterborough Garden Club. He also gave talks on flowers. Wally also made up his own dish - "Wally Burgers" that were served for many years at various events around the area. Wally served as a member of the Greenfield Selectboard.

Velma was Greenfield's Librarian for many years and started many programs for the youth there. She also would have "The Little Red Wagon" puppet show of UNH come to perform every summer. She was active as a choir member and choir director with the UCC Churches.

She was very active in the Greenfield Woman's Club, serving as president at one time. Her daughter, Carele, carried on this tradition.

Carele was also the last president of the Greenfield Woman's Club which disbanded in 2016 due to lack of members.

The Stone family certainly has left their mark on Greenfield!

Get a Ride, or Give a Ride: EVERYONE BENEFITS

Right down the road, right now, someone needs a ride to somewhere essential. And volunteer drivers for Community Volunteer Transportation Company (CVTC) drive people where they need to go.

When riders can keep their essential appointments, they stay independent, and can live at home in peace. Riders can request to be taken to their doctor's or social service appointments, pharmacy or grocery shopping; all non-emergency. A five business-days' advance notice is all CVTC needs to enter a rider's trip request in our TripList system. And for the rider, it is more than just the free ride. Our drivers are courteous and trustworthy, willing to converse and engage. Sometimes even new friendships are made.

Once our vetted volunteer drivers choose which trips best fit their schedule, they call the rider to verify pick-up times and, when they return home themselves, they track their total mileage for reimbursement from CVTC. Drivers select when, and to where, and for how long they are available. By making this difference in a rider's life, drivers contribute to the health of the Monadnock Region, one person at a time

PUBLIC NOTICE WINTER PARKING BAN

By order of the Selectboard, the Town of Greenfield in accordance with Town Ordinance Chapter 1, Section 4, as well as, RSA 105, Sections 6-7-8, no vehicle shall be left standing on any street in said Greenfield between the hours of 11:00 PM and 6:00 AM. Effective November 1, 2022 through April 1, 2023. This is to allow plowing of the streets during snowstorms.

Summer has, as always, been busy at the Recycling Center. As mentioned before, the amount of material for "Demo" has exceeded previous years. Until it subsides, we will continue having MDS drop off a 40-yard dumpster instead of the traditional 30-yarder.

As you likely have noticed, we have been building up an inventory of scrap light steel. The last time we shipped out a full container the price per ton was \$200.00. This time I was quoted \$85.00 per ton along with an increase in the trucking rate which further would reduce our revenue. Using our extra space for storage may pay off in better pricing. The last time this happened, we waited with the result being an extra \$600.00 in revenue.

We did ship out a full trailer load of cardboard as well as a mixed trailer load of baled plastics, aluminum cans and cardboard at around the peak of the market. This netted the town over \$9,000.00. This should reinforce the message that keeping recyclables out of the trash helps enormously in reducing our costs.

The DPW was able to take a load of glass up to New London to be processed into "Processed Glass Aggregate". The load of "PGA" that they returned with has already been used up in culvert/road work.

You may remember that we asked townspeople if they had any recollections of the old dump to come forward and recount their memories. This was necessary to help complete a state requirement to file a dump closure plan for dumps closed before 1981. We completed and submitted a plan. After review, the DES official notified us that the plan was "incomplete." The two areas that need more work are regarding the volume of waste and the likelihood that asbestos was disposed of. We will be working with DES to address these items of concern.

A "labor-saving" device was dropped off at the transfer station recently-an electrified "sad iron". It was the "Hotpoint" brand, invented by Mr. Earl Richardson and made by his company-the Edison Electric Appliance Company. It was common back in the early 1900's for Thomas Edison to sell the rights to use his name. General Electric bought Hotpoint in 1927 so the GE logo would indicate that this iron was made in or sometime after that year. "Sad irons" were so named because of their weight (5-9lbs). They were originally heated on a woodstove or radiator. The one pictured weighs-in at 14 lbs.! Imagine the proud husband purchasing one of these and bringing it home to his wife to help lighten her household chores! 14lbs. is the equivalent of 14 of those 1 lb. blocks of prepackaged hamburger meat. She must have been so appreciative-something so much more substantial to clobber her husband with than the proverbial frypan.

Jim Morris, our DPW director, told me recently that people have been coming to the Recycling Center on Wednesdays and seeing the gate closed, drive down to the DPW to ask him why. One person was insistent that it was Tuesday. When Jim convinced him that it really was Wednesday, he replied: "Crap, I'm supposed to be at work today!". Post-Covid hybrid work schedules seem to be causing some confusion. Another person told Jim that the town website clearly states that the Recycling Center is open on Wednesdays and that we should get the site corrected. Bill looked up the website on his phone and sure enough the Recycling Center is open on Wednesdays...in Greenfield-MASSACHUSETTS! The Greenfield, New Hampshire website has the correct hours.

Mail in Renewals:

Residents can mail in renewals or use our drop box outside our office. Please address your envelope to Greenfield Town Clerk, PO Box 256, Greenfield, NH 03047. Include a selfaddressed, stamped envelope for us to return your registration in. Instructions are on your renewal letters. Please include the letter.

Payment Types: Two Checks or Cash

We are a 2 check Town, which means you will write a check to The Town of Greenfield, for the Town portion of the registration and a check to The State of NH-DMV, for the State portion. We do not take cards.

Moving to Greenfield from another state:

A) New residents to NH are required to register their vehicles and obtain a NH driver's license within sixty (60) days of moving to NH. Bring in your Vehicle Title, or Lienholder information, proof of residency (such as a utility bill, p a y stub etc), current registration, your drivers license and 2 checks or cash for payment. We will retitle your vehicle to NH and give you a NH new registration.

B) If you have a dog, you need to register your dog with the Town Clerk as well.

New Residents to Greenfield from another Town in NH and Change of Address:

A) Residents who move here from another town in NH must notify the Motor Vehicle Dept. of their new address within ten (10) days of a change. Forms are available at the Town Clerks office. Bring in your ID, proof of residency (such as a utility bill, pay stub etc.) and current registration. We will issue an updated registration.

B) If you have a registered dog, we will transfer that registration to Greenfield.


Dog Licenses: New dogs must be registered with the Town Clerk when you get them. All dogs must have renewal registrations done by April 30th. A renewal letter will be sent to you if your dog was registered in Greenfield during the last year. You can pay online, by mail or make an appointment. Current rabies certificate must be on file with the Town Clerk.

Fee Schedule:

Male or Female Dog	9.00
Spayed or Neutered Dog	6.50
Puppy (Under 7 mths	6.50
1st Dog owned by a Senior (age 65)	2.00
Group Licenses (5-10 dogs)	20.00
Group License (10 or more)	25.00

Failure to license your dog is a violation of State law. In addition to the annual license fee you will be charged a late fee of \$1.00 per month, per dog for each month (or part of month) after May 1st. A civil forfeiture fee will also be assessed in the amount of \$25.00, which is payable within fifteen (15) days of receipt of the notice of failure to register your dog (s). If the forfeiture fee is not paid within that time, a summons to appear in court will be issued.

This is the last day to **Register to Vote** before the **General Election**, **on Tuesday**, **Nov. 8th**, **2022**. Thereafter, you will need to register at the Polls as same day registration.

You can register to VOTE with the Town Clerk, during office hours, M. W. TH, 3-5:30pm, until Thurs. Oct. 27th, 2022, but you will not be officially added to the Voter Checklist until the Supervisors hold their session on Oct. 29th.

What to bring when registering to VOTE:

• **Proof of identity:** a photo ID such as a driver's license or passport.

• **Proof of age:** an ID with your birth date, as listed above, to prove you are 18 or older.

• **Proof of citizenship:** birth certificate or citizenship papers. Marriage certificate or legal paperwork if you had a name change.

• **Proof of domicile:** such as: a copy of a utility bill showing your name and the physical address; a pay stub showing your name and physical address; your vehicle registration; a notarized letter from your landlord stating you reside at the Greenfield address they rent to you.

POLLINATOR PATHWAY MEETING



Calling all gardeners interested in protecting our pollinators such as bees and butterflies. We will be holding a meeting on January 18, 2023 for all those interested in starting a pollinator garden in the spring of 2023. SOUTHERN NH SERVICES FUEL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Thanks to funding from the U.S. Department of Energy, New Hampshire residents who are elderly, disabled and low-income are provided financial assistance needed to pay for vital heating and utility expenses through the colder months. LIHEAP also offers case management to develop a plan to achieve increased financial selfsufficiency to avoid energy-related emergencies such as running out of heating fuel.

The Fuel Assistance Program provides grant benefits from \$304 to \$3,024 for heating purposes that do not have to be repaid to eligible homeowners and renters for the winter season as follows:

• If your heat is electric or natural gas, bills from November 1st can be paid until your benefit amount is used up or the program year ends.

• If your heat is from deliverable fuels, oil, kerosene, propane, wood or coal, deliveries made from October 1st – April 30th can be paid until your benefit amount is used up or the program year ends.

• If your heat is included in your rent and is NOT subsidized, assistance will be provided in the form of heating vouchers issued in amounts of up to \$504 each month until your benefit amount is used up or the program year ends. *If your heat is included in your rent and IS subsidized, you will not qualify for Fuel Assistance but you may qualify for Electric Assistance.

The Fuel Assistance Program application deadline is April 30th, 2023.

For the 2022-2023 Fuel Assistance Program, pre-applications will be made available to priority families, elderly, disabled and families with young children under 6 after July 1st. All others can pre-apply after September 1st.

Additional Assistance through Weatherization

All Fuel Assistance applicants will be asked if you want to participate in our Weatherization Program. This is an opportunity to have your home or apartment inspected by our trained Energy Auditors to determine if your home can be made more efficient to lower your energy bills. If your living space is drafty, in need of more insulation or has unsafe heating appliances, we will have the work done to make your home or apartment warmer, more comfortable and safer at no cost to you. If you are a renter, we will need permission from the landlord.



The FGCM would like to thank everyone who was a part of our third annual GREENFIELD\OKTOBERFEST last week! (If Oktoberfest was canceled for a hurricane, an invasion from Canada, or monkey pox, please disregard this part of the article, since I wrote it in August!). We would first of all like to thank John Hopkins of Monadnock Tent for his incredible generosity in providing tents, chairs, tables, grills, and lighting for Oktoberfest, free of charge. Without John's donations and the professional expertise of Monadnock Tent, Oktoberfest could not happen. Thank you, John and crew!

Oktoberfest has two equally important missions. Thanks to donations and volunteers, each Oktoberfest earns several thousand dollars for our Building Fund, but just as importantly, Oktoberfest brings our entire community together at the Meetinghouse, allowing everyone to see the incredible potential of the building! Special thanks to all our volunteers and Silent Auction donors, and to everyone who bought raffle tickets or donated directly to the Meetinghouse Building Fund. Very special thanks to Warren Aldrich and Sharon Andrews for organizing and cooking the German Dinner, to Jess Weeks and Harvester Market for donating food, and to Rich Stadnick for providing homemade cider! We are grateful to the Greenfield Police Department, all the town office staff, the Selectboard, and the Fire Department for their help. Thanks also to Brighid and Andres Wood, Laura Kostenblatt, Fred Simmons and Leslie Vogel, and Jarvis Adams and Larry Gilbert. Oktoberfest is truly a community effort...saving our Meetinghouse is something (almost!) everyone in town can agree on!

Our architects, Misiaszek Turpin, are now hard at work on the design plan for the Meetinghouse renovations. Since our Meetinghouse is on the National Register of Historic Places, the facade and appearance of the building will not change; only be upgraded (paint, repairs to clapboards, energy efficient windows, etc.). The use of each space and the flow of the building will remain as close to the existing interior as possible, but there will be changes in order to bring the spaces to code (stairs, elevator for accessibility, getting that bathroom out of the upstairs kitchen!).

While the Meetinghouse is listed on the National Register, the project is NOT a historic restoration, since both interior and exterior have changed and evolved continuously over the building's 227 year history. The Meetinghouse is currently a complete hodge-podge of styles, eras, and decor; it would be virtually impossible to choose one time period to duplicate. Records and photos at the Greenfield Historical Society document the many changes over time. For example, the second floor originally consisted of a wide gallery looking down on the first floor, similar to the Jaffrey meetinghouse; the full second floor was not added until later. At one point, the entire Meetinghouse was turned to face south, which explains why the cemetery is oriented differently from the building! The basement—which was not added until the 1950's, when three men with wheel-barrows excavated the space by hand—now has extensive leaks and water damage. After the renovation, all these spaces will be unified, simple and beautiful, reflecting and honoring the original design from the 1700's.

The FGCM, the Greenfield Selectboard, and Misiaszek Turpin want to hear from YOU in the design process! Please stay tuned for the next public meeting with Misiaszek Turpin. 
